1. The Committee of the Parties (hereinafter referred to as “the Lanzarote Committee” or “the Committee”) to the Council of Europe Convention on the Protection of Children against Sexual Exploitation and Sexual Abuse (hereinafter referred to as “the Lanzarote Convention” or “the Convention”) held its 16th meeting in Lyon on 23-25 November 2016. The agenda of the meeting, as adopted, appears in Appendix I. The list of participants appears in Appendix II.

1. OPENING OF THE MEETING, ADOPTION OF THE AGENDA AND UP-DATE ON RATIFICATIONS OF THE LANZAROTE CONVENTION

2. Mr JANIZZI (Luxembourg), Chairperson of the Lanzarote Committee, opened the meeting by welcoming the recent ratification of the Convention by Estonia (deposit of the instrument of ratification on 22 November 2016; entry into force on 1st March 2017). With this additional ratification the Lanzarote Convention counts 42 Parties.

2. MONITORING OF THE IMPLEMENTATION OF THE LANZAROTE CONVENTION

2.1 *1st monitoring round/1st implementation report “Protection of children against sexual abuse in the circle of trust – The Framework”: exchange of views based on Parties’ follow-up table to the Lanzarote Committee’s recommendations*

3. The Committee took note of the initiatives/measures to provide follow-up to its 1st implementation report as compiled in document T-ES(2016)16bil. Parties were reminded that they may send any additional information to the Secretariat (lanzarote.committee@coe.int) as soon as that is available.

4. Parties not having submitted any information were encouraged to do so by filling the table reproduced in document T-ES(2016)07 and sending it to the Secretariat (lanzarote.committee@coe.int).

2.2 *1st monitoring round/2nd implementation report “Protection of children against sexual abuse in the circle of trust – The Strategies”: assessment of additional information submitted in reply to Question 7 (Preventive and intervention programmes) of the Thematic Questionnaire based on the Rapporteur’s observations*

5. It was recalled that at its previous meetings (see in particular §7 of the [list of decisions of the 14th meeting](#), 15-17 March 2016), the Lanzarote Committee decided that the scope of Question 7 on “Preventive and intervention programmes” should be extended to cover also intervention programmes or measures towards persons subject to criminal proceedings or persons convicted of any of the offences established in accordance with the Convention, including juvenile offenders. It was also recalled that to this effect, Parties had been asked to reply to additional questions to obtain information on the implementation of Articles 15, 16 and 17 of the Lanzarote Convention.

6. The Rapporteur, Mrs DE CRAIM (Belgium), informed the Committee that she received additional information from 12 out of the 26 monitored Parties. Thus, the remaining Parties were asked to study the observations prepared by the Rapporteur and indicate where they should be referred to and to submit any relevant additional information.

7. The Committee then pursued its assessment work concerning Question 7 on the basis of the additional observations prepared by the Rapporteur. Ms DE CRAIM, in particular, underlined that intervention programmes or measures must be offered or promoted at all stages of judicial proceedings, and therefore also when a person is suspected of having committed an offence of a sexual nature but has not yet been tried or convicted. She then highlighted that several countries have programmes which are part of alternative judicial measures for persons with deviant sexual behaviour involved in judicial proceedings.

8. During the discussions that ensued, it was agreed that Parties should regularly assess the effectiveness of intervention programmes or measures they have in place and have tools or procedures to limit the possible risk of reiteration of the offences.

9. As to the specific case of juvenile offenders, the Committee agreed that to meet the developmental needs of children who have sexually offended, including those who are below the age of criminal responsibility, it is important to provide adapted programmes or measures to address their sexual behavioural problems.

10. On the basis of the discussions held on the observations examined during the present and previous meetings, the Committee asked the Secretariat to prepare the relevant parts of the implementation report.

