1. Opening of the meeting and adoption of the agenda

Maria José Castello-Branco (President, Portugal) opened the meeting. She extended a special welcome to Javiera Verdugo Toro (Head of the International Legal Cooperation Division, Ministry of Foreign Affairs of Chile) who joined the meeting as an ad hoc observer.

Hallvard Gorseth (Director of Equal Rights and Dignity, Council of Europe) welcomed participants and observers and congratulated the Committee for the successful 15th anniversary celebrations and the achievements over the past year. He conveyed the full support of the Secretariat for all aspects of the Committee's work, including in relation to the ongoing reflections to ensure that the Lanzarote Convention remains a living and forward-looking instrument. The Director highlighted that the Committee's participatory ways of working serve as inspiration in the context of the Council of Europe's recently launched [New Democratic Pact for Europe](#).

Irena Guidikova (Head of the Human Dignity and Gender Equality Department, Council of Europe) introduced herself as the new Head of Department.

Agnes von Maravić (Executive Secretary to the Lanzarote Committee) informed the Committee that, while meetings continue to be held in person, an exception was made for this session by providing a silent streaming link that allowed remote listeners to follow the discussions without the possibility of participating. She also announced that the [results of the external evaluation of the Children's Rights sub-programme](#) were published the previous day and will be shared with members after the meeting. She expressed her gratitude to Committee members who had contributed to the evaluation process.

The Committee adopted its agenda.

2. Monitoring of the implementation of the Lanzarote Convention

2.1. Compliance procedure 2nd monitoring round recommendations concerning the protection of children against sexual exploitation and sexual abuse facilitated by information and communication technologies (ICTs): addressing the challenges raised by child self-generated sexual images and/or videos

2.1.1. Examination with view to adoption of revised thematic compliance report on criminal substantive and procedural law

The Committee examined a revised version of the thematic compliance report on criminal and substantive law, which had been amended, since the previous meeting, on the basis of additional information received from the Parties and their comments. The Committee adopted the report and decided it would be published in a single document together with

the thematic report on victim services and prevention, once the latter has also been adopted.

2.1.2. Examination of thematic compliance report on victim services and prevention

Mireya García de Murcia (Legal Advisor, Lanzarote Committee Secretariat) presented the draft thematic compliance report on victim services and prevention. The Committee reviewed the draft and, in response to questions regarding the indicators for Recommendation VI-1 on information services for advising child victims of sexual exploitation and sexual abuse facilitated by ICTs, agreed that establishing confidential information services specifically dedicated to children was required to achieve at least partial compliance with this recommendation.

It was agreed that Parties would submit any comments or additional information with regard to this draft report by 15 April 2026. This timeline will ensure there is sufficient opportunity to prepare a revised draft for potential adoption at the 48th plenary meeting (2-4 June 2026, Strasbourg).

2.2. New monitoring round: Examination with view to adoption of draft questionnaire on “Screening of professionals, volunteers and other persons in contact with children”

The Committee examined a draft questionnaire which was prepared by the Secretariat on the basis of input from Committee members and field experts, including representatives of civil society. Having changed the formulation of a few questions and added a few new questions, the Committee adopted the questionnaire, thus launching a new monitoring round on the screening of professionals, volunteers and other persons in contact with children. Parties agreed to submit replies to the questionnaire by 30 June 2026 and were encouraged by the Committee to involve civil society and national human rights institutions in this monitoring round by sharing the questionnaire with them and inviting them to provide their own information or comments on Parties’ replies. The Committee also agreed to an indicative timetable for the new monitoring round (Appendix I).

2.3. Follow-up to the Implementation report on protecting children against sexual abuse in the circle of trust

The Committee took note that national workshops had taken place with national stakeholders in Armenia and Georgia to raise awareness about the recommendations made in the implementation report on protecting children against sexual abuse in the circle of trust. Similar workshops are planned to take place in Finland, Azerbaijan and Republic of Moldova in the course of 2026. The Secretariat also updated the Committee that targeted online workshops were planned to take place in the course of 2026 in partnership with ECPAT International to raise awareness about this report among their national members.

