a) Actions in the area of artistic schools and cultural education

1. Kashubian

State Music School of the I Degree in Kościerzyna

The School is the organiser of two cyclical events promoting the Kashubian language and culture. The contests promote works by Polish authors based on Kashubian folk motifs. During meetings, visitors see the Museum of Accordion and the Kościerzyna Land Museum.

- Kashubian Accordion Meetings - the XXIII edition was held in 2017.
- Kashubian Violin Presentations - the IX editions was held in 2017.

Both contests are held annually. In 2021, they were held online due to the pandemic.

- participation in meetings of Puck's Kashubian-Pomeranian Association
- participation in State ceremonies as e.g. a delegation in Kashubian folk dresses
- use of Kashubian literature and works in activities of the school choir
- use of Kashubian literature in community concerts
- workshops and showcase lessons of dances from Kashubia for participants of international education projects , e.g. Erasmus

2. Romani language

Miklosz Deka Czureja Non-Public Music School of the I Degree in Murowana Goślina

The school, run by the BAHTAŁE ROMA Foundation, received a subsidy from the Ministry of Culture, National Heritage and Sport for non-public schools with rights of public schools in the amount of PLN 388,000 on the basis of an entry in the register of non public schools holding such rights (entry no. 480/17/2007)

c) Actions implemented by State cultural institutions active in the area of literature, readership, book market and libraries

Ossoliński National Institute

The Ossoliński National Institute (ZNiO or Ossolineum) pursues statutory tasks which involve gathering, preparing and popularising library and museum collections, with particular focus on works produced in the lands of the Polish Republic and within its historical boundaries.

The table below shows the number of books and journals in regional or minority languages collected in the Ossolineum Library in 2017-2021. The table does not include publications in Lemkno or Karaim, for these languages do not have the codes used for cataloguing collections in the MARC21 format.

In 2020, Ossolineum also published a bilingual Polish-Ukrainian album by Anita Soroko titled *Rysunki artystów polskich z Muzeum Lubomirskich we Lwowie* (circulation of 700 copies). In 2017–2021, it hosted 31 visitor groups in German; the visitors participated in workshops, museum lessons and guided tours of ZNiO.

National Library

The National Library collects, develops, distributes and stores all the national publications, including works published in Poland in regional and minority languages as well as foreign materials related to Poland. The Library's collections are available to anyone older than 13 years of age. Publications stored perpetually by the National Library can also be used via *Academica*, a digital inter-library scientific book and journal lending facility, which is available at more than 3,000 libraries across Poland and does not require visiting Warsaw. In 2017-2021, the number of libraries with *Academica* terminals grew systematically due to promotional actions taken by the National Library.

Various measures for the protection, preservation and development of cultural identity of national and ethnic minorities as well as for the preservation and development of the regional language were implemented by the National Library also within the framework of *polona.pl*. The publications stored in the digital library include textual and iconographic documents evidencing the existence of national and ethnic minorities and regional languages within the Republic of Poland.

In 2017-2020, the National Library and the Jagiellonian Library implemented a project titled *Patrimonium – digitalizacja i udostępnienie polskiego dziedzictwa narodowego ze zbiorów Biblioteki Narodowej oraz Biblioteki Jagiellońskiej* under which one million of the most valuable items from the public domain were scanned, made available on *polona.pl* and archived in the National Library's Digital Repository. Under the project, the National Library digitalised and made available on *.polona.pl* a large number of various materials published by national and ethnic minorities and in regional languages (books, journals, manuscripts, leaflets, photographs, graphics, drawings, maps and musical scores).

On 1 July 2020, the National Library and the Jagiellonian Library commenced implementation of a project titled *Patrimonium – zabytki piśmiennictwa* which continues the digitalisation of special collections of both libraries and their publication through *polona.pl*. As a result, more than 140,000 digital objects will be added to the on-line resources, including publications of national and ethnic minorities and in regional languages.

National Archives in Kraków

In 2018, the National Archives in Kraków and the National Museum in Kraków collaborated within a partnership in conducting analytical examination of the Protocols of rabbinical courts established in 1779 (1780-1789) and Hebrew Tora.

4. Yiddish Language

National Library

The publications stored in the digital library include textual and iconographic documents evidencing the existence of national and ethnic minorities and regional languages within the Republic of Poland, including *inter alia* 40,484 publications in Yiddish.

State Archives in Częstochowa

In 2017, the State Archives in Częstochowa collaborated with the World Society of Częstochowa Jews and Their Descendants with its registered office in New York and the Society of Częstochowa Jews in Israel in organising a permanent exhibition *Żydzi Częstochowianie* (Częstochowa Jews).

In 2017, the State Archives in Częstochowa co-organised, together with the Jana Długosz University and the Museum of Częstochowa, a scientific conference titled *Dawne dzieje ludności żydowskiej w regionie częstochowskim* (The history of Jewish population in the Częstochowa region) during which workers of the Archives Elżbieta Surma-Jończyk and Ewa Dubaj delivered a lecture titled *Źródła do badań historii społeczności żydowskiej do roku 1939 w Archiwum Państwowym w Częstochowie* (Sources for studies in Jewish community until 1939 in the State Archives in Częstochowa).

In February 2018, the State Archives in Częstochowa, in collaboration with the World Society of Częstochowa Jews and Their Descendants with its registered office in New York and the Society of Częstochowa Jews in Israel, organised an archive lesson for a group of tourist guides from Israel. The participants became acquainted with the Archives' collection regarding the history of Jewish population in Częstochowa and visited a specially prepared exhibition of archive materials titled *Materiały archiwalne dotyczące ludności żydowskiej w Częstochowie* (Archive materials on Jewish population in Częstochowa).

State Archives in Malbork

In 2017, the State Archives in Malbork in collaboration with the Kwidzyn Cultural Centre co-organised an exhibition titled *Historia jednej rodziny. Gmina żydowska w Marienwerder* (History of one family. The Jewish Community in Marienwerder).

State Archives in Łódź

In 2017, the State Archives in Łódź collaborated with the Monumentum Iudaicum Lodzense Foundation in creating a virtual museum of Łódź Jews Heritage.

In 2017 and 2018, the State Archives in Łódź collaborated with the Museum of the History of Polish Jews Polin in digitalising, exchanging and making available digital copies of selected archive units, and in exchanging databases related to the history of Polish Jews.

In 2019–2020, the State Archives in Łódź continued the work on Litzmannstadt Getto Model, a project implemented in collaboration with the Museum of Independence Traditions in Łódź, and Lexicon of the Łódź Ghetto, a project implemented in collaboration with the University of Łódź.

In 2021, the State Archive in Łódź, in collaboration with the Jewish Community in Łódź and the Cultural Heritage Foundation, took a deposit of more than 65,000 funeral cards from the Jewish cemetery in Łódź, Poland's largest Jewish cemetery established in 1892. The materials are being digitalised and will be made available online, including on the website of the State Archives - Search the Archives.

State Archives in Opole

In 2017, the State Archives in Opole, together with the Opole Town Hall and City Library in Opole created a temporary exhibition *Judaica Opola - Ocalić od zapomnienia* (Opole Judaica - Saving from oblivion), which was available between 19 and 31 October 2017.

State Archives in Zielona Góra

In 2017, the State Archives in Zielona Góra, in collaboration with the Jewish Historical Institute in Warsaw and the Polish Historical Society, Branch in Zielona Góra, published a book by Zbigniew Bujkiewicz *Zielonogórska Gmina Żydowska 1813–1942*.

In 2018, the State Archives in Zielona Góra prepared exhibitions titled *Zielonogórska gmina żydowska w latach 1813–1942* (Zielona Góra Jewish Community in 1813-1942) and *Wyznania w regionie, region wielu wyznań* (Religions in the region. Region of many religions).

State Archives in Warsaw

In 2017, the State Archives in Warsaw signed an agreement with the Museum of the History of Polish Jews POLIN on digitalisation of Jewish genealogy sources.

The State Archives in Warsaw prepared an exhibition titled *Miasto bez rabina nie może istnieć...* (A town without a Rabbi cannot exist), which was presented at the International Congress of Jewish Genealogical Societies at Hilton Hotel in Warsaw on 6-10 August 2018.

