1.1.B. The Ministry of Culture is responsible for forming and implementing cultural policy and cooperation with other ministries, as well as for the field of cultural heritage protection in Slovenia, including all sector regulations and financial management of state budget, intended for protection interventions. The Ministry has also established other bodies that operate under its jurisdiction, namely the Directorate for Cultural Heritage and two other institutions, the Archives of the Republic of Slovenia and the Culture and Media Inspectorate. The Directorate is the core office for cultural heritage which is responsible for preparing and implementing the protection policy for movable, immovable and intangible heritage on the state level. It is responsible for allocation subsidies from the state budget and European structural funds, which are intended for financing peogrammes and projects in the field of

cultural heritage.

The Ministry of Infrastructure and Spatial Planning was established in 2012 by the reorganisation of the Ministry of Environment and Spatial Planning and the Ministry of Agriculture. The Ministry's concern is directed towards tasks that directly or indirectly affect the conservation of immovable cultural heritage: protection of national, regional and local recognition of space, architecture and landscape; renovation of historic settlements; limitation of dispersed construction and protecting non-built-up sites; guaranteeing the development of modern architecture.

The Institute for the Protection of Cultural Heritage of Slovenia is a centralised public institution, established by the Government after the merger of regional institutions in 1999. Within the scope of public services, this Institute implements numerous expert (theoretical, practical) and administrative tasks in the field of conservation of immovable, movable and living cultural heritage. The Institute comprises of the management body, Office for Cultural Heritage (with seven regional units, distributed all over Slovenia), and the Conservation Centre (with Restoration Centre and Preventive Archaeological Centre).

The Government of the Republic of Slovenia is responsible for nationally significant monuments listing and allocation of financial funds for cultural monuments of governmental ownreship.

Municipalities list locally significant monuments, they decide on the manner of heritage protection in spatial planning process, they allocate financial funds for direct restoration interventions and manage cultural heritage that is owned by the municipality.

1.2.A. Slovenia has a well organised network of expert member organisations that are active in the field of cultural heritage protection. Addresses and short presentation of most significant organisations:

The Slovenian Association of Conservators

was established in 1971, before that year the Slovenian branch unit was a part of the Yugoslav Association of Conservators. Today, the Association has more than 150 members who are active or retired conservators. The main objectives of the Association are emphasising the significance of conservation vocation, advanced education of conservators, presenting conservation profession to the public, organisation of activities that promote the awareness on the significance of preserving natural values and cultural heritage.

The Slovenian Association of Restorers

was established in 1993. It has approximately 300 members, 150 of them are active members. The main objectives of the Association are similar to the objectives of the Association of Conservators; however, they are more restoration-conservation oriented.

ICOMOS / SI Association

was established in 1993 and has 47 members. The main objectives of the Association is the cooperation and integration of experts in the field of conservation, collection and valuation of cultural heritage, spreading information on conservation and related techniques and methodologies, cooperation with ICOMOS and its members.

Other experts that are involved in the protection of cultural heritage are incorporated in individual associations (of archaeologists, historians, ethnologists, art historians and landscape architects) which partially exercise their objectives that are significant for promoting and emphasising the significance of heritage conservation.

The tasks of architecture societies that are active within the scope of an umbrella association, do not include special cultural heritage protection and conservation tasks, however, their interest in research and popularisation of built heritage of the 20th Century is increasing.

The new Zakon o varstvu kulturne dediščine (Cultural Heritage Protection Act)2 enables NGOs in the field of cultural heritage conservation to actively resolve protection issues, and to actively operate in the processes of protection strategy preparation and other protection tasks.

- 1.4.B. Voluntary initiatives are very much involved in decision making on local levels, especially with regards to interventions in space and conservation as well as restoration of cultural heritage. They are an active member of the local community and expert protection office, since they cooperate in all protection procedures.

1. 6. A. Restorers with finished secondary education usually attend "in-service training" in the form of special courses, seminars and workshops, organised by the Institute for the Protection of Cultural Heritage of Slovenia, museums and archives.

In 1993, a programme for acquiring expert knowledge in the field of built heritage was adopted. It is performed as a three- or four-year secondary school programme.

Programmes, which enable the acquisition of vocations construction technician, master of masonry, carpenter, stonecutter and stove-maker/ceramist, are offered at the Secondary

School of Civil Engineering, Land Surveying and Economics in Ljubljana. The Secondary Vocational and Professional School in Maribor offers a programme, which enables the acquisition of knowledge in the field of carving, joining and furniture joinery. Another programme for acquiring expert knowledge in the field of stonecutting was adopted in Sežana.

In 2003, the Ministry of Culture in cooperation with the *Center za poklicno izobraževanje* (*Institute for Vocational Education and Training*)1, the Institute for the Protection of Cultural Heritage of Slovenia – Restoration Centre, Secondary School of Civil Engineering, Land Surveying and Economics together prepared vocational standards and catalogues of vocational standards for the acquisition of national vocational qualification for the area of seven vocations of restoration workers. The acquisition of national vocational qualification with a certificate is enabled for adults in order to prove their qualification regardless of the fact, how the knowledge was acquired.

All experts that are public officials in the field of heritage or who work in restoration and conservation of cultural heritage, and experts that work in the field of heritage documentation, have to pass a proficiency examination, organised by the Cultural Heritage Directorate. Passed proficiency examination is also the condition for implementing the mentioned work "on the market", however, not in the form of mandatory licences, but such examination can be required at an issue of consensus for a specific intervention in heritage.

- 2.1.B. Register comprises of three interconnected parts than contain basic, protection and presentation data on immovable, movable and intangible heritage. Registered data are public, except data on heritage owners, data on the location of archaeological sites, where there is a risk of prohibited search for archaeological remains, and other data, which would in case of disclosure endanger the existence of heritage.
- 2.1.C. Procedural implication of the Register: the entry of an individual heritage unit in the Register does not have any legal consequences, since registred heritage (which does not have a monument status) is only indirectly protected. The protection of registered heritage is implemented through directing interventions in heritage, when a spatial act determines the obligation to acquire culture-protection concensus for an intervention in heritage.

Heritage protection area is the area with uniform features of cultural heritage, which is an important part of spatial planning due to its value and developmental potentials. These areas are determined with the purpose to conserve heritage, prevent its destruction and derogation of its values in the environment. The Institute for the Protection of Cultural Heritage of Slovenia prepares propositions for determining the areas, the Ministry of Culture implements the procedure of determination of these areas with the aim to protect and determine detailed protection guidelines.

When applying for a state subsidy, the owner or legal owner of a cultural monument has also to submit the restoration or presentation project. Subsidies cover up to 50% of all costs, excluding archaeological research, artwork restoration and state monuments of substantial importance; in this case, the subsidies cover 100 % of all costs. The owner of cultural monuments can apply for monetary aid also at other ministries or municipalities. Municipalities usually offer subsidies from the municipal budget, which is considered as additional aid along with the granted state subsidy.

Along with the absence of heritage learning programmes for the youth, we have established that there is an insufficently used possibilty of putting lifelong learning about and for heritage for all generations into practice.

It encourages a uniform presentation of digital material for guaranteeing better access to this material to professional and other public. The Ministry of Culture finances the digitisation of archives, museum materials and materials in the field of immovable cultural heritage through the execution of annual programmes. So far, the area of immovable cultural heritage protection was mostly symbolically funded, therefore a planned digitisation of such material has not begun yet.
