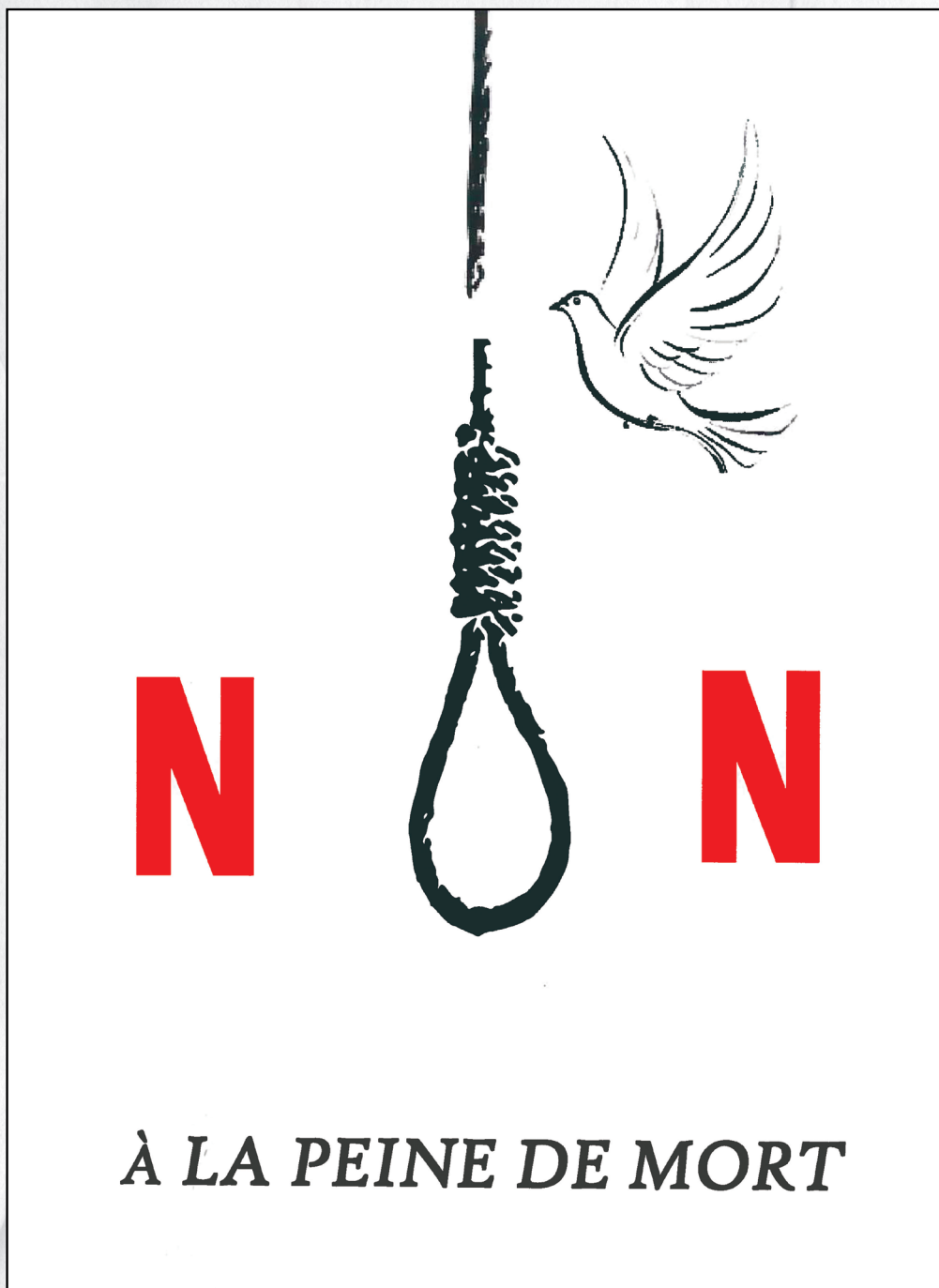

## THE ORGANISERS

The rejection of the death penalty is one of the Council of Europe's founding principles: it is legally abolished in almost all member states, and no death penalty has been carried out in the geographical sphere of the Organisation for more than twenty years.

The abolition of capital punishment is a universal trend. Unfortunately, in 2023, 89 countries still practice it or uphold it in their legal texts.

No right, no democratic advance is ever acquired for ever. Human rights are the result of centuries of struggle by women and men for dignity. Their universality and respect depend on the capacity of each generation to appropriate and develop them. The death penalty is an attack on human dignity and justice. Its existence constitutes a serious attack on a universal culture of human rights everywhere. The resurgence of a pro-death penalty discourse is disturbing and must be fought.