Central Archive of Historical Records

On 7 August 2018, a seminar titled *Archiwa a żydowska Galicja* (Archives and Jewish Galicia) was held in Warsaw. It was organised by the Central Archive of Historical Records and Geshet Galicia. During the event, workers of the Archive delivered two lectures: Dorota Lewandowska - on register books, parish records and records of communities of other religious denominations from the so-called Zabuzzańskie (literally: behind the Bug River) area held in the collection of the Central Archive of Historical Records, and Sławomir Postek - on genealogical sources for the history of Galicia Jews in the records of Imperial and Royal Austrian Ministries and records of Jewish communities held by the Central Archive of Historical Records. The authors prepared an exhibition for the seminar.

National Archives in Kraków

On 15–19 July 2018, the XI Congress of the European Association for Jewish Studies (EAJS) was held in Warsaw. The Archives, in collaboration with the Jewish Studies Institute of the Jagiellonian University, prepared an exhibition titled *Dzieje krakowskich Żydów na przestrzeni wieków* (The history of Kraków Jews across centuries) based on materials from the collection of the National Archives in Kraków; the exhibition was supplemented by a catalogue published together with the Aleph Foundation. The exhibition was presented in Polish and English during the Congress at the Auditorium Maximum of the Jagiellonian University at ul. Krupnicza 33, and afterwards between 20 July to 26 October 2018 at the Archives' courtyard at ul. Sienna 16.

In 2018, the National Archives in Kraków and the Aleph Foundation for the Development of Jewish Studies in Kraków cooperated as co-publishers in the publication of the catalogue which accompanied the XI European Congress of Jewish Studies in Kraków; the catalogue was published under the title *Dzieje krakowskich Żydów na przestrzeni wieków*. Materials from the collection of the National Archives in Kraków.

State Archives in Bydgoszcz

In 2018, the State Archives in Bydgoszcz organised an exhibition titled *Żydzi w Bydgoszczy i regionie 1772-1968* (Jews in Bydgoszcz and the region 1772-1968), which was presented in the hall of the Archives' building.

State Archives in Katowice

On 4 July 2018, the V edition of a popular science conference titled *Spółeczność żydowska w Małopolsce* (Jewish community in the Małopolska region). The event was organised by the Institute of History of the Jan Kochanowski University in Kielce and the State Archives in Kielce. The meeting was held at the seat of the State Archives in Kielce, and the conference itself was organised as part of the MEMORY OF GENERATIONS celebrations. The Archives presented also two exhibitions: *Judaica w zbiorach specjalnych Pedagogicznej Biblioteki Wojewódzkiej w Kielcach* (Judaica in the special collection of the Voivodship Pedagogical Library in Kielce), a part of which was dedicated also to Irena Sendlerowa, and *Polacy ratujący Żydów w zasobie Archiwum Państwowego w Kielcach* (Poles who saved Jews. Materials from the resources of the State Archives in Kielce).

State Archives in Kielce

In 2018, the State Archives in Kielce took part in *Cymes w Kielcach, czyli śladami kultury żydowskiej* (Tzimmes in Kielce. In the footsteps of the Jewish culture), a project organised by the "Reconciliation" Foundation in Kielce; the event involved archive workshops and presentation of documents demonstrating Jewish historical and cultural heritage of the city and region of Kielce.

State Archives in Przemyśl

In 2018, the State Archives in Przemyśl, in collaboration with the Department of Jewish history and Culture of the Institute of History of the University of Rzeszów, Polish Historical Society - Branch in Rzeszów, Przemyśl Public Library, Institute of National Remembrance - branch in Rzeszów, organised a conference titled *Historia i kultura Żydów przemyskich naszym wspólnym dziedzictwem* (History and culture of Przemyśl Jews - our common heritage) to commemorate the X International Holocaust Victims Remembrance Day in the Subcarpathia region. Held on 24 January 2018, the Conference was accompanied by the opening of an exhibition titled *Żydowska Szkoła Masada w Darmstademie 1947-1948* (The Jewish Masada School in Darmstadt 1947-1948). Lea Dror Battalion, the author of the exhibition, personally presented the school's history related with the history of her family.

In 2020–2021, the Przemyśl Identification Project was organised in collaboration with Gesher Galicia, a non-profit organisation conducting genealogical research regarding the Jewish population of Galicia. The project involved identification of 577 personal indexes in registry books (births, marriages, deaths), i.e. identification of the towns which the respective indexes from the Przemyśl Archives apply to. Identification of the indexes was conducted by Gesher Galicia and voluntary workers free-of-charge. Eight tranches of results with 336 index identifications had been provided by the end of 2020, with three further tranches (121 identifications) provided in 2021.

National Digital Archives

In 2018, the National Digital Archives co-organised two exhibitions dedicated to Jews: 1. *Obcy w swoim domu. Wokół marca '68* ((Alien at their own home. Around March'68), together with the Museum of the History of Polish Jews POLIN; 2. An exhibition dedicated to Szmul Zygielbojm, together with the Jewish Historical Institute.

On 23 October 2017, the State Archives in Koszalin, in collaboration with the Koszalin Branch of the Kashubian-Pomeranian Association, organised the Commemoration of the IV Day of the Griffon. The event was held at "Archig@leria" on the premises of the State Archives in Koszalin. In collaboration with the Koszalin Branch of the Kashubian-Pomeranian Association, a lecture about the Kashubian culture was organised along with a screening of a documentary film *Na psa urok*, and a meeting with the authors of the film, which is a record of the disappearing Kashubian traditions and rituals. During the event, Joanna Chojecka, Director of the State Archives in Koszalin, delivered a multimedia presentation titled *Wątki kaszubskie w kronikach miejskich Koszalina i Sławna* (Kashubian traces in the city chronicles of Koszalin and Sławno). The number of participants was estimated at ca. 60 people. Reports from the event and interviews with the organisers were published in *Głos Koszaliński, Miasto*, koszalin.naszemiasto.pl and broadcast by Telewizja Max, Radio Koszalin (reports by Arkadiusz Wilman and A. Rawska), Radio Plus, Radio RMF Maxx and Radio Eska.

State Archives in Szczecin

In 2017, the State Archives in Szczecin, in collaboration with the Szczecin Branch of the Kashubian-Pomeranian Association, organised a screening of a fictionalised documentary film titled *Na psa urok*, showing the disappearing Kashubian traditions and rituals, to commemorate the Day of Kashubian Unity. The event, held on the premises of the Archives, was accompanied by a lecture by Prof. Zygmunt Szultka, PhD, DSc, titled *Oświata kaszubska od XVI do XIX w.* (Kashubian education between the 16th and 19th century).

Contest "Support of Archive Activities": Pursuant to *inter alia* the provisions of the Act of 24 April 2003 on public benefit activity and volunteer work (Journal of Laws of 2018, item 450, as amended), the General Director of State Archives every year announces a contest for the implementation of a public task titled "Support of archive activities". The objective of the task is to protect and make available archive materials contained in the non-State recorded archive resources, i.e. materials produced as a result of e.g. activities of social organisations. d) Actions implemented by artistic cultural institutions in the area of theatre, music, dance and visual arts

1. Belarusian language

Zbigniew Raszewski Theatre Institute

Between 26 and 31 May 2019, a review of new Belarusian theatre took place. Six performances by the youngest theatre artists from Belarus were presented: *Pieśni nad pieśniami* and *Krucjata dziecięca* (directed by Yura Divakou), *Swoi* (directed by Valentina Moroz), *Białoruś 4'33* (directed by Tatiana Arcimocich), and a concert by Kasia Kamocka, Lera Som and Ana Zhdanova. Meetings with the artists were held every day after the respective performances. Two theme debates were held: *Spirale przemocy* (Spirals of violence) and *Język współczesnego teatru białoruskiego. Emancypacja czy pole walki politycznej* (Language of the contemporary Belarusian theatre. Emancipation or political battlefield). The review was organised in collaboration with the Gdańsk Shakespeare Theatre.

2. Hebrew language

Ester Rachel and Ida Kaminska Jewish Theater – Center for Yiddish Culture

- A Hebrew language course, conducted in 2017-2021, consisted of three, and later four, groups at different levels of proficiency. The classes for each group were held once a week throughout the academic year;
- Workshops in Hebrew calligraphy *Weekend z kaligrafią hebrajską* (Weekend with Hebrew Calligraphy);
- The Jewish Theatre's repertoire includes a play in Hebrew *Dybuk* by Szymon An-ski, directed by Maja Kleczewska (in Polish, Yiddish and Hebrew).

