16 children – including Greta Thunberg and Alexandria Villaseñor – file a landmark complaint on the climate crisis to the UN child rights committee. The 16 child petitioners, aged 8-17 years old, are from Argentina, Brazil, France, Germany, India, Marshall Islands, Nigeria, Palau, South Africa, Sweden, Tunisia and the US. "Change needs to happen now if we are to avoid the worst consequences. The climate crisis is not just the weather. It means also, lack of food and lack of water, places that are unliveable and refugees because of it. It is scary." Greta Thunberg.

In fine, not admissible because authors did not exhaust domestic remedies