3. Capacity-building, exchange of information, experiences, and good practices

- 3.1. Thematic exchange on follow-up to paragraph 25 of the [Final Declaration](#) of the informal conference of ministers (1 July 2025, Malta), which calls on the Committee to “[e]nsure the Lanzarote Convention remains a living and forward-looking instrument addressing both current and evolving issues, with a view of upholding children’s protection in the context of an accelerating digital transformation”.

Maria José Castello-Branco (President, Portugal) informed the Committee that the Bureau had met in Paris on 11 February 2026 to discuss this process and take stock of the draft documents. The Bureau report contains additional gaps and considerations that should be taken into account by the Committee in addition to those identified in the independent report. She recalled that the Bureau also stressed the need for the Lanzarote Committee to continue addressing both physical and online manifestations of child sexual exploitation and sexual abuse in its work.

Victoria Baines (Independent expert) presented the main findings from the independent report on the Lanzarote Convention in light of emerging trends and evolving norms. The Secretariat presented the main mechanisms available to the Lanzarote Committee and their respective implications.

Ana Gomez (Head of Public International Law Division and Treaty Office), Milan Nikolić (Secretary to the Committee of Experts on Criminal Asset Recovery (PC-RAC)), and Jan Králik (Programme Manager Cybercrime Division (T-CY)) took part in a panel exchange with the Committee on various mechanisms available to amend or supplement treaties within the Council of Europe framework.

During the discussion that followed, the Committee underlined the importance of ensuring that the Convention remains technology neutral and future proof. It emphasised the importance of effectively implementing the provisions of the Convention. The following topics were raised for further consideration:

- Victims’ rights and upholding the best interests of the child, including compensation for victims, for example through victim recovery funds and making effective use of mechanisms to seize proceeds of crime, the need to protect children against repeat victimisation through the dissemination of materials through mass media and social media, strengthening support for long-term recovery for victims including into adulthood;
- Multi-disciplinary and interagency co-ordination to support victims during investigations and criminal proceedings;

- Prevention, including strengthening background screening for professionals and volunteers, education for children, and awareness raising for parents and the general public;
- Artificial intelligence, including photo-realistic AI-generated child sexual abuse material and deepfakes;
- Online grooming;
- Live streaming of child sexual abuse;
- Sexual exploitation facilitated by technologies, including paid sexual content created by children and exploitation in travel and tourism facilitated by technologies and generally in the migration context particularly as regards unaccompanied children;
- Detection and removal of child sexual abuse material, coupled with enhanced capacities to identify and protect victims;
- Legal age for sexual activities;
- Reporting and early identification of child sexual exploitation and sexual abuse, including strengthening protections for professionals who report in good faith;
- Addressing harmful sexual behaviours displayed by children;
- Jurisdiction challenges raised by technology facilitated offending;
- International co-operation in investigations and criminal proceedings including to trace and seize proceeds and criminal materials and enhance information sharing;
- Capacities for investigations, including well-being for officers and other professionals involved in investigations and responses;
- Risk assessment for offenders;
- Corporate liability and regulation of emerging technologies;
- Terminology.

In the discussion, the Committee saw a need to clarify whether potential gaps identified were due to a lack of a legal basis or rather due to lack of implementation, capacity or data.

The Committee agreed to return to this discussion at the 48th plenary meeting (2-4 June 2026) with a view to taking a position on a way forward.

3.2. Capacity building – preliminary discussion on the planned joint exchange with Cybercrime Convention Committee (T-CY) to be held on 2 June 2026

Naomi Trewinnard (Co-secretary to the Lanzarote Committee) recalled that both the Cybercrime Convention and the Lanzarote Convention address complementary aspects of the response to technology-facilitated child sexual exploitation and sexual abuse, including the criminalisation of child sexual abuse material. The exchange with the Cybercrime Convention Committee (T-CY) on 2 June 2026 will be an opportunity to discuss

emerging challenges related to AI-generated or altered child sexual abuse material, building on the Lanzarote Committee [declaration on protecting children against sexual exploitation and sexual abuse facilitated by emerging technologies](#) (2024). A concept note, developed in co-ordination with both the Lanzarote Committee and T-CY Bureaus, would be circulated after the meeting along with a proposal for a joint statement on AI-generated child sexual abuse material. Members are invited to co-ordinate with their national counterparts in the T-CY to prepare the exchange and provide feedback on the joint statement. Parties were also invited to contact the Secretariat with any national examples of practice in dealing with AI-generated child sexual abuse material that could be shared during the exchange.

