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Background

The **requirement to develop and implement** alternatives to immigration detention is well established in the European and International legal Framework.

Recent years have seen growing attention to the question of how alternatives can enable states to **manage migration** without over-reliance on depriving people of their liberty. Despite increased interest however, alternatives are not yet widely applied. Sometimes legislation has to be strengthened, but there is also a need for greater **practical guidance** on developing and apply alternatives **effectively**.

The HELP/UNHCR course on Alternatives to Immigration Detention therefore addresses both the legal and practical aspects of alternatives to detention in the context of migration.

The topics are developed in a practical way, by using presentations, interactive screens and knowledge checks.

The course was completed in June 2020.

About the course

The course has been produced jointly by the Independent Human Rights Bodies Division and the HELP Programme of the Council of Europe, alongside the United Nations High Commissioner for Refugees (UNHCR). It has been developed under the <u>Council of Europe</u> Action Plan on Protecting Refuigee and Migrant Children in Europe (2017-2019), with the support of the Office of the Special Representative of the Secretary General on Migration and Refugees (SRSG).

Target audience

The course target audience is inevitably diverse. It Is primarily addressed to all **legal professionals** (judges, prosecutors, lawyers or court staff) and justice professionals in the wider sense.

It can also be used by other **public authorities**, including national human rights institutions, law-enforcement, parliamentary staff, public administration staff etc. dealing with immigration legislation and practice. It can be a great resource for **university students** or **civil society organizations**, and in general for anyone who wishes to learn more about the legal and practical aspects of developing and applying alternatives to immigration detention effectively.
