Introduction

The right to liberty is one of the most fundamental human rights, and the deprivation of this right has harsh and serious consequences on the individuals affected by it. Imprisonment as a means of punishment for law breaking is ancient and dates back to first codified forms of law. In the 21st century, the question of imprisonment is complex, as prison population continually rises both in the Council of Europe member States and globally. Overcrowding is therefore a very real and present issue.



The Council of Europe in a number of texts adopted by the Committee of Ministers, as well as the European Court of Human Rights in its case-law, have urged national authorities, when possible, to employ alternatives to detention.

This course will introduce you to the key terms and principles related to the different types of alternative measures to detention.
