Committee of experts on human rights dimensions of automated data processing and different forms of artificial intelligence (MSI-AUT)

MEETING REPORT

1. The meeting was opened by Luukas Ilves, the Chair of the MSI-AUT. Jan Kleijssen, Director Information Society – Action against Crime, welcomed members and participants and thanked them for their continued engagement and outstanding input into the four deliverables of the Expert Committee. After the publication of the two studies, which were duly taken note of by the Committee of Ministers in September 2019, only the <u>draft recommendation on the human rights impacts of algorithmic systems</u> remains to be finalised. This important instrument, once adopted by the Committee of Ministers, will feed into the broader activities of the Council of Europe towards ensuring that AI design, development and deployment occur in line with the Organisation's standards. This remains of highest priority to member States and the Secretariat under its new Secretary General alike. In this context, Mr Kleijssen provided an update on the ongoing establishment of the intergovernmental Ad-hoc Committee on Artificial Intelligence (CAHAI), which has been tasked to work on the feasibility and potential elements of a legal framework related to AI development.

2. The agenda (Appendix I) was adopted without change. According to the list of participants (Appendix II), of the 30 members and participants, there were 12 women (40 %) and 18 men (60%).

Conclusions and decisions

3. The MSI-AUT welcomed the information about the public consultation process on the <u>draft</u> recommendation on the human rights impacts of algorithmic systems and expressed its gratitude for the over 50 sets of substantial and insightful comments that had been received from a variety of governmental and non-governmental stakeholders, including compiled comments from the European Commission DG Connect and DG Justice, as well as compiled comments from the Secretariat, members and President of the Consultative Committee on Convention 108. The MSI-AUT took note of the information and reasoning provided by the two co-rapporteurs (Joe McNamee, member elected in respect of Ireland, and Pierluigi Perri, member elected in respect of Italy) and the Secretariat regarding the integration of partially conflicting comments, with a view to presenting a well-balanced text. The Committee then went through the entirety of the text line by line, discussing and re-formulating where necessary and incorporating additional comments as provided by members and participants of the MSI-AUT.

4. The members of the MSI-AUT agreed per consensus on the draft recommendation as finalised on 24 September, with the option of sending written objections on particularly debated paragraphs by the end of the week, i.e., by 29 September. No such objection was received. Many members of the Committee suggested that regular review and reporting on the implementation of the recommendation would be of the utmost importance given the fast-evolving nature of its field of application.

Any other business

5. The fourth meeting having been the last meeting of the MSI-AUT, members expressed their satisfaction with the progress made during the two years of its mandate, underlining the importance of inter-disciplinary discussions on AI in face-to-face meetings. They further reiterated the need for ongoing vigilance and preoccupation regarding the impacts of fast-evolving technologies on human rights, democracy and the rule of law. There are growing risks and threats attached to AI development, particularly where systems become interdependent and interlocked, and governance frameworks must be adapted continuously to be effective. Experts expressed their willingness to continue their cooperation with the Council of Europe, including in the context of the CAHAI.

6. In line with established practice, the Secretariat will prepare a draft meeting report to be sent to the Chair and Vice-Chair for consideration. Thereafter, the Secretariat will send the draft report to the MSI-AUT, allowing for comments within five full working days. In the absence of comments the report will be deemed finalised and will be transmitted to the CDMSI for information. The progress of work of the MSI-AUT will be reflected in its draft documents and the reports of its meetings. Therefore, it is not considered necessary to produce abridged reports of meetings.