It is with the aim of **creating a network of young ambassadors**, who will continue the fight towards abolition throughout the world, that the Council of Europe, Together against the death penalty and the German Coalition for the abolition of the death penalty, with the support of the Permanent Representation of France to the Council of Europe, and the backing of the Franco-German Office for Youth, are organising the second edition of this training/meeting, based on an idea from the French Ministry of Europe and Foreign Affairs. This training event is thus intended to be repeated and to gradually expand in terms of both the number of participants and their geographical origin.

## THE COUNCIL OF EUROPE



The Council of Europe and its 46 member states have been creating a death penalty-free zone for almost a quarter of a century, with the last execution on its territory taking place in 1997.

In the early 1980s, the Council of Europe became a pioneer in the abolition of capital punishment, considering it to be a serious violation of human rights. The organisation's Parliamentary Assembly has gradually persuaded governments to help Europe become the first region in the world to ban the death penalty once and for all. A ban on the death penalty has also been a precondition for accession since the 1990s.

In 1983, the Council of Europe adopted the first legally binding instrument providing for the unconditional abolition of the death penalty in peacetime: Protocol No. 6 to the European Convention on Human Rights (ECHR). This text has now been ratified by all 46 Member States.

In 2002, the Council of Europe adopted Protocol No. 13 to the ECHR concerning the abolition of the death penalty in all circumstances, i.e. also in times of war or imminent threat of war. Reservations and derogations from the Protocol are not possible. The Protocol entered into force on 1 July 2003. To date, it has been signed and ratified by 45 Member States.

## ECPM (TOGETHER AGAINST THE DEATH PENALTY)



ECPM (a non-governmental organisation established in France since 2000) works to combat the death penalty worldwide. The association promotes the universal abolition of the death penalty through advocacy programmes with public authorities, the strengthening of abolitionist civil society, the creation and dissemination of publications, and support for death row inmates and their families.

ECPM ([www.ecpm.org](http://www.ecpm.org)) brings together abolitionists in order to increase their effectiveness and accelerate the movement towards universal abolition of the death penalty. The association is at the origin of the World Congresses against the death penalty, which it organises every three years (Strasbourg 2001, Montreal 2004, Paris 2007, Geneva 2010, Madrid in 2013, Oslo in 2016, Brussels in 2019 and Berlin in 2022) in the presence of several thousand abolitionists from all over the world (civil society, politicians, lawyers, journalists, artists, students, etc.).

ECPM develops programmes to support the strengthening of local partners in many non-abolitionist countries, mainly in the regions of: North Africa, Central Africa, Southeast Asia.

## THE GERMAN COALITION TO ABOLISH THE DEATH PENALTY



The Initiative gegen die Todesstrafe e.V. (German Coalition to Abolish the Death Penalty) has been campaigning for the universal abolition of the death penalty since 1997.

The German Coalition is guided by the 1948 Universal Declaration of Human Rights, the International Covenant on Civil and Political Rights and its additional protocols, and other human rights conventions. The German Coalition believes that the death penalty is a horrific form of punishment that violates human dignity. The members of the German Coalition respect the condemned person as a person without accepting his or her crime.

GCADP's work focuses on detailed educational work, non-partisan political engagement and support for prisoners.

**All the organisers place young people at the heart of their action, because they are essential actors of change for themselves and bearers of evolution for society. Through an inclusive and participatory approach, offering spaces for engagement, ECPM aims to enrich their knowledge on human rights and values related to global citizenship, so that they are better able to develop autonomous thinking and to mobilise themselves on these subjects, as active citizens guaranteeing the fundamental rights!**

Education program Manager, Together against the death penalty

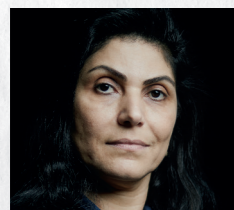

Advocate for the universal abolition of the death penalty, former death row prisoner, Lebanon

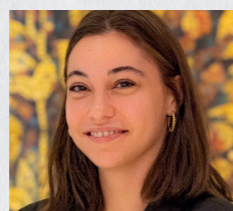

her release, Antoinette Chahine, who has become a leading human rights defender, has "taken up her pilgrim's staff to testify tirelessly" against injustice, torture and the death penalty, both internationally and in her own country, Lebanon. On 24 June 2024, it will celebrate the 25th anniversary of its liberation.

