of the 3<sup>rd</sup> meeting, Strasbourg, 2-3 October 2023

## 1. Opening of the meeting

The Chair, Mr Markku MÖLLÄRI (Finland), opened the meeting and welcomed all participants, the list of which appears in Appendix I.

# 2. Agenda

The agenda was adopted as it appears in Appendix II.

#### 3. Information from the Secretariat

The Secretariat emphasised that the report would need to be finalised by the end of the year and be adopted at the upcoming 18<sup>th</sup> CDDG plenary meeting of 23-24 November. To achieve this objective, an additional informal meeting could be organised to discuss any final amendments and address any outstanding issue. The Secretariat also gave an update on the number of responses to the questionnaire (now 16), circulated to assist in the drafting of the report.

# 4. Draft report on Green Public Administration

The working group heard and discussed an introductory presentation by Mr Louis MEULEMAN, Director, Public Strategy for Sustainable Development, on the additions and changes he had made to the draft report on Green Public Administration (document GT-A(2023)8), since the meeting in June. A series of graphics and illustrations had been included, the structure had been reviewed and short tables introduced to present concrete examples taken from national practices, to illustrate issues and possible solutions.

In the ensuing discussion, the group discussed such matters as: the need to refer to positive key messages and concrete practical guidance; the specifics – benefits and challenges - of dealing with green public administration (GPA) in a democratic manner; the complementarity between the various governmental levels depending on what they can deliver; the need for coherent and consistent green policies involving and providing support to the citizens for them to contribute to the implementation of such policies; the preference for the concept of "green" rather than "sustainable"; the connection to the social dimension; the need for leadership and training of elected decision-makers; connections between the content of the report with the recent results of the Fourth Council of Europe Summit of Heads of State and Government (Reykjavik, Iceland, 16-17 May 2023), contained in the final declaration; the growing importance of the human rights dimension of environmental and climate policies; the importance of cooperation between public institutions to break possible persisting silo mentalities.

The Group agreed also that there was no need to include too many examples of national practices and that the compendium of replies to the questionnaire should become a publicly available appendix to the report with the permission of, and following additional editing as appropriate by the responding countries.

### 5. Discussion on the content of the draft report.

The group discussed the report chapter by chapter and participants made various suggestions and remarks for further improving the draft, addressing additional issues, and increasing the consistency of the structure. An annotated version of the report was produced in real time, summing-up all the input. The Group agreed to also simplify the structure with less sub-titles and one consolidated general introduction in the beginning.

It was agreed that the Conclusions of the report should echo the conclusions of the <u>GPA</u> <u>Conference</u>, with the main message being that GPA can make a real difference in terms of reducing carbon emissions and slowing down the climate change. It was also emphasised that green transition was one of the subjects currently on the very top of many political agendas (together with artificial intelligence) and that it deserved some more sustained action by the Council of Europe in the future.

#### 6. Next steps

The next revised version of the draft report should be available for consideration at the forthcoming CDDG Bureau meeting of 19-20 October (deadline: 16 October). The Bureau could then decide whether an additional meeting would need to be held before the 18<sup>th</sup> plenary meeting to finalise the draft and consider any outstanding matters.

The working group entrusted the Secretariat to seek the consent of responding countries to publish the compilation of national responses to the questionnaire of the Rapid Response Service No. 55.

The participants also discussed the need for follow-up once the report is finalised and adopted. Proposals included organisation of conferences in interested member states to promote the report; entrusting the new intergovernmental committee on environment and human rights ("Reykjavík Committee"), one of the results of the 4<sup>th</sup> Summit, as well as the Parliamentary Assembly and Congress, to follow up on the implementation of the guidance provided in the report; presentation of the report at the COP in Dubai and other international events.

The CDDG could hold a dedicated discussion on this at its 18<sup>th</sup> plenary meeting, together with representatives of the responsible committee in PACE. A document could be produced for the Committee of Ministers' Rapporteur Group on Democracy suggesting a way forward.

#### 7. Any other business

#### 8. Date of the next meeting

If needed, an informal online meeting can be organised in November before submission of the report to the CDDG plenary.
