


#### **Experiences of unwarranted interference in the last 3 years**











## How to combat hate speech?






#### Restrictions are necessary



- > Hate speech proliferates;
- It inhibits individuals and groups;
- Fighting hate speech may involve restrictions;
- Restrictions must be appropriate.



### Online environment is challenging



Online environment makes it difficult to assign liability and develop adequate responses:

- ✓ Hateful contents may either go ignored or go viral;
- ✓ **Instant publishing** of online platforms allows hate speech to reach millions;
- ✓ Harmful speech may also travel across borders and virtual spaces.



#### Further regulation is a must



Hate speech that passes the threshold of criminal liability should be sanctioned both offand online.

**Regulatory approaches** to address hate speech are developed by:

- National authorities;
- The EU (e.g., via the Digital Services Act);
- Internet intermediaries themselves.



#### All actors should act



- ➤ The <u>Additional Protocol</u> to the Council of Europe Convention on Cybercrime concerning the **criminalisation of acts of a** racist and xenophobic nature committed through computer systems;
- Recommendation regarding the role and responsibilities of internet intermediaries.



#### New guidelines are in the making



**Expert Committee on Combating Hate Speech** (ADI/MSI-DIS) is
drafting a recommendation to
combat hate speech, including:

- a definition of hate speech;
- levels of severity and corresponding online and offline liabilities;
- best practices;
- key actors.



### Better protection is expected



**Better protection of victims** of hate speech requires:

- better strategies and action plans to monitor and analyse hate speech;
- improved national and international coordination.

Expert Committee on Freedom of Expression and Digital Technologies (MSI-DIG) is developing guidance on self-regulatory and co-regulatory mechanisms for the restriction or moderation of illegal or harmful content.



### Pandemic spins hate speech



The study "The impact of the sanitary crisis on freedom of expression and media freedom", reveals:

- > a new wave of hate speech;
- further polarisation of public discourse;
- targeting already marginalised populations;
- targeting "pandemic workers": journalists, whistle-blowers, human rights defenders, medical and health care professionals.



#### Journalists' protection to improve



# The book A Mission to Inform - Journalists at Risk Speak Out:

- Reveals the chilling effect hate speech has on journalists and other media actors;
- Presents powerful testimonies of media professionals targeted by hate speech;
- Emphasises the alarming impact that hate speech can have on women journalists;
- Provides recommendations.



#### Prevent misuse of hate speech laws



Abuse of hate speech laws can prevent contributions to public debate, intimidating and silencing conflicting opinions – or merely diverse point of views.

# Recommendation on the protection of journalism notes:

malicious use of the law and legal process can become an effective means of pressure of journalists.



#### Conclusions



- ✓ More discussion on hate speech is necessary;
- ✓ Better Europe-wide cooperation and more effective solutions are required.

The Conference of Ministers responsible for Media and Information Society will address the radical changes in the media and information environment brought on by massive digitalisation (10 - 11 June 2021).