Content production Officer, Prison Insider

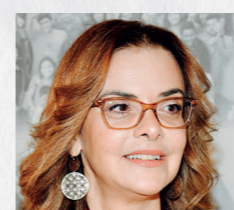

### TANYA AWAD GHORRA

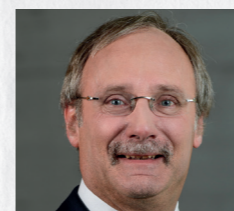
Journalist, coordinator of the educational trainings in the Lebanese National Campaign to Abolish Death Penalty, Lebanon

Carolyn Hoyle is Director of the Death Penalty Research Unit and Professor of Criminology at the University of Oxford. Carolyn has been researching and teaching on the death penalty for 20 years. She works closely

with the Death Penalty Project on research that explores the rationales for retention, not least deterrence and public opinion, and uses that research to engage with governments and policymakers and to support civil society organisations in their efforts to bring about abolition or progressive restriction of capital punishment. She is co-author of 'The Death Penalty: A worldwide perspective' (2015, 5th edn.) and many other publications on the death penalty. Her work focuses primarily on Southeast Asia and on Commonwealth countries across Africa and the Caribbean and she is currently researching the death penalty for drugs in Indonesia and neighbouring countries and the challenges to abolition in countries that retain the death penalty but do not execute prisoners.

### PARVAIS JABBAR

Co-founder and co-executive director of the foundation Death Penalty Project

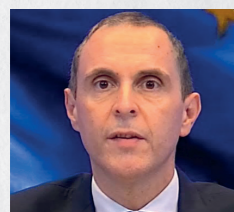


Parvais Jabbar is Co-Founder and Co-Executive Director of the Death Penalty Project, a UK legal action charity that has for 30 years conducted litigation, capacity building and research on the death penalty. He has

represented individuals facing the death penalty around the world at the appellate level and before international bodies. A recognised expert on the death penalty and human rights law, he has an MBE for his services to international human rights and is Visiting Professor at the University of Oxford where he collaborates in research with the Death Penalty Research Unit in the Faculty of Law. They are conducting a three year project in Southeast Asia to test the veracity of assumptions about who is convicted of drug offences in the region and to investigate any deterrent effect of the death penalty. The team are also working on research to explore and challenge the barriers to abolition in countries across Asia, Africa and Commonwealth Caribbean.

**GILBERTO JERÓNIMO**

**Ambassador, Permanent Representative of Portugal to the Council of Europe**



Ambassador Gilberto Jerónimo was appointed Permanent Representative of Portugal to the Council of Europe as of January 2021. He graduated in International Relations and was admitted to the Ministry of Foreign Affairs (MFA) in 1996. In his diplomatic career, he has served as Deputy Secretary-General of the MFA and previously as Director-General for Administration. From 2017 to 2018, he held the position of Permanent Representative to the EU's Political and Security Committee in Brussels. He has also been appointed as Chief of Cabinet to the Secretary of State for European Affairs and Diplomatic Advisor and, then, Chief of Cabinet to the Prime Minister between 2012 and 2015.

**CHARLOTTE PIVETEAU**

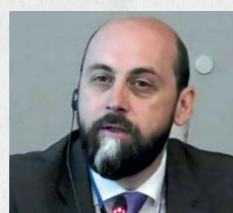
**Doctor in international law and co-editor of a book on international standards for death row inmates**

Sébastien Potaufeu has joined the Council of Europe since September 2023 as Senior advisor for Human rights and Coordinator for the Abolition of the death penalty. Besides the implementation of the Reykjavik summit declaration regarding the abolition of the death penalty, he is also dealing inter alia with NHRIs, Ombudspersons and national preventive mechanisms, and civil society. He is a career diplomat seconded to the Council of Europe, and previously worked as Deputy Permanent Representative in the French Permanent Representation to the Council of Europe where he, inter alia, coordinated the French Presidency of the Committee of Ministers. **ANDRES PEREZ**

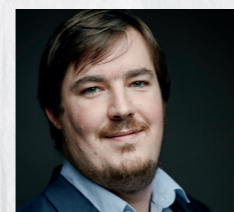
**Human Rights Officer - Death Penalty, Prevention of Genocide ; Office of the United Nations High Commissioner for Human Rights**

Andrés has also worked for the Public International Law and Policy Group (PILPG), the Royal United Services Institute (RUSI), and the U.N. International Commission of Human Rights Experts on Ethiopia where he served as Chief of Investigations. He is a citizen of Venezuela and the United States of America.

**University Professor, Director of René Cassin Foundation, former Vice-President of OHCHR Committee against torture**

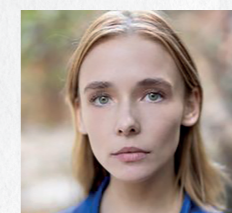


Sébastien Touzé is an associate professor of Public Law at the University of Paris II Panthéon-Assas. He is the author of several publications on International Public Law as well as International and European Human Rights Law. He has taught at several universities in France and presents regularly at foreign universities. In October 2015, he was elected as an expert to the United Nations Committee against Torture and was re-elected in 2019. He thereafter became Vice-Chairman until 2023. In 2011, he was elected as General Secretary of the International Institute of Human Rights, and

then in 2016, he became the Director of the new René Cassin Foundation – International Institute of Human Rights. He leads the team and directs all of the Institute's educational and scientific programs. On January 1, 2017, he was appointed as a compliance officer of the Grand Est Region. Moreover, in 2022, Sébastien Touzé was named Knight of the National Order of Merit by the Ministry of Higher Education, Research and Innovation.