3.3. 10th activity report of the Lanzarote Committee

Mireya García de Murcia (Legal Advisor, Lanzarote Committee Secretariat), introduced the 10th activity report of the Lanzarote Committee, highlighting its special significance as an edition commemorating the 15th anniversary of the Lanzarote Convention. She explained that this year's report features a dedicated introductory section reflecting on pivotal events, such as the Ministerial Conference held in Malta and the resulting Declaration, along with the art exhibition, which aimed to amplify the voices and experiences of childhood sexual abuse survivors. Furthermore, the report focuses on two major milestones: the Committee's latest monitoring round addressing the "circle of trust," and the Conference on data collection mechanisms, which took place on 18 November in Chisinau under the Moldovan Presidency of the Committee of Ministers.

Following the presentation, the Committee adopted the Activity Report. Parties were encouraged to disseminate the finalised version, once available, at the national level and within relevant institutions.

3.4. Information by members, participants and observers

3.4.1. Information by Mexico

Julio César Escobedo Flores (Deputy, Permanent Mission of Mexico to the Council of Europe) informed the Committee that Mexico remains committed to strengthening prevention, care and punishment of sexual violence against children and adolescents. A National Programme for the Protection of Girls, Boys and Adolescents 2026-2030 was currently under development which identifies specific objectives, strategies and lines of action to strengthen the protection and care of children and adolescents who are victims of violence, including trafficking and exploitation. In addition, a National Pact to end all forms of Violence against Girls, Boys and Adolescents aims to coordinate public policy in this area and enhance institutional collaboration.

3.4.2. Information by Chile

Javiera Verdugo Toro (Attorney, Head of the International Cooperation Division, Ministry of Foreign Affairs, Chile) informed the Committee that the Ombudsperson for Children and the Public Prosecutors Office continued their campaign to raise awareness about the Lanzarote Convention in Chile, including a child participation initiative to gather children's views about why Chile should join the Lanzarote Convention. She also indicated that consultations were underway among relevant public institutions regarding the Lanzarote Convention.

3.4.3. Ogerta Manastirliu, Committee on Social Affairs, Health and Sustainable Development of the Parliamentary Assembly of the Council of Europe

Ogerta Manastirliu informed the Committee of the PACE recent work on children's rights, in particular the upcoming reports on "[Violent pornography](#)" (Committee on Equality and Non-discrimination) and "[Towards a family-friendly Europe: policy recommendations for a demographic renewal](#)" (Committee on Social Affairs), and a possible future resolution on "[Children without identity in Europe and around the world: a crucial challenge for fundamental rights](#)". She further updated the Lanzarote Committee about an exchange held by the PACE Social Affairs Committee's Bureau with a French attorney on cases of child sexual abuse and other violence in public care institutions as well as the involvement of children cared for in such institutions in sexual exploitation by organised criminal networks.

The Lanzarote Committee was also informed of the PACE Social Affairs Committee's work on the humanitarian situation of women and children in the Palestinian territories.

3.4.4. L'ubica Debnárová, Policy Assistant, European Commission (online)

L'ubica Debnárová informed the Committee that the European Commission has launched the [Prevention Network](#) in January 2026 to provide expertise and advice on prevention efforts for children and offenders. The Prevention Network will meet twice a year and has been established for a four-year mandate renewable once. The Prevention Network will develop a four-year workplan.

3.4.5. Anton Toni Klančnik, European Cyber Crime Centre, specialist in AP twins, EUROPOL

Anton Toni Klančnik recalled the launch by Europol of the [Help4u platform](#) in November 2025, which compiles trustworthy national resources to guide children towards personalised information on where to seek help in a situation of online sexual abuse. 24 countries are now participating. He reiterated his invitation to the Committee members to contact him in order to have their country's resources included on the

platform and to further [raise awareness](#) about the platform. He also informed the Committee about a recent two-week advanced victim identification training for law enforcement officers organised by Europol in co-operation with CEPOL and Interpol in Budapest. In April 2026, Europol would be hosting the 18th edition of the Victim Identification Taskforce (VIDTF). The Committee members were invited to reach out to him for further information on participation.

