1ST ANNUAL CONFERENCE: CHALLENGES, GOALS AND FORMAT

On 2-3 December 2021, the Council of Europe Observatory on History Teaching in Europe will host its 1st Annual Conference. The event will bring together over 150 participants and allow education professionals, government representatives and other interested parties to engage in highlevel debates on the state of history teaching and related policies.

History reflects our shared past, and the Observatory intends to showcase how history education can help Europe work towards building a more open and inclusive society, one where all of our histories are heard equally. The Annual Conference will facilitate this engagement by creating a Platform, connecting different organisations and networks of experts in the field of history education during a largescale international event hosted in Strasbourg over two days.

Organised around four main plenary sessions, the Annual Conference will also provide a unique opportunity to illustrate the work and goals of the Observatory to future members and partners, as well as the work programme until 2023. Taking advantage of Council of Europe's strategic positioning in Strasbourg, the Annual Conference will involve local stakeholders, such as public authorities, schools, institutes and museums. They will organise a series of side events in line with the core programme and objectives of the conference.

ABOUT THE OBSERVATORY

The Observatory on History Teaching in Europe was set up by 17 member States of the Council of Europe in November 2020 at the initiative of the French Government. It builds on the decades-long experience of the Council of Europe in the area of history education, by offering new insight into how history is taught in the member countries. As we learn more about history through academic research, we equally want to assess how this knowledge is transmitted to the next generation and how these learning outcomes increase young people's understanding of democracy.

Given the risks of manipulating history, it is more important than ever to promote history teaching that helps to educate all young Europeans in democratic citizenship and contributes to the emergence of a common European sense of belonging.

To do this, the Observatory provides both an impartial overview of the state of history teaching in European countries and analysis on specific topics.
