

Call for proposals for international one-off youth co-operation activities supporting young people from Ukraine (2026.C4.A)

Questions & Answers

Update: 09 July 2026

Q1: Should all the partners be registered to European Youth Foundation or just the registration of the submitting partner is enough?

A: According to the EYF Operational Regulations only the applying organisation needs to be registered with the EYF granting system (not the partners).

For the call for proposals on supporting young people from Ukraine, according to the eligibility criteria outlined in the [call overview document](#) (section 5.1) international youth organisations do not need to apply with partners. This requirement is only valid for national NGOs.

Additionally, we invite you to carefully read the [Guide to the Grants of the EYF](#) on pages 17 and 19 to better understand the criteria on which we accept NGO registrations on the EYF system.

Q2: How many participants should we include from each country? Also, we will include disabled young people can we get support people for these participants and can they be additional participants to the national project teams?

A: There is no strict minimum or maximum per country, but adequate country representation is important. For an international activity, you must include participants from at least 7 member States of the Council of Europe, and at least 75% needs to be up to 30 years of age. Participants from Ukraine (whether they reside in Ukraine or in other member States) must be among those involved for the call for proposals for international one-off youth co-operation activities supporting young people from Ukraine.

In 2026, the Committee of Ministers of the Council of Europe adopted new Operational Regulations for the European Youth Foundation, which introduced the possibility of grant increases to promote greater access for young people with disabilities to international youth co-operation projects, [see Article 18.4 of the EYF Operational Regulations 2025](#). The Equal Access Fund (EAF) has been established as a mechanism to provide additional funding to awarded projects, specifically aimed at enhancing the accessibility and inclusion of persons with disabilities in EYF-supported initiatives. Under certain conditions, grantee organisations may receive a project grant top-up from the EAF, amounting to up to 10% of their awarded project grant. This additional funding serves as disability compensation, ensuring that participants and team members with disabilities or health-related needs can take part fully in project activities.
