Vienna Attack 2020

→ Austria;

Prevent Prosecute

Protect

→ Protect all persons present on the territories of the member States against terrorism, providing for the security of the people and the protection of potential targets of terrorist attacks, including critical infrastructures and public spaces; provide assistance and offer support to victims of terrorism.

Council of Europe Network of Single Contact Points for the Exchange of Procedural Information regarding the Legal Standing of Victims of Terrorism

- → Facilitating the prompt and efficient exchange of information between the relevant authorities of the member State of the attack and the member State of the victim's residence.
- →Operational as of 4 November 2019.
- →Open to CoE member States and other interested and relevant States and International Organisations.