3. Yiddish Language

Ester Rachel and Ida Kaminska Jewish Theater – Center for Yiddish Culture

The Ester Rachel and Ida Kaminska Jewish Theater – Center for Yiddish Culture is very active in popularising and promoting Yiddish and Hebrew through organising language courses, literature meetings, workshops, seminars and theatre plays in Yiddish or Hebrew.

The Jewish Theatre's repertoire includes the following plays in Yiddish:

- *Chumesz leader* by Icyk Manger, directed by Andrei. Munteanu;
- *Miasteczko Kasrylewka* by Szolem Alejchem, directed by Shmuel Atzmon-Wircer;
- *Bóg Zemsty* by Szalom Asz, directed by Andrei Muntéanu;
- *Mazl Tov* directed by Gołda Tencer;
- *Der Szturem. Cwiszyn/Burza. Pomiędzy* by Wiliam Shakespeare, directed by Damian Neć;

- *Dybuk* by Szymon An-ski, directed by Maja. Kleczewska.

Activity of the Centre for Yiddish Culture regarding promotion of Yiddish and Hebrew:

- In 2017-2021, Yiddish language courses were offered at several different levels of language proficiency. Participants either learned or improved various language skills and broadened their linguistic competencies. In addition, they were familiarised with key issues relating to the culture, history and tradition of Polish Jews;
- Yiddish song workshops with Teresa Wrońska - the workshops were held once a month in 2017-2020. The workshops resulted in, among other things, *Lomir zingen*, a podcast produced in 2021 which popularises the knowledge of Yiddish songs and artists, singers and actors who create in this language;
- The International Summer Seminar of Yiddish Language and Culture – held annually in late June/early July 2017-2021 and included Yiddish language course at four levels of language proficiency, as well as a number of theme workshops and lectures in Yiddish. The seminar was organised by the Shalom Foundation in collaboration with the Jewish Theatre's Centre for Yiddish Culture;
- Meetings as part of the *Literackie Środy* (Literary Wednesdays) cycle - organised in 2020, virtual meetings with Yiddish female poetry (and more) translated by renowned Yiddishists of both sexes. This part of the programme involved meetings dedicated to the poetry of such authors as: Debora Vogel (translation, reading: Karolina Szymaniak); Malka Lee (translation, reading: Joanna Lisek); Kadia Mołodowska (translation, reading: Bella Szwarzman-Czarnota); Celia Dropkin (translation, reading: Anna Rozenfeld); Julian Tuwim (translation, reading: Anna Szyba).
- I International Winter Mini Seminar of Yiddish Language and Culture organised by the Shalom Foundation in collaboration with the Jewish Theatre's Centre for Yiddish Culture; the event involved language courses and workshops in Yiddish at two levels of language proficiency.

National Institute of Music and Dance

In 2020, the Institute of Music and Dance started collaboration with the Foundation of the Agnieszka Osiecka Foundation of the Atelier Theatre in Sopot on a project titled *YIDDISHLAND* – a series of 12 CD albums with new Yiddish songs composed by contemporary Polish composers to the poetry of masters of the Yiddish language as well as traditional Jewish songs in new arrangements. In 2020, the Institute of Music and Dance supported the release of four *YIDDISHLAND* albums: *Bukovina*, *My Blue*, *Layla*, *Scream*, and declared further collaboration in promoting the project in 2021. The records are scheduled for release in the summer of 2021.

Witold Lutosławski National Forum of Music in Wrocław

Concerts held and planned: Bente Kahan, who sings in Yiddish - Copositions by Viktor Ullmann and songs to the lyrics by Ilse Weber (music: Bente Kahan, arrangement: Ronen Nissan), Władysław Szlengel and Mordechaj Gebirtig, as well as cabaret songs from the ghetto in Terezín (in arrangement by Ronen Nissan).

Mieczysław Karłowicz Philharmonic in Szczecin

On 27 May 2021, the concert *Libelid* performed by Ola Bilińska in Yiddish was broadcast online free of charge.

4. Lithuanian language

Mieczysław Karłowicz Philharmonic in Szczecin

On 4 April 2017, a traditional concert promoting the Lithuanian language was performed by the Trys Keturiose group.

Ujazdowski Castle Centre for Contemporary Art

In 2018 – 2019, an exhibition titled *Czekając na kolejne nadejście* (Waiting for the next advent) was presented. Organised in collaboration with Lithuania, the exhibition attracted the audience from the Lithuanian minority. The finissage of the exhibition was translated into Lithuanian.

5. German language

Mieczysław Karłowicz Philharmonic in Szczecin

On 29 October 2018, and 10 and 18 December 2018, the Education Department conducted symphonic concerts for primary school students in two languages: English and German. The participants were offered language tasks and puzzles prepared by linguists specially for the concerts.

6. Romani language

Polish National Radio Symphony Orchestra in Katowice

In 14, the Polish National Radio Symphony Orchestra and the Kraków Philharmonic Choir performed *Harfy Papuszy* (Papusza's Harps), a tonepoem composed in 1993 by Jan Kanty Pawluśkiewicz to poems by a famous Gypsy poet Bronisława Wajs "Papusza". The symphonic tonepoem depicts the world of Romani people and emphasises the sense of Papusza's poetry. The vocals were delivered in Romani, with translation into Polish displayed for the audience. The concert's solo artists were: Elżbieta Towarnicka (soprano), Iwona Socha (soprano), Magdalena Idzik (mezzo-soprano) and Andrzej Biegun (baritone)

Mieczysław Karłowicz Philharmonic in Szczecin

On 12 March 2018, a traditional concert promoting the Romani language was performed by the Čači Vorba group.

7. Russian language

Zachęta – The National Arts Gallery

In 2019–2020, Zachęta – National Gallery of Art held guided tours in Russian covering the exhibitions: *Hiwa K: Wysoce nieprawdopodobne, choć nie niemożliwe* (Highly unlikely but not impossible), *Lalki: teatr, film, polityka* (Puppets: theatre, film and politics) and *Joanna Piotrowska. Zaduch* (Joanna Piotrowska: Stench).

At the same time, the Gallery also hosted workshops in Russian as part of the exhibitions: *Rechowicz/Smaga. Koło*, *Hiwa K: Wysoce nieprawdopodobne, choć no niemożliwe*.

8. Slovak language

Zbigniew Raszewski Theatre Institute

On 3-8 September, a Slovak theatre review was held. The plays performed included: *Moral insanity* – Prešovské národné divadlo; *Dziki świat wyobraźni* – ODIVO; *Dziadzius* – Bratislavské bábkové divadlo; *Kocham cię, uważaj na siebie* – Divadlo NUDE, *Mistrz i Małgorzata* – TEATRO TATRO; *eu.genus* – Med a prach; *Amerykański cesarz* – Divadlo Pôtoň/Bratislava Theatre Institute. The performances were accompanied by interviews with the artists. Other events included a concert by the Komajota band and puppet workshops for families. An exhibition on the history of Slovak theatre, prepared by the Theatre Institute in Bratislava to accompany the review, was presented also at the Slovak Institute in Warsaw throughout the duration of the festival.

9. Ukrainian language

Zbigniew Raszewski Theatre Institute

On 2-5 November 2017, the Theatre Institute held the Review of Independent Ukrainian Theatre "Desant". The performers came from various regions of Ukraine: from Donetsk and Simferopol (Crimea) to Kiev and Lviv. The programme included documentary performances, modern dance, plays based on dramatic texts and improvisations as well as audio-performance. In addition, interviews with Polish and Ukrainian artists and theorists and two workshop sessions were held.

National Institute of Music and Dance

During the workshops *Podlasie: północ – południe* (Podlasie: North - South), organised in 2017 by the Podlasie Heritage Association as part of the Institute's own programme *Szkoła mistrzów tradycji* (The School of Masters of Tradition), songs were sung in the local Ukrainian dialect.

Mieczysław Karłowicz Philharmonic in Szczecin:

Traditional concerts promoting the Ukrainian language were performed, respectively, by the Dagadana band on 8 May 2018 and by Diczka band (Poland/Ukraine) on 8 January 2019.

