By the Network of Council of Europe Quality Labelled Youth Centres Adopted at the European Platform of Youth Centres, Marienthal, 6–7 May 2025

A European Network of Learning and Solidarity

The network enhances the local impact of each centre while amplifying young people's connections to universal values and democratic movements.

Through this collaboration, the network strengthens the capacity of youth centres to respond to current and emerging challenges with creativity, competence, and resilience.

We are committed to upholding the values of human rights and democracy in all that we do.

We strive to strengthen our contribution to the European Network of Quality Label Youth Centres.
