Report on the 34th Plenary of the Cybercrime Convention Committee

Strasbourg, 3 – 4 June 2026

34th Plenary Meeting of the T-CY

Strasbourg, France, 3 – 4 June 2026

1. Introduction

The 34th Plenary of the T-CY Committee, meeting in Strasbourg from 3 to 4 June 2026, was chaired by Pedro Verdelho (Portugal), opened by Matthias Kloth (Head of Digital Governance and Sport Department, Council of Europe) and closed by Hanne Juncher (Director of the Directorate of Security, Integrity and Rule of Law).

Some 241 representatives of 67 Parties and 16 Observer States as well as of 5 international organisations and 1 Council of Europe committee participated in person (180) or online (61) in this meeting.

The T-CY Plenary was preceded by a T-CY joint session with the Lanzarote Committee (morning, 2 June 2026) and a T-CY exchange with civil society stakeholders and service providers on the implementation of the Second Additional Protocol organised with the support of the CyberSPEX joint project of the Council of Europe and the European Union (afternoon, 2 June 2026).

2. Decisions

The T-CY decided:

Item 1 – Opening of the 34th Plenary and adoption of the agenda

- To welcome the appointment of Aisling [Ash-lyng] Kelly as the new Head of the Cybercrime Division and Executive Secretary of the T-CY and to express its confidence in her leadership and future contributions.

Item 2 – 20th anniversary of the Cybercrime Convention Committee (T-CY)

- To commemorate the 20th anniversary of the first plenary meeting of the T-CY and to reflect on its achievements, challenges and future priorities, and, therefore, to reaffirm the central role of the T-CY in promoting the effective implementation of the Convention on Cybercrime and its Protocols, including the Second Additional Protocol.
- To recognise the contribution of former chairs, bureau members, working group chairs, experts, secretaries and other T-CY members and contributors whose efforts have supported the development and implementation of the Convention on Cybercrime and its Protocols over the past two decades. The T-CY Plenary provided a spontaneous standing ovation as a sign of their appreciation.
- To recognise that the practitioner-driven nature of the T-CY, bringing together experts directly engaged in addressing cybercrime and electronic evidence, has been a key factor ensuring the relevance, effectiveness and responsiveness of the Convention on Cybercrime and its Protocols. To encourage Parties, therefore, to continue ensuring the active participation of practitioners and subject-matter experts in the work of the T-CY to permit informed exchanges of experience and the effective implementation of the Convention and its Protocols.

To underline that the continued relevance and success of the Budapest Convention framework rests on its ability to support effective criminal justice action against cybercrime and the maintenance of the community of trust.

- To emphasise the importance of continuing to address emerging challenges in a dynamic manner, including those related to artificial intelligence, virtual assets and cyberviolence.

Item 3 – State of signatures, ratifications and accessions to the Convention on Cybercrime and its Protocols

- To note that 2026 marks the 25th anniversary of the Convention on Cybercrime (ETS No. 185) and the continued interest by States worldwide in joining the Convention and its Protocols on xenophobia and racism (ETS No. 189) and on electronic evidence (CETS No. 224), as reflected in recent signatures, ratifications and accessions, demonstrating their continued relevance and global reach.
- To welcome the accession to the Convention on Cybercrime by Papua New Guinea.
- To encourage Parties to the Convention on Cybercrime to join the first Additional Protocol on Xenophobia and Racism (ETS 189).
- To welcome the recent ratifications of the Second Additional Protocol to the Convention on Cybercrime (CETS 224) by Costa Rica and Hungary.
- To encourage all Parties to the Convention on Cybercrime to sign, implement and ratify the Second Additional Protocol as soon as possible so that its tools become available to practitioners.
- To note that capacity building projects are available to support the implementation of the Second Additional Protocol.

Item 4 – Financial resourcing of the T-CY

- To recall that the T-CY relies on voluntary contributions to support its activities, including its plenary meetings and other activities under the T-CY workplan, as the Ordinary Budget of the Council of Europe alone is not sufficient for this purpose.
- To note that the current financing of the Octopus Project, which supports the functioning and activities of the T-CY will run out by January 2027.
- To underline the importance of adequate, sustainable and predictable funding for the functioning of the T-CY and the implementation of the Convention on Cybercrime and its Protocols.
- To strongly encourage Parties and observers to the T-CY to provide voluntary contributions to the Octopus Project in line with the decision taken by the T-CY in 2013 and as foreseen in Article 12.1 of the T-CY Rules of Procedure to permit the functioning of the T-CY.
- To note that, in the absence of additional funding, alternative options for the functioning and activities of the T-CY will need to be considered in the next T-CY in October 2026. The T-CY Secretariat will circulate further information in the coming period.

Item 5 – Information provided by Parties and Observers

To welcome the information provided by Albania, Armenia, Australia, Azerbaijan, Bosnia and Herzegovina, Cabo Verde, Cameroon, Canada, Chile, Colombia, Costa Rica, Fiji, France, Ghana, Guatemala, Italy, Kenya, Kiribati, Korea, Malaysia, Mexico, Moldova, Morocco, Mozambique, Nigeria, North Macedonia, Norway, Panama, Philippines, Sao Tome and Principe, Serbia, Sierra Leone, Spain, Sri Lanka, Timor Leste, Tonga, Trinidad and Tobago, Tunisia, Turkiye, United

Kingdom, Ukraine, United States, Vanuatu, as well as the European Union (Commission, EUROPOL and EUROJUST).