10. Actions encompassing many minority languages

Witold Lutosławski National Forum of Music in Wrocław

As part of the 54th edition of the International Festival Wroclavia Cantans, concerts titled *Pieśni z lasów i pól* (Songs from forests and fields) were organised to present traditional folk singing and dialects of regional and minority groups living at present in Lower Silesia - Czadca highlanders from Bukovina, descendants of the expatriates from Podole and Subcarpathia, emigrants from Małopolska. The event was accompanied by a lecture by Henryk Dumin on the tradition of Polish folk music "*Pieśni z praezasu w przekazie współczesnym* (Primeval songs in contemporary presentation).

Arnold Szyfman Polish Theatre in Warsaw

In 2016-2018, the Arnold Szyfman Polish Theatre in Warsaw, in collaboration with the Artes Liberales Department of the University of Warsaw, organised performances in *wymysiöeryś*, or Vilamovian language, which is under threat of disappearance.

Performances presented at the Polish Theatre are in line with the programme of language revitalisation and the associated change in the attitude to the language. The actors and authors are young residents of Wilamowice, who are learning their ancestors' language and want to play an active part in efforts to preserve it.

Performances presented included: *Uf jer welt* (In the other world) in March 2017, and *Ymertihła* in November 2018.

Ujazdowski Castle Centre for Contemporary Art

- activity of the U-jazdowki Cinema – numerous films were screened in 2017-2021 which promoted use of regional or minority languages. These were films in selected languages translated into Polish. In 2021, *Wspaniała Squirt*, a film in Ukrainian, was shown as part of the film programme *Żarty żartami* (All jokes aside), and in 2019 *Ropojady*, a film in Czech, was shown during the film review *Koniec przyjęcia* (End of the party).

- In 2020, Ujazdowski Castle Centre for Contemporary Art organised five meetings in Ukrainian as part of *Ze sztuką na Ty* – a cyclical educational programme on the border of contemporary and performance - in collaboration with the Ukrainian minority.

5. Hebrew and yiddish

Emanuel Ringelblum Jewish Historical Institute

Exhibition activity:

Permanent exhibitions 2017-2021

- *Czego nie mogliśmy wykrzyczeć światu* (What we've been unable to shout out to the world) Opening of a permanent exhibition at the Jewish Historical Institute dedicated to the Underground Archive of the Warsaw Ghetto was a ground breaking event not only for the Institute, but for the entire Jewish life in Poland. The exhibition is centred around the underground group operating in the Warsaw Ghetto under the name of Oneg Shabbat (Hebr. Joy of Saturday) and the story of the unique collection they had created - from its beginning to the present day.
- Exhibition *Little Synagogue at Tłomackie* (formerly known as Bejt Tfila - a house of prayer) The exhibition is dedicated to the subject of the synagogue, its most important ritual objects and the people who work there – such as the rabbi, the cantor and the shammes. It is addressed to all people – particularly those who have never been to a synagogue or would like to broaden their knowledge of the place.

Temporary exhibitions 2017-2021

In 2017

- *Bracia Hirszenbergowie – w poszukiwaniu ziemi obiecanej* (The Hirszenberg Brothers - in search of the promised land) The first monograph presenting the works by painters Samuel, Leon and their younger brother Henryk, an architect. Samuel was regarded, together with Maurycy Gottlieb, as one of the precursors of "Jewish art" in Poland;
- *Miejsce. Tłomackie 3/5* (Place. Tłomackie 3/5 Street) Agata Madejska, Ronit Porat and Anna Orłowska produced in which they refer to selected moments from the history of The Emanuel Ringelblum Jewish Historical Institute's building and its closest

surroundings. The artwork takes as its departure point the "Blue Skyscraper" built across the Institute's building, at the very same spot where the Great Synagogue used to stand. Due to its mirror surface, the skyscraper reflects the Institute's building.

- *Nalewki. A story of a non-existent street.* – an outdoor exhibition.

In 2018

- *Shmuel Zygielbojm. I can neither be silent nor live. Temporary exhibition* - the exhibition commemorates the 75th anniversary of the suicide death of Shmuel Zygielbojm, a Bund activist;
- *RE-GENERATION. Jewish life In Poland* The exhibition consists of 73 black and white photographs - original silver gelatin prints made by Fishman himself from photo negatives. The photos cover different periods and are divided into two parts. The earlier ones taken in the 1970s and 1980s were meant to illustrate the final chapter of the history of Polish Jews. They depict small groups of people praying in destroyed synagogues, and show images of Jewish cemeteries overgrown with weeds. In contrast, the photographs taken after 2000 present the renewed Jewish congregations and organisations where jubilant young people demonstrate enthusiasm and astuteness as they engage in the renewal of Jewish religious and cultural life in the country.
- *The Free Bird. Der Frayer Foygl - Caricature from the Jewish press in independent Poland.* To celebrate the centenary of Polish independence, on 16th November the Jewish Historical Institute opened the first exhibition of satirical illustration from interwar Jewish press. The title of the exhibition refers to the vignette of one of the pioneering humour and satire magazines – "Der Frayer Foygl" (The free bird), which used the symbol of the independent Polish state – the White Eagle.
- In addition, there is an exhibition of photographs from an anonymous collection of glass negatives from the 1930s. Available on display until the end of October, the photos accompanied the exhibition *Kaduk* (held at the Archeology of Photography Foundation's Gallery) consisted of a series of prints made by the JHI's Digitalisation Lab.

In 2019

- *Światło negatywu. Obrazy z Archiwum Ringelbluma oraz z archiwum Jerzego Lewczyńskiego na nowo odczytane* (Light of the negative. Images from the Ringelblum Archive and the Jerzy Lewczyński Archive: Reinterpreted) - the exhibition shows a set of photographs collected by the Oneg Shabbat group and preserved in the Ringelblum Archive compiled in the Warsaw Ghetto. The exhibition examines the photographs thoroughly in an attempt to read them anew. Photos from the war period are presented alongside ones made in early the 19th century by Henryk Eisenbach, a pharmacist from Sanok. Eisenbach's family photos (on glass negatives) were lifted from oblivion by Jerzy Lewczyński, a deceased outstanding Polish photographer who created the idea of "archeology of photography";
- *Polenaktion, październik 1938 r. Historia wypędzonych z Niemiec* (Polenaktion, October 1938. The Story of the expellees from Germany) The history of Polenaktion is seen through the lens of biographies of individual victims. The leading motif of the exhibition are stories of six Jewish families from Berlin. The exhibition consisted of three parts in chronological order: "Life in Berlin before 1938", "Deportations in October 1938", "The history of persecution and rescue".

Co-organised exhibitions:

- *Ekspresje wolności. Bunt i Jung Idysz – wystawa, której nie było...* (Expressions of Freedom. Bunt and Yung-Yidish – an Exhibition That Never Was...) - the exhibition was presented at the Museum of the City of Łódź between 7 June and 29 September 2019. Presentation of works by two art groups "Yung Yiddish" from Łódź and "Bunt" from Poznań. The two groups planned to hold a joint exhibition in 1919-1920, but it never materialised. The exhibition presents formal similarities and differences characterising the art of individual artists of the Polish and Jewish avant-garde. JHI made available 38

exhibits, scans of the unique journal *Yung Yiddish* magazine and provided substantive support in preparing the publication.

In 2020

- *Symcha Trachter (1894–1942) Światło i barwa* (Symcha Trachter, 1894–1942. Light and Color) - the exhibition is dedicated to one of the outstanding Polish painters of the interwar period who perished in the Treblinka II extermination camp.
- *Gdzie jesteście? Rdz 3,9* (Where Art Thou? Gen 3:9) - the exhibition was opened on 16 November 2020, the date which symbolically referred to the moment when the Warsaw ghetto was closed on 16 November 1940. It was exactly 80 years ago that the city was divided into two parts by a wall, and Jews trapped in the ghetto were separated from information, their relatives and life they used to have.