2.3 2nd monitoring round “The dangerous effects of the child’s interaction through Information and Communication Technology (ICT)”: based on suggestions by the Working Group on Trends in Child Sexual Exploitation and Abuse, decision on the issues to be included in the questionnaire that will launch the monitoring

11. It was firstly recalled that during its [15th meeting](#) (14-17 June 2016), the Lanzarote Committee decided that its 2nd monitoring round would focus on “*The dangerous effects of the child’s interaction through Information and Communication Technology (ICT)*” and the Working Group on Trends in Child Sexual Exploitation and Abuse was entrusted to undertake a first exchange of views on the issues to be covered by such a monitoring round.

12. In his capacity as Chairperson of the Working Group on Trends, Mr JANIZZI informed the Committee that the Working Group had firstly highlighted that the emphasis on “dangerous effects” could be misinterpreted (e.g. putting the focus wrongly on children’s behaviour). The Working Group thus suggested that the Committee consider changing the title to align it with the titles of the 1st¹ and the urgent² monitoring rounds, which focus on the protection of children against specific criminal behaviour.

13. He then pointed out that the Working Group acknowledged that ICTs are specifically mentioned in only a few provisions of the Lanzarote Convention. However, the Working Group was of the view that the Lanzarote Convention could be interpreted dynamically, i.e. Parties could commonly agree that any of the existing offences covered by the Convention may be enabled/facilitated by the use of ICTs (even when the specific provisions of the Convention do not spell out the possible role of ICTs to commit such offences).

14. The Working Group thus discussed and approved the Chairperson’s proposal of preparing a general comment, guidance note or similar document, to spell out Parties’ interpretation of the Lanzarote Convention in a time where ICTs develop faster than lawyers can draft new legislation. It was underlined that such a document should be prepared before the

actual launching of the 2nd monitoring round to facilitate Parties' understanding of the questionnaire.

15. Finally, Mr JANIZZI also explained that for the possible focus of the 2nd monitoring round, the Working Group had selected the following trends/behaviour-patterns among all those considered during the course of its meetings:

- Self-generated images (SGIMs) and sexting
- Sexual coercion and extortion
- Sex chatting

16. The Lanzarote Committee exchanged views on all the above suggestions and decided that:

- The 2nd monitoring round should be entitled: "Protection of children against sexual exploitation and sexual abuse which are facilitated by information and communication technologies (ICTs)" and that focus should be on self-generated images (SGIMs) and sexting; Sexual coercion and extortion;
- An interpretative statement ("guidance note" or similar), by which Parties agree on a common dynamic interpretation of the Lanzarote Convention, should be prepared before the 2nd monitoring round is actually launched;
- A joint meeting of the Working Group on Trends in Child Sexual Exploitation and Abuse and of the Bureau should be held late January/early February to prepare the draft questionnaire and the draft interpretative text mentioned above with a view to have these documents discussed at the Committee's 17th meeting (1-3 March 2017);
- The composition of the Working Group should be enlarged in order to open it to one or two ICT experts.

17. In addition, the Committee welcomed the fact that Mr HARRISON (Head of the Online Child Sexual Exploitation Team, [WePROTECT Global Alliance](#)) accepted to join its Working Group.

2.4 Working Group on Trends in Child Sexual Exploitation and Abuse: decision on initiatives to be undertaken based on the final suggestions put forward by the Group

18. Due to lack of time, other than deciding not to cover sex chatting in the scope of its 2nd monitoring round, the Lanzarote Committee did not take any decision with respect to the other suggestions put forward by the Working Group.

2.5 Urgent monitoring "Protecting children affected by the refugee crisis from sexual abuse and exploitation": adoption of a report on the situation based on the analysis of the information received in reply to the focused questionnaire

19. Mr JANIZZI recalled that, at its last meeting, the Committee agreed to address a focused questionnaire to all Parties requesting them to reply by 15 September 2016 to examine such replies as a matter of urgency during the current meeting.

20. Ms SCPAPPUCCI (Executive Secretary to the Lanzarote Committee) informed that replies arrived from nearly all Parties. She applauded the fact that so many submissions were received, including from stakeholders other than the Parties themselves and welcomed the several comments received to the preliminary draft report circulated before the meeting.