The Committee was also informed about the completion of [Operation Alice](#), involving 23 countries and led by Germany with the support of Europol. This operation underscored the increasing need for cross-border collaboration to combat cybercrime on the dark web and the importance of long-term intelligence work in dismantling complex cybercrime ecosystems. The authorities dismantled a network comprising over 373,000 onion domains (“websites in TOR environment”), which were used to distribute illegal content and services while concealing the identities of their operators. The primary use of this platform was the sale of child sexual abuse material (CSAM). A single operator managed the network, and 440 identified customers are now under further investigation. A brief summary of Operation Cumberland and the Alamendrolejo case was also made (see the [meeting report](#) for the 45th plenary meeting for details).

Anton Toni Klančnik further updated the Committee about the ongoing trends in child sexual exploitation and sexual abuse, including sexual and financial extortion on the clearnet, live-streamed child sexual abuse with capping, self-exploitation by children, and the use of grooming to commit offences or self-harm.

3.4.6. Samantha Woolfe, Executive Director, INHOPE (online)

Samantha Woolfe addressed the Committee remotely and presented the organisation’s most recent figures. She reported that in 2025, INHOPE hotlines documented a dramatic increase in exchanged content, with over 4.7 million media files shared among hotline members, a 218% rise compared to the previous year. 1.36 million files were identified as newly reported content and over 3.2 million files were confirmed to contain CSAM (including both known and new content), an increase of 438% from the previous year. Attention was drawn to the prevalence of pre-pubescent victims (91%) and the continued high percentage of female victims (98%). She also described current trends, such as the evolving distribution channels and methods of evasion, the use of coded signals, rapid domain rotation, AI-generated images and concealed content within streaming or app-based networks.

In response to a question about the implications of the non-extension of the interim derogation to the EU ePrivacy Directive, she clarified that INHOPE hotlines do not receive reports directly from companies but operate primarily through public reporting and proactive searches by trained analysts. She explained that these core activities, along with cross-border information exchange via the ICCAM platform, will continue regardless of the derogation’s outcome.

3.4.7. Katie Burke, Policy Manager, WeProtect Global Alliance (online)

Katie Burke presented the [Global Threat Assessment 2025](#) and emphasised that rapid technological advances, such as encrypted messaging, generative AI and emerging platforms, are creating new challenges in protecting children online. She noted the complex overlap of technology-facilitated child sexual abuse with other harms and situations of vulnerability among children, including those who display harmful sexual behaviour. She called for treating online abuse as a public health priority, investing in evidence-based prevention and strengthening cross-sector cooperation and legal frameworks. The recommendations for governments call for strengthening and harmonising laws to address technology-facilitated child sexual exploitation and abuse, ensuring accessible child-friendly reporting and support services, using evidence-based approaches for monitoring and rehabilitation, establishing independent regulators and implementing national education and awareness programmes to enhance digital safety and prevention.

3.4.8. Information by World Health Organisation (online)

Sabine Van Tuyll Van Serooskerken Rakotomalala (Violence Prevention Unit, World Health Organisation (WHO)) informed the Committee that the second Global Ministerial to End Violence against Children would take place on 18-19 November 2026 in Manila, Philippines. It will focus on parent/caregiver support, safe schools and child-friendly response/support services. She invited Parties to engage with the WHO Council of Champions to End Violence against Children and to engage with National or Regional convenings in the lead-up to the conference.

4. Information about Council of Europe work relevant to the Lanzarote Committee's mandate

4.1. Debriefing from Lanzarote Committee members having participated in meetings or events on behalf of the Lanzarote Committee

4.1.1. Kristina Stepanova (Lithuania) - 7th plenary meeting of the Consultation Group on the Children of Ukraine (CGU), 3-5 December 2025, Strasbourg

Kristina Stepanova (Lithuania) informed the Committee that the discussions at the latest CGU meeting highlighted that the situation of children affected by the war remains complex and evolving, requiring sustained and coordinated responses.