Co-organised exhibitions:

- *Czy nie wiedzą o tym, że jadą na śmierć?* (Don't they know that they are going to their death?) Quotes from the writings of Emanuel Ringelblum / photographs by Alan Metnick - 2 August 2019 - March 2020. The exhibition presented present-day photographs taken by an American photographer Alan Metnick, who visited the Treblinka Museum in 2005 and 2014. Prepared by the Jewish Historical Institute and the Treblinka Museum. The Nazi German Extermination and Forced Labour Camp (1941-1944), the exhibition accompanied the 75. anniversary of the death of Emanuel Ringelblum.
- *Powtórzenia. Fotografie i archiwum Julii Pirotte* (Repetitions. Julia Pirotte's Photographs and Archive) – the exhibition was available between 24 September and 29 October. It was organised by the Archeology of Photography Foundation in collaboration with the Jewish Historical Institute as part of a two-year digitalisation project. Held at 20 Chłodna Street, the exhibition presented a set of 43 photographs by Julia Pirotte and 13 documents from her heritage in the Institute's collection.

In 2021

- *Gdzie jesteście? Rdz 3,9* (Where Art Thou? Gen 3:9)
- *Ławki* (Benches) – an outdoor installation designed by Jakub Szczęsny with an outdoor exhibition dedicated to teachers in the Warsaw ghetto. The exhibition accompanied the 22 July March of Remembrance.

Anniversary events, including *inter alia*

- the 75th anniversary of Aktion Reinhardt, a series of events - exhibitions, celebration;
- the 70th anniversary of JHI – opening of an exhibition;
- the 75th anniversary of the suicide death of Shmuel Zygielbojm – opening of an exhibition, a series of meetings and events;
- 22 July March of Remembrance - a procession which every year walks through the streets of Warsaw;
- Celebration at Treblinka, 2 August - for several years on the anniversary of the August rebellion, the JHI has organised joint celebrations for Jewish communities and everyone who wants to pay homage to the victims murdered in Treblinka's gas chambers;
- Celebrations on 8 March at the commemorative plaque dedicated to the "Kryzia" bunker, commemoration of the residents and carers of the bunker which was denounced in 1944;
- The 75th anniversary of the death of Emanuel Ringelblum;
- The 80th anniversary of the closing of the Warsaw Ghetto boundaries.

A series of popular science meetings, scientific seminars

- Weekly Thursday meetings. Held from October to June inclusively, the meetings regard broadly understood Jewish subjects. They have a diverse form – ranging from presentation of the latest publications, film screenings, to lectures on works of art from the JHI collection, to debates on difficult matters of contemporary Polish-Jewish relations. The thing they have in common, though, is participation of prominent experts and representatives of the world of culture, science and art;

- Cyclical Tuesday seminars. They take on increasingly interdisciplinary character: they are an occasion to present the latest and most long-lasting achievements of Polish researchers studying the history, culture and religion of the Jews.
- Meetings with authors on Sunday afternoons at the Tłomackie Bookstore. They are meant to popularise knowledge of the Jewish culture, tradition, language and history.

Publishing activity 2017:

- *Zagłada Żydów Sosnowca*, ŻIH 2017- Reprinted after years in a new elaboration, the text by Natan Elias Szternfinkiel allows the present-day reader to discover the first and – contrary to what the author himself announced – only book published by the Katowice unit of the Jewish Historical Commission. Szternfinkiel's book was published in August 1946. In addition to *Walka i zagłada białostockiego ghetta* by Szymon Datner, *Zagłada Żydów lwowskich* by Filip Friedman and *Zagłada Żydów żółkiewskich* by Gerszon Taffet, it was a part of the series of studies and monographs published by the Central Jewish Historical Commission, later to be replaced by *Kronika Gmin Żydowskich w Polsce – Pinkas Pojln.*
- Paweł Fijałkowski, *Warszawska społeczność żydowska w okresie stanisławowskim 1764-1795*, ŻIH 2017 - This book is a tale of the oldest history of Jews in Warsaw presented against a wider background of the history of believers of Judaism in Mazovia. The author aims at showing important problems from the history of the Warsaw Jewish community under King Stanislaus Augustus Poniatowski.
- Jan Doktór, *Słowa Pańskie*, ŻIH 2017 - Jakub Józef Frank (1726–1791) was the founder of a powerful movement, first in Judaism and then in Christianity, which called Frankism after his name. *Słowa Pańskie* is the largest and most important collection of esoteric traditions of the Jewish Messianism. It contains the teachings of Jakub Józef Frank as noted down at his demand in the last seven years of his life in exile in Brno Morawskie and Offenbach.
- Zbigniew Ryszard Grabowski, *W skorodowanym zwierciadle pamięci*, ŻIH 2017. The book was published as part of the series *Wspomnienia, relacje, dzienniki*. It presents memoirs of Zbigniew Ryszard Grabowski, a Polish chemist, and since 1965 a professor at the Physical Chemistry Institute of the Polish Academy of Sciences. In 1939-1941, Grabowski lived in Lviv, and was hiding in the territory of the General Government after the German aggression on the USSR. He joined the Home Army and fought as its soldier the Warsaw Uprising.
- *Getto warszawskie. Mapa historyczna na tle współczesnej siatki ulic Warszawy*, ŻIH 2017 - A map showing the topography of the Warsaw ghetto, key objects, streets and sites. It allows people who walk around contemporary Warsaw to orientate in the historical space of the Jewish quarter. Published in Polish and English.
- Abram Jakub Krzepicki, *Człowiek uciekł z Treblinky...*, ŻIH 2017. Krzepicki was one of the first inmates to escape from Treblinka and return to the Warsaw ghetto. He gave a poignant account of what he had seen, felt, heard and experienced to Rachela Auerbach, who belonged to a group of people gathered around Emanuel Ringelblum, a historian who organised an underground archive of the Warsaw ghetto to document the history and extermination of Jews. Rachela talked with Jakub in Yiddish, and her detailed and extensive notes of those conversations and the record of what was said miraculously survived along with other materials of the Ringelblum Archive. Meticulously translated into Polish and supplemented with an introduction by an Israeli researcher Lea Prais, they show what things people are capable of when they let evil grow.
- Gustawa Jarecka, *Ostatnim etapem przesiedlenia jest śmierć*, ŻIH 2017. *Ostatnim etapem przesiedlenia jest śmierć* is an account that was found in one of the two milk containers buried in the basement of the school at 68 Nowolipki Street in early February 1943. The author can only be presumed. Most likely, the account was given by Gustawa Jarecka (1908–1943), a pre-war translator and writer. She is indicated as the author by

Emmanuel Ringelblum, who wrote that "she wrote a bigger work about the first eviction of Jews from Warsaw". The document presents the first two days of the "eviction action" in Warsaw and the events that preceded it – the bloody night on 17/18 April 1942, when the Germans murdered 52 people in the ghetto, as well as clandestine killings that occurred in the following weeks, growing terror and increasing concern and uncertainty among residents of the ghetto. The author proceeds to give a very dynamic description of the first hours of the extermination action.

- *Biuletyn Żydowskiego Instytutu Historycznego / Kwartalnik Historii Żydów. Wybór artykułów z lat 1950–2017*, ŻIH 2017. When the first issue of the Newsletter of the Jewish Historical Institute was published, no one could possibly predict that it would become one of the most important journals dedicated to the history of Polish and Eastern European Jews, and particularly the Holocaust. Established in 1950 in Warsaw, the journal was originally meant to be a regular newsletter of the Jewish Historical Institute, but it was transformed into a scientific biannual as early as 1951. It was only in the late 1950s that a twist of various circumstances made the Newsletter of the Jewish Historical Institute the main publication of the Institute and one of the most important journals in the area of Polish-Jewish history studies. It has remained as such to this day, albeit under a new name – the Jewish History Quarterly.
- *Instytut. 70 lat historii ŻIH w dokumentach źródłowych*, ŻIH 2017. Basing on selected and chronologically structured documents from the history of the Central Jewish Historical Commission and the Jewish Historical Institute, the book aims to give a matter-of-fact picture of the Institute's complex history. An important part of the book is formed by official documents regarding the Institute's activity and fragments of accounts given by its workers. The book contains correspondence regarding the unearthing of the Ringelblum Archive, quite a few events from the Stalinist period, but also shocking words of the blind and sick Prof. Bernard Marek, a long-time director of the JHI, about the rebirth of antisemitism in the 1960s. Successive decades of ŻIH's history are told by its witnesses.
- *Letters to Oneg Shabbat*, ŻIH 2017. The Ringelblum Archive is not given to professional researchers of history only. This is how the idea of inviting anthropologists, poets, a sociologist and an essayist to read it, so that they could use their sensitivity and knowledge to bring the reader closer to that continent of experience. Two language versions – Polish and English.
- Katarzyna Person, *The Ringelblum Archive. Underground Archive of the Warsaw Ghetto, vol. 1. Warsaw Ghetto. Everyday Life. Warsaw Ghetto. Everyday Life* is the opening volume in the English edition of documents from the Ringelblum Archive – the Underground Archive of the Warsaw Ghetto. It contains seventy one scientifically elaborated documents regarding various aspects of everyday life in the Warsaw Ghetto. Attached to the book is a DVD with scans of the documents presented in the volume and stored in the collection of the Emanuel Ringelblum Jewish Historical Institute.
- Samuel D. Kassow, *Kto napisze naszą historię? Ukryte Archiwum Emanuela Ringelbluma*. The book tells the story of Emanuel Ringelblum and his group Oneg Shabbat, who employed their history researcher skills to gather and preserve for future generations documents about the persecution and extermination of Jews during the Nazi occupation.

