The Istanbul Convention requires countries to provide appropriate protection and support to victims of violence against women and domestic violence, by putting their needs and rights at the heart of all services.

What does this mean for victims?









Access to specialist support services such as rape crisis centers, women's only shelters and counselling centers makes the recovery process for victims easier and quicker, and ensures they can access their social, economic and legal rights.

Treating victims who experienced violence against women and domestic violence with respect and empathy is essential in ensuring their recovery, facilitates their reintegration into the community, and contributes to their long-term empowerment.
