Sixth Evaluation Round on Preventing corruption and promoting integrity at the sub-national level (Strasbourg, 20-21 March 2025)

Final Programme

Context

GRECO¹ is launching its Sixth Evaluation Round in 2025 on the theme of preventing corruption and promoting integrity at the sub-national level. GRECO adopted the Questionnaire in March 2024, which will be used to gather information prior to the on-site visits.

Due to the important role that sub-national authorities play in national democracies, preventing corruption and promoting integrity at the sub-national level is of paramount importance to ensure the quality of governance and accountability of decentralised governments. Bearing in mind each member state's constitutional set-up² and based on a dialogue with the Member State concerned, two sub-national authorities will be identified for evaluation. They will include (i) a capital or another large city; (ii) a regional or other sub-national authority or a municipality, in particular, in respect of countries having only one sub-national tier. They should be selected, inter alia, on the basis of the following criteria: they are mandated to spend public money and/or to manage finances on an executive basis; they are directly elected and/or have a mandate separate from that of central government; and they deliver a broad range of government services to citizens.

GRECO's evaluation in this round focusses on two main areas. Firstly, it aims to obtain a comprehensive understanding of the competencies, mechanisms, and responsibilities of national authorities regarding the promotion of integrity and prevention of corruption at the sub-national level, where applicable (Part A of the Questionnaire). Secondly, the evaluation aims at providing an in-depth analysis of the existing legislation, regulations, procedures, bodies, and mechanisms, as applicable, addressing the promotion of integrity and prevention of corruption in the two sub-national authorities identified for the evaluation (Part B of the Questionnaire).

Evaluators are expected to possess adequate expertise in the prevention of corruption and promotion of integrity in public bodies and/or the organisation, functioning, and management of sub-national authorities. The training aims to advance the evaluators' expertise in GRECO's working methods and procedures, the modus operandi of on-site visits, and the contribution expected from them. Transversal discussions in plenary sessions will be complemented by breakout group sessions focussing on practical interactive exercises to allow discussing in greater detail key issues at stake, as well as relevant standards and reference materials (see list of Working Documents).

¹ The Group of States against Corruption (GRECO) was established in 1999 under the aegis of the Council of Europe and is currently composed of the 46 Council of Europe member states, Kazakhstan and the United States of America. Its task is to monitor, on the basis of mutual evaluation and peer pressure which involve on-site visits, the implementation of the various anti-corruption instruments adopted since 1997. These instruments cover both preventive and repressive policies and address corruption in the public and private sector, domestically and transnationally, in line with the Council of Europe's Programme of Action against Corruption of 1996. In order to implement such an ambitious and multidisciplinary approach, the successive evaluation rounds have been focusing on specific topics, including: the institutional capacity to deal with corruption; incriminations of corruption; transparency and supervision of party financing; preventive mechanisms applicable to parliamentarians, judges and prosecutors; preventing corruption and promoting integrity in central governments (top executive functions) and law enforcement agencies.

² In this context, the term "constitutional set-up" is to be understood as meaning a country's constitution, practice and specificities.