**MARGO VORYKHAVA**

**President of Belarusian National Youth Council 'RADA', Vice-Chair of the Council of Europe Advisory Council on Youth**



Margo (Marharyta) Vorykhava is a dedicated advocate for youth policy and student rights. She serves as the Advisor to the leader of the Belarusian democratic forces Sviatlana Tsikhanouskaya on Youth Policy and Students, focusing on securing international support for Belarusian youth in the pursuit of democracy. Renis Zaganjori joined the jurisconsult's Department of the European Court of Human Rights in 2020, where he has held various positions in the CHRKnowledge Sharing and Research Unit and in the Case Law Monitoring Unit. Since 2023, he has been coordinator of the latter, which is responsible for monitoring deliberations in the Court's five sections. He is also partly responsible for coordinating matters relating to Articles 2 and 3 of the Convention within the Division. ## EYC STRASBOURG

The European Youth Centre Strasbourg (EYCS) is an international training, education and conference centre which hosts participants attending activities organised by the Council of Europe's youth sector or any other entity of the organisation.

External event organisers can also request to hold meetings, seminars or training courses in the Centre's facilities, which include onsite accommodation and catering services.

These facilities can be used for the activities of any external organisation, association, institution, structure or youth network which respects and defends the Council of Europe's values.

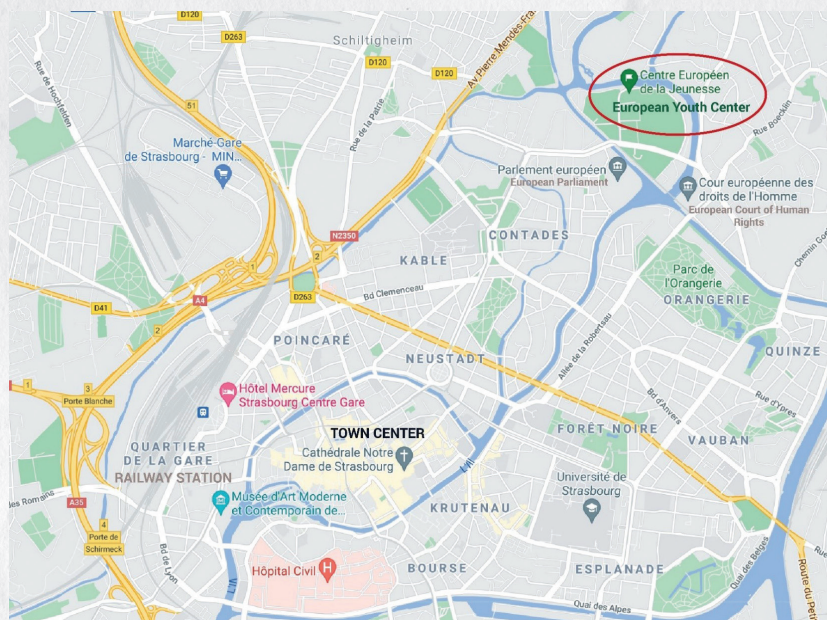
## HOW TO GET TO THE EUROPEAN YOUTH CENTRE

CTS is Strasbourg's public transport company. Maps and a trip planner for getting around Strasbourg can be found on its website: <https://www.cts-strasbourg.eu/en/>

For the EYCS, get off at the stop called *Parlement Européen*.

Tickets can be bought from the ticket machines at tram stops, on the internet or via the CTS mobile application. Once validated, the ticket allows you to make as many connections as you like on the Strasbourg public transport network during 1 hour. Each time you change buses or trams, you need to validate your ticket again.

**Be warned:** it will be more expensive to buy your bus ticket on board a bus rather than before your journey.



### From Strasbourg railway station: 16 minutes

A new route has opened: Bus H provides a rapid transit connection between Strasbourg railway station and the European Parliament. It only serves 10 stops and runs every 10 minutes during the day.

### From Strasbourg Airport, Entzheim: 55 minutes

Take the TER Alsace rail shuttle (TER means Regional Express Train) from the station right next to the airport.

The Tram+TER ticket allows you to travel to and from the airport and the CUS (Strasbourg Urban Community). This combined Tram-Bus-Train ticket can be used for 1.5 hours after validation.

### By taxi: 15 minutes from city centre

In town, you can get a taxi at the Railway Station or near the Homme de Fer tram stop. A taxi from Strasbourg city centre to the EYCS will cost 15-25 euros.

The organisers will only pay for public transport, which is essential for the workshop to run smoothly (i.e. one bus or tram ticket from the station/airport to the EYC and one bus or tram ticket from the EYC to the station/airport).