A key priority identified was the improvement of early identification and support for child victims. Many children affected by serious violations, including conflict-related sexual violence, remain unidentified or face barriers in accessing specialised assistance. Strengthening multidisciplinary cooperation and ensuring timely, child-sensitive responses were seen as essential steps forward. The thematic exchange on accountability further reinforced these points. Discussions focused on how to ensure effective documentation, investigation and prosecution of crimes committed against children, while fully respecting child-friendly justice standards.

Finally, the discussions pointed out several emerging and less visible challenges, such as the impact of indoctrination, militarisation and identity-targeting on children, as well as the long-term consequences for their mental health and reintegration. The CGU's work in the near future will focus on ensuring the safe return and reintegration of children, strengthening family-based care, improving access to education, and addressing mental health and trauma-related needs.

4.1.2. Lorna Muscat (Malta) - 7th meeting of the Committee of Experts on the prevention of violence (ENF-VAE), 19-20 March 2026, Strasbourg

Lorna Muscat (Malta) updated the Committee on progress made in the preparation of the draft Committee of Ministers' Recommendation on age-appropriate comprehensive sexuality education. She highlighted that there were discussions regarding the intersections with children's exposure to pornography and child sexual abuse materials, around the notion of consent as compared to the legal definition of consent to sexual activities, additional references to gender-based violence, particularly against girls, and grooming. She drew the attention of the Committee to the different considerations applicable in relation to consent-based sexual offences under the Convention on preventing and combatting violence against women and domestic violence (Istanbul Convention) as opposed to the various definitions of sexual offences set out in the Lanzarote Convention where consent is not necessarily a constituent element. There was also discussion about sexuality education as both a tool to help children be protected against sexual exploitation and sexual abuse in their present childhood, and to prevent violence against women and children in the future as they transition into adulthood.

4.2. Updates from the Secretariat

4.2.1. Anne Kayser, Secretary of the Steering Committee for the Rights of the Child

Anne Kayser (Secretary of the Steering Committee for the Rights of the Child (CDENF)) informed the Committee that the CDENF had launched two recommendations to strengthen the protection of the rights and best interests of the child in [parental separation proceedings](#) and in [care proceedings](#) and adopted the [2nd implementation report on the Strategy for the Rights of the Child](#) (2022-2027).

She invited the Committee to co-ordinate with their national representatives to the CDENF to provide feedback on the draft Committee of Ministers' Recommendation on comprehensive, age-appropriate sexuality education, currently under development by the [Committee of Experts on the prevention of violence \(ENF-VAE\) - Children's Rights](#), which would be discussed for approval at the next CDENF meeting (2-4 June 2026). She also informed the Committee that work was on-going under the [Committee of Experts on access to child-friendly justice through multidisciplinary and interagency services \(ENF-JUS\) - Children's Rights](#) to draft a Committee of Ministers Recommendation on "multi-disciplinary and interagency services for child-friendly justice" based on Barnahus-type services with a view to its adoption by the CDENF at its plenary 25-27 November 2026. The Committee requested to receive an update on that drafting process at its 48th plenary meeting (2-4 June 2026). The CDENF expects to adopt the thematic review report on the update to the Child-friendly Justice Guidelines at its plenary 25-27 November 2026.

On 4 June 2026, the CDENF will hold a [Thematic dialogue on social media and children's mental health](#). The Lanzarote Committee will be meeting in parallel and is invited to join a film screening followed by a debate after the close of the meeting. Underlining that the on-going work on the draft recommendation on comprehensive sexuality education was partially triggered by recommendations made by the Lanzarote Committee, she invited the Committee to consider suggestions for inclusion in the next Council of Europe Strategy for the Rights of the Child.

4.2.2. Presentation of [Recommendation CM/Rec\(2026\)2 on accountability for technology-facilitated violence against women and girls](#)

Flurina Frei (Gender Equality policies, Council of Europe) presented [CM/Rec\(2026\)2 - Recommendation of the Committee of Ministers to member States on accountability for technology-facilitated violence against women and girls](#) and its [Explanatory Memorandum](#). The Recommendation, prepared by the Gender Equality Commission (GEC) and the European Committee on Crime Problems (CDPC), was adopted by the Committee of Ministers on 4 March 2026 and provides guidance to member States on strengthening accountability, prevention, and support measures in this field.