Publishing activity 2018:

- Eleonora Bergman, Tadeusz Epsztein, *Archiwum Ringelbluma. Konspiracyjne Archiwum Getta Warszawy, t. 30, Pisma Chaskiela Wilczyńskiego*, ŻIH 2018. Chaskiel (Jecheskiel, Haskiel, Henryk) Wilczyński is one of the least known collaborators of Oneg Shabbat. His pre-war literary criticism output was forgotten, whereas his works on the history of Polish Jews in the first half of the 19th Century included in this volume have never been published.

- Anna M. Rosner, *Obraz społeczności ocalałych w Centralnej Kartotece Wydziału Ewidencji i Statystyki CKŻP*, ŻIH 2018. The Records and Statistics Department, existing at the Central Committee of Jews in Poland from 1944 to 1950, gathered information on Jews in the territory of Poland after the war, searched for missing persons and handled correspondence between people who were searching for their relatives and the survivors. The surviving archives of the RSD contain 300,000 registration cards which were to be used to compile the Central Record, a set of data on those who survived the Holocaust. The book presents demographic and statistical calculations conducted on this resource with the aim to outline the structure of the post-war community of Polish Jews and the losses they sustained in World War II.
- Rabbi Abraham Abulafia, *Księga Znaku*, tłum. z jęz. hebrajskiego i oprac. Mikołaj Krawczyk, publikacja dwujęzyczna (polski i hebrajski) ŻIH 2018 - Rabbi Abraham Abulafia (1240 – ca. 1292), a leading representative of the prophetic kabbalah, the author of comments to the Torah *Sefer Jecira* - "The Book of Formation", *More Newuchim* – "Guide for the Indecisive" as well as numerous textbooks for his own system of meditation techniques named *chochmat ha-ceruf* (wisdom of combination). His *Sefer ha-Ot* "The Book of the Sign" is the only prophecy books that has survived to our times.
- Stefan Otwinowski, *Wielkanoc*, ŻIH 2018. The phenomenon of the popularity of Otwinowski's *Wielkanoc* among a large part of the survivors in Poland just after the war is a social fact. When commenting on the performance of the play, Rachela Auerbach, a writer and worker of the Central Jewish Historical Commission, stressed that "giving the right to speak to an author of such noble intentions, and raising on stage the topic of the extermination and fight of Polish Jews, as well as the issue of Polish-Jewish relations – must be considered as a very positive event. Despite our sincere criticism towards *Wielkanoc*, it remains for us, Jews, a very comforting fact that a Polish writer summoned the best energy of his soul to depict the matters and events which form the crucial content of our national subject". The book was published as part of the series *Wydanie Krytyczne Prac Centralnej Żydowskiej Komisji Historycznej*.
- Hans-Christian Dahlmann, *Antysemityzm w Polsce roku 1968. Między partią a społeczeństwem*, ŻIH 2018. The book considers the impact on the antisemitic campaign in Poland in 1968 on the society as regards Jewish and non-Jewish Poles. How did the former experience the campaign? How did non-Jewish Poles behave and what was their attitude towards the campaign? What role was played in this context by the late consequences of the Holocaust? The publication contributes to the studies into the phenomenon of antisemitism as well as into the critical studies into communism.
- Katarzyna Person, *Policjanci. Wizerunek Żydowskiej Służby Porządkowej w getcie warszawskim*, ŻIH 2018. The Jewish Order Service in the Warsaw ghetto, also known as the ghetto police, earned a bad name by assisting the occupier during deportations of Jews to Treblinka in the summer of 1942. Well documented and objective, the book describes the formation of the service and how it was dragged into helping the Germans in the genocide. A must-read publication for all those who are interested in the complex and difficult issue of collaboration during the Nazi occupation of Poland.
- Zbigniew Ryszard Grabowski, *W skorodowanym zwierciadle pamięci*, ŻIH 2018. The book was published as part of the series *Wspomnienia, relacje, dzienniki*. It presents memoirs of Zbigniew Ryszard Grabowski, a Polish chemist, and since 1965 a professor at the Physical Chemistry Institute of the Polish Academy of Sciences. In 1939-1941, Grabowski lived in Lviv, and was hiding in the territory of the General Government after the German aggression on the USSR. He joined the Home Army and fought as its soldier the Warsaw Uprising.
- Paweł Śpiewak, *Wieczny Hiob*, ŻIH 2018. In his book, Prof. Paweł Śpiewak tells the reader how Jewish thinkers have read the Book of Job since Middle Ages to the present day.

Meeting and confronting their reflections may well be one of the most fascinating seminars on the human spirit.

- Andrzej Żbikowski, *Żydowski Instytut Historyczny. 70 lat badań nad dziejami polskich Żydów*, ŻIH 2018. The book attempts to assess the seven decades of the scientific output of the Jewish Historical Institute, as well as its position. By providing a broader context, the author presents a number of important information, including very detailed data regarding the history of the Institute, in a fresh light.
- Anna Landau-Czajka, *Wielki „Mały Przegląd”. Społeczeństwo i życie codzienne w II Rzeczypospolitej w oczach korespondentów „Małego Przeglądu”*, ŻIH 2018. In 1926, the most popular Polish-speaking Jewish daily - Warsaw's *Nasz Przegląd* - invited Janusz Korczak to collaborate with it. This is how *Mały Przegląd* - the only journal whose authors were mainly very young people, children and teenagers - came to existence. There is no other, bigger set of so varied accounts about all areas of life which would be written down by the youngest citizens. The children's and teenagers' 's vision of the world or events reported by them are often different than what readers can find in adult writing.
- Mendel Balberyszski, *Likwidacja getta wileńskiego*, ŻIH 2018. The book by Mendel Balberyszski was first published in later 1946 in circulation of 5,000 copies. The main character of this moving tale about the final period of existence of the Vilnius ghetto is not only the narrator, whom we can identify with the author – a participant of and witness to the events describes, but also the community in whose life he actively participated and with whose fate he and his closest relatives were bound. Balberyszski embarked on noting down his memoirs shortly after the liberation from the German occupation, presumably while still in Vilnius in 1944 or in early 1945
- *Archiwum Ringelbluma. Konspiracyjne Archiwum Getta Warszawy, t. 29a, Pisma Emanuela Ringelbluma z bunkra*, oprac. Eleonora Bergman, Tadeusz Epsztein, Magdalena Siek, ŻIH 2018. From the formal point of view, the documents contained in this volume are not a part of the Ringelblum Archive, but they represent important continuation of Ringelblum's writings from the ghetto and so well supplement the latter that the necessity to include them in this volume never raised any doubt whatsoever.
- *Archiwum Ringelbluma. Konspiracyjne Archiwum Getta Warszawy, t. 29, Pisma Emanuela Ringelbluma z getta*, oprac. Joanna Nalewajko-Kulikov, ŻIH 2018. Volume 29 of Emanuel Ringelblum's writing from the ghetto contains a new translation of all to-date identified notes by Emanuel Ringelblum written between September 1939 and January 1943, and is equipped with e new critical apparatus. The editorial perspective assumed presents Ringelblum's notes as an everyday writing practice and sets them in the context of other materials from the Warsaw Ghetto Archive, for which they were an inspiration and a starting point.
- Zofia Trębacz, *Nie tylko Palestyna, Polskie plany emigracyjne wobec Żydów 1935–1939*, ŻIH 2018. Although many readers are familiar with the slogan "Jews to Madagascar!", we felt that we lacked a comprehensive presentation of the idea of reducing the Jewish population by means of mass emigration, a trend that was gaining on popularity under the Second Republic of Poland. The book by Zofia Trębacz fills this gap with her excellently documented material, showing the sources of such idea, what they meant in the practice of the governments at the time, and how the general public responded to them. Thanks to the extensive research in archives in Poland and abroad, as well as an impressive library query, the author's theses are solid and the picture of the events broad and deep.
- *Nalewki. Opowieść o nieistniejącej ulicy/Nalewki: Stories from a Non-Existent Street*, red. Agnieszka Kajczyk, ŻIH 2018. The album dedicated to the history and importance of Nalewki Street – the most famous, almost legendary Jewish street, a beating heart of the Northern District. In addition to numerous archive photographs from the collections of institutions in Poland and abroad, the album contains a series of essays on history,

culture and anthropology written by renowned experts: specialists in Warsaw history, researchers of the Yiddish culture and scientists studying the history of the Warsaw ghetto.

