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## Learning from Practice



#### Lessons Learned

- Digital inclusion and participation can support children to realize the full range of their rights. There are more chances to meaningfully consult children with disabilities or in a vulnerable situation via the digital technologies, they are more likely than other kids to be exposed to online harm. Both adults and children need to be educated to address a wide range of online risks.
- "One size fits all" approach doesn't work when engaging survivors of sexual exploitation and abuse.  $\geq$ Every child's recovery process is different. There is no meaningful and ethical participation of the survivors without recovery.
- As the barriers to inclusive and impactful children's participation are long term and structural, it will  $\geq$ take real commitment, imagination and resources. But, it can be done!
- Strong adults' commitment to feedback and follow up about how children's participation influenced outcomes is a very important part of meaningful collaboration with children.
- Child participation process is as important as its outcomes. It is even more valid for vulnerable children and young people.

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