Attention was drawn to the Recommendation's emphasis on a holistic, intersectional and human rights-based approach, the regulation of technology companies, and the importance of cooperation with civil society and other stakeholders. Special focus was also placed on measures to protect and support child victims, including child-friendly services, multi-disciplinary and interagency services for child victims of sexual offences, prevention through education and digital literacy and age-appropriate safety tools. The Committee was informed of the upcoming launch event in Strasbourg on 10 June 2026 and the development of infographics and tools to support the implementation of the Recommendation.

4.2.3. Council of Europe Co-operation project on Barnahus

María Asensio Velasco (Senior Project Officer, Children's Rights Division Council of Europe) presented preliminary findings from the ["Barnahus in Spain" project](#), which involves mapping reporting systems for violence against children across Spain and its regions, and includes a comparative assessment with [Recommendation CM/Rec\(2023\)8 of the Committee of Ministers to Member States on strengthening reporting systems on violence against children and its Explanatory Memorandum](#). This analysis identified significant barriers to reporting, including myths and misconceptions, regional disparities, lack of training and resources, fear of reprisals and insufficient institutional coordination or support. While protocols and legal obligations exist in most regions, major gaps remain in awareness, training, and implementation, with 80% of cases still unreported by professionals. Respondents described feeling vulnerable and abandoned after making reports and highlighted the need for unified reporting tools, greater interagency coordination, and specialised training, particularly on digital violence and new forms of abuse.

She explained that this analysis can be replicated in other countries and invited Parties to consider it, noting the methodology typically requires about 12 months in a decentralised context, but may be shortened depending on resources. Following the presentation, an exchange took place regarding a similar process involving child participation in Sweden.

4.2.4. Presentation of the website updates

Ekaterina Malareva (Legal Advisor, Secretariat of the Lanzarote Committee) updated the Committee about the recent changes to the Committee's websites, in particular the monitoring page and the page for civil society and national human rights institutions. Further work on the website will focus on the capacity building and child participation pages. The Committee was invited to provide feedback and suggestions for further improvements.

5. Procedural matters

5.1. Election of Vice-Chair, and possible election of new member of the Bureau

The Committee elected by acclamation:

- Páll Magnússon (Iceland) as Vice Chairperson, to complete the term of office of Philippe Olivier (France) following his change of duties, and
- Alexia de Rocquigny (France) as a Bureau member of the Committee to complete the term of office of Páll Magnússon following his election as the Vice-Chairperson.

Following the election, Páll Magnússon chaired parts of the meeting.

5.2. Appointment of Lanzarote Committee Representatives to other Committees

5.2.1. European Committee on Legal Co-operation (CDCJ)

The Committee appointed Magdalena Bochińska (Poland) as its representative to the European Committee on Legal Co-operation (CDCJ).

5.3. Adoption of workplan for 2026 and 2027

Agnes von Maravić (Executive Secretary to the Lanzarote Committee) presented the new workplan which takes a results-oriented approach to provide better visibility for the Committee's achievements. The three strategic pillars of the new workplan are:

- Strengthening the implementation of the Lanzarote Convention and Lanzarote Committee adopted documents;
- Enlarging the membership of the Lanzarote Convention; and
- Ensuring the continued relevance of the Lanzarote Convention.

The Committee adopted the workplan. She also informed the Committee that the current shared space would be discontinued and that a new solution would be provided.

5.4 Adoption of the list of decisions

The Committee adopted the list of decisions.

6. Any other business

6.1. 2026 edition of the Day for the Protection of Children against Sexual Exploitation and Sexual Abuse (18 November)

Mireya García de Murcia (Legal Advisor, Lanzarote Committee Secretariat) informed that, in the last Bureau meeting, it was decided to dedicate the 2026 Day for the Protection of Children against Sexual Exploitation and Sexual Abuse to ethical media reporting on child sexual exploitation and sexual abuse cases. New media guidelines were developed in [Spanish](#) within the framework of the [European Union-Council of Europe "Barnahus Spain" project](#) and are currently being refined into an international version that could be adapted to different national contexts.

A first draft of these guidelines will be shared with the Committee and other relevant stakeholders ahead of the 48th meeting (2-4 June 2026) for comments. Additionally, a dedicated webpage will be launched by the end of May 2026. The final version of the guidelines, incorporating relevant feedback, is expected to be ready by July 2026.