- Jasia Reichardt, *Piętnaście podróży z Warszawy do Londynu*, tłum. Joanna Błachnio, ŻIH/Muzeum Sztuki w Łodzi 2018. The fifteen journeys said in the title took a total of six years (1940–1946). Fourteen were taken in Poland. Distances vary. Some are very small (two bus stops, a 20-minute walk), while some other are longer – much longer. At the time we meet her, the traveller is seven years old. During the travels, the girl loses her home, family, name and hair – and finally also her fear. In those difficult times, there are two things which help the character in her journeys: a few lessons taught by her parents – and tremendous luck which never deserts her.
- *The Ringelblum Archive. Underground Archive of the Warsaw Ghetto, vol. 2. Accounts from the Borderlands, 1939–1941*, oprac. Andrzej Żbikowski, ŻIH 2018. In the second volume of the Ringelblum Archive, published in English, the reader will find testimonies from the years 1939–1942 documenting the situation on those territories of the Second Republic of Poland which between September 1939 and the German attack on USSR on 21st June 1914 were under Soviet occupation, and later under German rule. It concerns a bit over 50% of entire territory of pre-war Poland, inhabited by around 40% of Polish Jews. After September 1939, additionally at least 250 thousand Jews were staying on those territories. Predicting rising anti-Jewish repressions, they fled from Polish territories remaining under German occupation. Testimonies collected in the Warsaw Ghetto by the team of Emanuel Ringelblum in the majority of cases are being published for the first time.
- *Kultury Żydów, t. 1: Śródziemnomorskie początki*, red. David Biale, tłum. Mirosław Wójcik, ŻIH 2018. A collection of essays by world-class researchers concerning the beginnings of the Jewish culture.
- *Archiwum Ringelbluma. Konspiracyjne Archiwum Getta Warszawy, t. 35. Żydzi w Warszawie. Część druga: 1527–1795*, oprac. Paweł Fijałkowski, ŻIH 2018. Ringelblum started his work on the monograph on the history of Jews in Warsaw as early as during his student times, and that period was summarised in his doctoral dissertation, defended in 1927 and published under the title *Żydzi w Warszawie, cz. I. Od czasów najdawniejszych do ostatniego wygnania w r. 1527* (Warszawa 1932). Most likely, Ringelblum was already working on the second part of the monograph covering the period from 1527 to 1795. Unfortunately, the author's difficult life situation caused that took longer and longer to write. At the outbreak of the war, the text remained in manuscript and was hidden in February 1943 together with other documents forming the second part of the Oneg Shabbat Archive.

Publishing activity in 2019:

- Dagmara Budzioch, *Zdobione zwoje Estery/The Decorated Esther Scrolls*, t. 1 i 2, ŻIH 2019. This two-volume book on the Scrolls of Esther from the collection of the Jewish Historical Institute is a unique project, both as a research and publishing venture. To describe the tradition of the decorated Book of Esther, the author studied some 300,000 manuscripts held private and public collections across the world, including in New York, London, Tel Aviv and Zurich. She used that research as the background for the scrolls from the archive of the Jewish Historical Institute, thus producing a pioneer – both in Poland and abroad – summary of sources of this type. The richly illustrated work is the first one to offer the general public that valuable and diverse material.
- Heniek Fogel, *Dziennik*, oprac. Adam Sitarek, Ewa Wiatr, ŻIH 2019. Heniek Fogiel's diary written in the Łódź ghetto from the first months of 1942 to 7 May 1944. The author had an unusual gift of observation and described in detail both his family situation and the reality of the ghetto – commenting the circulated information, gossips, as well as the

growing anxiety. Especially valuable are his accounts about what the Jews knew about the situation outside the ghetto walls.

- *Rok za drutem kolczastym*, oprac. Adam Sitarek, Ewa Wiatr, ŻIH 2019. The publication's main element is a study prepared by an unknown worker of the Jewish administration of the Łódź, written most likely in April 1941. Written on 31 pages, it contains a description of key moments from the first year of the existence of the ghetto based on announcements issued by the Head of the Jewish Council of Elders Chaim Mordechaj Rumkowski. The original text of the study is complemented by an introduction and comments by leading historians of the "closed housing district" in Łódź: dr Ewa Wiatr and dr. Adam Sitarek. The second part of the book contains a collection of announcements issued in the Łódź ghetto virtually until the very end of its existence (until August 1944). It is a unique material that illustrates the policy of managing the Jewish district pursued by Rumkowski. The announcements were published in the form of posters and distributed among institutions subordinated to the Council in the form of a typescript in Polish and Jewish, and beginning in 1942 also German. They represented one of the main channels of communication between the Council and residents of the ghetto.
- Jan Doktor, *Bracia, obcy czy współobywatele?*, ŻIH 2019. In his book *Bracia, obcy czy współobywatele*, Jan Doktor synthetically and acutely, based on various sources, presents debates held by Christians in various parts of Europe about Judaism and its believers. Beginning with the reasoning by St. Augustine and ending with projects of Jewish emancipation at the turn of the 18th and 19th century, the author draws from that rich resource and picks key, sometimes little known, cases - e.g. the Barcelona Dispute of 1263 or writing by Marcin Czechowic, a Polish arianist. The book's special value lies, on the one hand, in presenting debates on Judaism in the context of the developing culture of print and, on the other, showing discussion and initiatives taken in Poland against the background of European debates.
- Gerszon Taffet, *Zagłada Żydów Żółkiewskich*, oprac. Natalia Aleksion, ŻIH 2019. *Zagłada Żydów Żółkiewskich* by Gerszon Taffet was designed as a kind of a monument to the Jewish Community in Żółkiew near Lviv. The book remains to this day "a valuable contribution to the history of the Jewish martyrdom". Taffet meticulously collects fact, records the names of the persons involved in the events he portrays, and provides an account about the emotions that accompanies various characters.
- Katarzyna Person, *Dipisi. Żydzi polscy w amerykańskiej i brytyjskiej strefach okupacyjnych Niemiec 1945-1948*, ŻIH 2019. The monograph describes the history of Polish Jews staying in the US and British occupation zone in Germany right after the war: displaced persons (or DPs) and those who, after leaving Poland, were awaiting further travel in camps for immigrants.
- Ch. Kapłan, *Dziennik 1939. Megila życia*, tłum. i oprac. Blanka Górecka, ŻIH 2019. The first volume of *Dziennik* kept by Chaim Aron Kapłan in 1933–1942. Translated and elaborated by Blanka Górecka, the text initiates the first full edition of Kapłan's memoirs in Polish.
- *Wolny ptak. Humor z prasy żydowskiej w Polsce niepodległej*, oprac. Agnieszka Żółkiewska, ŻIH 2019. The first, and to date largest, two-volume album which contains satirical drawings and texts from Jewish press published in Poland in 1919-1939 and scattered around libraries across the world today. Once a source of entertainment for fans of Jewish satire and sense of humour, they have become a historical source which can tell us much more about the past than traditional accounts.