21. The Lanzarote Committee examined the draft report and all comments and amendments submitted prior and during the meeting. It in particular exchanged views on how to improve the report's structure and streamline its content. It was underlined that the information concerning lack of data should be moved towards the end of the report, whilst the beginning of the report should include a section outlining the precise scope of the report.

22. On the basis of the above discussions, the Lanzarote Committee asked the Secretariat to prepare a revised version of the draft report for it to examine in due time before its 17th meeting (1-3 March 2017) with a view to its adoption.

3. EXCHANGE OF INFORMATION, EXPERIENCES AND GOOD PRACTICES

3.1 *Fighting online child sexual abuse and exploitation: presentation of the WePROTECT Global Alliance, Mr HARRISON (Head of the Online Child Sexual Exploitation Team)*

23. Mr HARRISON explained to the Committee that the [WePROTECT Global Alliance](#) is an international movement dedicated to national and global action to end the sexual exploitation of children online. The WePROTECT Global Alliance seeks to create a global movement that will transform how the crime of online child sexual exploitation is dealt with, resulting in more victims identified and safeguarded, more perpetrators apprehended and an end to online child sexual exploitation.

24. To achieve this aim, the WePROTECT Global Alliance focuses, in particular, on:

- securing high-level commitment by governments, the technology industry and international and civil society organisations to tackle this crime;
- supporting comprehensive national action, through the WePROTECT [Model National Response](#) and the [Fund to End Violence Against Children](#).

25. The Committee welcomed this high level political commitment and appreciated in particular that the Model National Response reflected the multidisciplinary and comprehensive approach of the Lanzarote Convention.

3.2 *Exchange of views with Mr LE COZ, Chairperson of the Group of Experts on Action against Trafficking in Human Beings (GRETA)*

26. Mr LE COZ started his presentation by pointing at the differences between GRETA (independent body, monitoring Parties on a country by country basis) and the Lanzarote Committee (Parties' representatives monitoring each other comparatively on specific themes). He then presented [GRETA's work](#) as regards protection in particular of children against trafficking for sexual exploitation. He also highlighted that [GRETA's 6th General Report](#) would contain a dedicated thematic chapter on child trafficking.

27. The Lanzarote Committee welcomed his presentation and stood ready to cooperate with GRETA in matters of common interest.

3.3 Presentation of relevant initiatives of the Parliamentary Assembly and Congress of Regional and Local Authorities of the Council of Europe

28. The Lanzarote Committee took note of the recent activities of the Council of Europe's Parliamentary Assembly in the context of the work carried out by its network of contact parliamentarians to stop sexual violence against children, presented by Ms PECKOVÁ (Czech Republic, Member of the PACE Committee on Social Affairs, Health and Sustainable Development).

29. The Lanzarote Committee also took note that the Congress of Regional and Local Authorities of the Council of Europe had not undertaken any new initiative specifically dedicated to the protection of children against sexual violence since its last meeting.

3.4 Debriefings of participation of the Lanzarote Committee in outside events

30. As there were no outside events attended by Lanzarote Committee members in the interval between this and the previous meeting of the Committee, no debriefings were made.

3.5 Presentation of relevant activities by international governmental and non-governmental organizations, experts, as well as services of the Council of Europe

3.5.1 1st meeting of the Ad hoc Committee for the Rights of the Child (CAHENF), 28-29 September 2016, Strasbourg

31. The Chair of the Ad hoc Committee for the Rights of the Child (CAHENF), Ms VERZIVOLLI, recalled that the Committee was set up to guide the intergovernmental work in the area of the rights of the child, in particular to oversee the implementation of the Council of Europe Strategy for the Rights of the Child 2016-2021. She informed the Lanzarote Committee about the main discussions during the CAHENF's first meeting, the report of which is available [online](#).