Mirosław Wójcik, ŻIH 2019 In the second volume of *Kultury Żydów*, Professor David Biale and a team of researchers representing various scientific disciplines and centres present further history of development of Jewish cultures in the complex process of, on the one hand, adaptation to non-Jewish cultures, and, on the other, resistance against them, proving once more that there are many Jewish cultures rather than just one. The subject of the essays,

which are intricately constructed analyses of the tangible and spiritual heritage, are the histories of Jewish communities living in the diaspora from the 7th to the 18th century, including Sephardic Jews in the Iberian Peninsula in late Middle Ages, Jews living in the the Polish Commonwealth of Two Nations, and Italian Jews at the start of the modern era.

This beautifully designed and published book presents a moving account of a two-year wartime separation of a pair of outstanding artists — Franciszka and Stefan Themerson. - Museum lesson *Kaszuby wczoraj i dziś* (Kashubia - the past and the present) - an opportunity to discover the rich Kashubian culture: traditional farming, cooking and furniture of old-time rustic chambers.

- Every year, as part of the Summer Ethnographic Fair, the museum garden of the Ethnography Branch of the National Museum in Gdańsk hosts theme days which present the region's culture and art, e.g. the Kashubian day, the Traditional Crafts Day, the Folk Artist Day. The events present regional arts, e.g. original embroidery used in both traditional and modern design, sculptures and traditional folk handicrafts as well as Kashubian musical instruments and clay ceramics from a Pomeranian pottery workshop. The visitors can buy regional publications and taste traditional dishes. There are also presentations of traditional crafts: braiding, glass painting, pottery, sculpting, making paper flowers. Traditional song and dance groups are invited for each event.

National Museum in Gdańsk – Branch: National Anthem Museum in Będzin

The National Anthem Museum's permanent exhibition *Losy Mazurka Dąbrowskiego* (The history of the Dąbrowski Mazurka) presents the lyrics by Hieronim Derdowski *Kashubian March* in the Kashubian language together with a brief description. The history of this song, which was initially sung to the music of "Poland is not yet lost", is presented also on the Museum's Facebook profile on the occasion of various anniversaries related to its author.

The Museum's store offers souvenirs and publications in Kashubian about every corner of Kashubia.

Józef Piłsudski Museum in Sulejówek

Beginning in 2003, the Józef Piłsudski Museum in Sulejówek organises the social campaign *Mamy Niepodległą!* (We have Independence) and encourages the public to celebrate the National Independence Day in an optimistic manner. The leading motif of the previous edition, marking the 100th anniversary of Polish independence, was the wire message which notified the rebirth of Poland. Signed by Józef Piłsudski, the text of the message, which had been sent on the night of 18/19 November 1918, was built in graphically also in the face of one of the post cards (it was the only time in the campaign's history when not only "an image" was presented). An extra batch of postcards with the text in Kashubian was printed especially for the campaign. The post cards were available at distribution points across Pomerania. At the Museum's invitation, the task of translating the text of the message was accepted by the Kashubian-Pomeranian Association.

On 7 March 2019, the temporary seat of the Polish History Museum hosted a meeting dedicated to the Petersburg intellectuals during Stalin repressions, with a particular focus on intellectuals of Polish descent. Lectures were delivered by: Tatiana Pozdniakova, Curator of the Anna Achmatova Museum in Saint Petersburg, and Julij Rybakov, an author, painter, human rights defender, and former Deputy for the Russian Duma. The meeting was interpreted into Russian.

A debate -*Od Białoruskiej Republiki Ludowej do Rygi. Kwestia niepodległości Białorusi 1918-1921* (From the Belarusian People's Republic to Riga. The matter of Belarusian independence 1918-1921) (2021)

How is the Belarusian People's Republic remembered? Was there an opportunity to establish a stable and independent state between Poland and the Soviet Union? How much does the memory of the Belarusian People's Republic and Belarusian hopes affect Belarusians' identity? These questions were discussed by historians and experts in historical policy during this online debate organised by the Polish History Museum. The debate was interpreted into Russian.

A conference - *The burden Brzemię zwycięstwa. II wojna światowa i jej skutki z perspektywy 75 lat od jej zakończenia* (The burden of victory. World War II and its effects from the perspective of 75 years its end) (2020)

Do nations of Western Europe remember the war the same as people in the central and eastern part of the continent? Who shapes the picture of events of World War II: historians or authors of popular culture? Answers to these and other questions were sought by the participants of the conference *Brzemię zwycięstwa. II wojna światowa i jej skutki z perspektywy 75 lat od jej zakończenia*. Speeches made during the conference were translated into Russian.

A film - *Kłamstwo katyńskie* (The Katyn Lie) (2020)

Katyn Families - i.e. the wives, children and grandchildren of the murdered officers who have represented a single community for many years - have played an important role in preserving the memory of the truth about Katyn. How the murdered officers' closest relatives faced the lack of truth about the crime and what they felt for long years is the subject of the documentary film *Kłamstwo katyńskie* which the Polish History Museum has offered through its YouTube channel since 13 April 2020. ***Kalendarium Niepodległości* (The Calendar of Independence) (2018)**

Kalendarium Niepodległości provides insight into that extraordinary time of struggle, fought not only on battlefields and in the privacy of diplomatic offices, but also in everyday life of ordinary people, who manifested the Polish identity and made efforts to protect their own culture without regard to repressions. Since the efforts to revive the State had taken much longer than military operation of the Great War (1914-1918), the Calendar shows events from the War's outbreak until 1921, when the Polish borders were finally decided. The Calendar was prepared in collaboration with the Polish Institute in Kiev, and is available in *inter alia* Ukrainian

An exhibition *Konstytucja 3 Maja* (Constitution of May 3) (2021)

The visitors are offered an opportunity to see what influenced the shape of the Government Act. The exhibition also presents the pride and joy that accompanied the establishing of the pioneer legal act, enthusiastic reactions by the foreign press, and the strength inspired by the memory of the Constitution of May 3 in residents of the old Republic in the dark days of partitions and under the communist rule after World War II. The scenario of the exhibition in Polish was translated into *inter alia* Ukrainian. The Ukrainian version of the exhibition was supplemented by additional threads relating to the history of Ukraine.

A book by Richard Butterwick *Konstytucja 3 maja. Testament Rzeczypospolitej Obojga Narodów* (2021)

A book by an outstanding researcher of the 18th century of the Republic of Poland. It presents the most important events of the epoch and provides a thorough analysis of the circumstances of adopting the Government Act in May 1791, as well as the document itself. The author discusses also the importance of the Constitution to successive generations stretching up until the 20th century. The book was published in Ukrainian.

The Orthodox Church Art Department (a permanent exhibition) has information boards in Ukrainian about the collection and history. The Department has employed 2 members of staff who speak Ukrainian.

Museum of Modern Arts in Warsaw

Reaching the Ukrainian-speaking community is among key priorities of the Museum of Modern Arts in Warsaw. The Museum offers a number of events for adults and families from Ukraine. Active since 2020, the *Blyzkist* (Closeness) group aims at working for the Ukrainian, Russian and Belarusian communities as well as other communities using either of these three languages. Its actions are designed taking into account the needs of those communities. In 2021, the Museum organised residence for the Ukrainian community in Warsaw, also conducted in that language. In all, more than 70 events (debates, workshops, a film, guided tours) in Ukrainian took place in the reporting period. Since 2018, i.e. when the Warsaw Under Construction Festival *SĄSIĘDZI / СУСІДИ* dedicated to the Ukrainian community in Warsaw took place, the Museum has been making efforts to add notes in Ukrainian to all its printed matter.

A trilingual (Polish, English, Ukrainian) outdoor exhibition titled *Hetman - a summary of the Year of Hetman Stanisław Żółkiewski*. The exhibition presents various stages of life of hetman Stanisław Żółkiewski, one of the key commanders in the history of the Republic of Poland. The exhibition board present Żółkiewski's childhood and family life, battles fought, political career, death and funeral, a finally heritage - both tangible and intangible.

In 2021, the exhibition was presented at the following locations:

- 1) March-April 2021 the space in front of the NCK Kordegarda Gallery (Warsaw).
- 2) April-May 2021 the Wawel Roal Castle.
- 3) May-June 2021 the courtyard of the Kraków Bishops' Castle (National Museum in Kielce).
- 4) June-July 2021 the courtyard of the Sandomierz Royal Castle (Regional Museum).
- 5) from July 2021 the Municipal Cultural Centre in Lubaczów (as part of the Borderland Heritage Festival).