3.5.2 Conference on Children's Rights in the Migration Crisis and in the Digital Environment, 3-4 November 2016, Tallinn

32. Due to lack of time, this debriefing was not possible. A summary of the Conference is however available [online](#).

3.5.3 Group of Experts on Action against Violence against Women and Domestic Violence (GREVIO): thematic discussion on the age of consent in the context of sexual violence offences against children, 7 November 2016, Strasbourg

33. Ms SCAPPUCCI informed the Lanzarote Committee that she presented the relevant Lanzarote Convention provisions concerning the age of consent to GREVIO. This presentation was solicited as GREVIO is gathering information from Parties to the Istanbul Convention as regards the criminal offence of rape. The issue of the age of consent will be examined in this context once information from a representative number of Parties has been examined. It is recalled that GREVIO carries out evaluations on a [country by country basis](#) and that it has only recently started its 1st monitoring round ([baseline evaluation procedure](#)).

3.5.4 Wilton Park Conference: Protecting children from violence: next steps for effective strategies, 9-11 November 2016, Steyning

34. Due to lack of time, this debriefing was not possible. A summary of the Conference is however available [online](#).

3.5.5 2nd Edition of the European Day on the Protection of Children against Sexual exploitation and Sexual abuse of children, 18 November 2016

35. Mr POUTIERS (Secretary to the Lanzarote Committee) informed the Committee that the 2nd edition of the European Day confirmed the successes of the 2015 edition. Many key personalities of the Council of Europe and its members States delivered statements (video or written) to support the European Day, all in all in 23 different languages. The Council of Europe was also made aware of activities in as many as 16 countries. More information on these activities as well as all the statements delivered are available [online](#).

36. Ms SCAPPUCCI debriefed the Lanzarote Committee about her participation in the first ever [Global forum for adult survivors of childhood sexual exploitation and abuse](#), organized by ECPAT International on the occasion of the 2nd European Day for the Protection of Children from Sexual Exploitation and Abuse. The Forum, which was hosted at the Council of Europe on 18 November 2016, provided a platform for survivors to exchange views on selected issues and to elaborate a common framework for action.

37. The idea of working on a Protocol setting forth guidelines on how to effectively involve adult survivors of childhood sexual abuse and exploitation in advocacy and policy making was amongst the main conclusions of the Forum. It was hoped that once drafted, representatives of survivors could seek to present this Protocol to the Lanzarote Committee.

38. Ms SCAPPUCCI further highlighted that the Global forum was extremely enriching for all those involved. All hoped that such similar gatherings could be convened again especially at regional and national levels. Overall, it was underlined that more opportunities to listen to and collaborate with survivors should be explored as building on their experience is crucial to provide child victims with effective protection measures. In this context, it was suggested to invite one/several adult survivors at conferences on issues related to the protection of children against sexual exploitation and sexual abuse. The event to celebrate the 10th anniversary since the opening for signature of the Lanzarote Convention was pointed at as one such possible occasions.

3.5.6 Debriefing of the INTERPOL capacity building study visit held on 22 November 2016

39. The Lanzarote Committee welcomed the opportunity provided to learn more about relevant INTERPOL instruments and looked forward to enhanced cooperation.

4. PROCEDURAL MATTERS

4.1 *Possible new observers in the meetings of the Lanzarote Committee*

40. The Lanzarote Committee examined the requests submitted to it by "[Hope for Children](#)" [UNCRC Policy Center](#) and by the [Independent Inquiry into Child Sexual Abuse](#) (IICSA). It decided to invite "Hope for Children" UNCRC Policy Center as an observer to its forthcoming meetings. Notwithstanding the relevance of the work carried out by IICSA and the wealth of experience it could share, the Lanzarote Committee could not grant the status of an observer to it as the

Inquiry's work covers only one country, whilst representatives of civil society in the Lanzarote Committee are supposed to voice concerns and share experience from more countries. The Committee also argued that the Inquiry's work focuses on the UK, which is not yet a Party to the Lanzarote Convention.

4.2 Adoption of the list of decisions of the 16th meeting

41. The Lanzarote Committee adopted the [list of decisions](#) of the current meeting.