- To welcome the continued efforts by Parties and Observers to strengthen domestic legal frameworks and international cooperation on cybercrime and electronic evidence.
- To note the important contribution of capacity building activities by the Cybercrime Programme Office of the Council of Europe (C-PROC) in supporting implementation of the Convention and its Protocols.

Item 6 – UN Treaty process

- To take note of the meeting of the Ad Hoc Committee to prepare the draft text of the rules of procedure for the Conference of the States Parties to the United Nations Convention against Cybercrime held in Vienna from 26 to 30 January 2026.
- To note the continued relevance of the Budapest Convention as the leading international framework for cooperation on cybercrime and electronic evidence.
- To support the involvement of civil society, industry, academia and other stakeholders in future work related to the United Nations Convention against Cybercrime.
- To encourage Parties and observers to continue exploring collaboration between the Budapest Convention framework and the United Nations Convention against Cybercrime, including through capacity building activities supported by C-PROC.
- To underline the importance of ensuring consistency between the implementation of the United Nations Convention against Cybercrime and the Convention on Cybercrime, including with regard to conditions and safeguards and the protection of human rights, the rule of law and fundamental freedoms.

Item 7 – Second Protocol on enhanced cooperation and disclosure of electronic evidence

- To endorse the templates for requests and orders under Articles 6 to 9 of the Second Additional Protocol to the Convention on Cybercrime developed under the CyberSPEX project, on the understanding that they constitute non-binding, but acceptable templates intended to facilitate the preparation, transmission and execution of requests and orders by Parties.
- To thank the CyberSPEX project, the experts involved in the preparation of the templates, including experts from project countries and the European Judicial Cybercrime Network, as well as the Bureau and T-CY members, for their contributions and comments.
- To encourage Parties to make use of the templates in the implementation and practical application of the Second Additional Protocol and to share their experience and feedback on their practical application with the T-CY, with a view to possible future updates.
- To build on the achievements of the CyberSPEX project for further technical assistance in the implementation of the Second Additional Protocol by the Parties.

Item 8 – New project proposal on verification

- To take note of the information provided by the T-CY Secretariat regarding a new project proposal on the verification of orders, requests and data exchange.
- To welcome further contributions on this proposal.

Item 9 – T-CY Observer Status

- To grant observer status to the Caribbean Community Implementation Agency for Crime and Security (CARICOM IMPACS), the Regional Security System (RSS) and the Steering Committee for New and Emerging Digital Technologies (CDNET).
- To welcome the strengthening of cooperation with regional and international partners in support of the implementation of the Convention on Cybercrime and its Protocols, including through capacity building and outreach activities.
- To adopt the revised Rules of Procedure of the T-CY (T-CY (2013)25 rev2).

Item 10 – T-CY Working Group on Artificial Intelligence

- To welcome the update provided by the T-CY Working Group on Cybercrime, Electronic Evidence and Artificial Intelligence.
- To thank the Chair and members of the Working Group, the T-CY Secretariat, the Cybercrime Programme Office of the Council of Europe (C-PROC) and other experts supporting the Working Group for their extensive work in preparing the draft mapping study on cybercrime, electronic evidence and artificial intelligence.
- To thank Claudio Peguero (Dominican Republic) for chairing the Working Group and to invite him to continue serving as Chair until the completion of its mandate.
- To extend the mandate of the Working Group until the end of October 2026.
- To revise and adopt the updated terms of reference of the Working Group (T-CY(2024)9).
- To invite T-CY members and observers to provide comments, examples and additional information for consideration by the Working Group by 10 July 2026 in support of the preparation of the study.
- To encourage additional T-CY members and observers to contribute expertise and practical experience to support the work of the Working Group.
- To request the Working Group to present the final mapping study to the T-CY at its 35th Plenary with a view to informing future work of the T-CY on artificial intelligence, cybercrime and electronic evidence.

Item 11 – Capacity building

- To note with appreciation the achievements of the Cybercrime Programme Office of the Council of Europe (C-PROC) in supporting the implementation of the Convention on Cybercrime and its Protocols.
- To welcome the continued close cooperation between the T-CY and C-PROC in promoting a strategic and coherent approach to capacity building.
- To encourage Parties, observers and partners to continue supporting capacity building activities worldwide.

- To take note of the information provided on the functioning and activities of the 24/7 Network of contact points and to underline its importance for effective international cooperation on cybercrime and electronic evidence.
- To encourage members of the 24/7 Network to consider whether any additional national capacities might be necessary to facilitate further cooperation under the Articles 9 and 10 of the Second Additional Protocol.
- To welcome the information provided on CYBOX and its contribution to strengthening the capacity of criminal justice professionals worldwide to investigate and prosecute cybercrime and handle electronic evidence.
- To encourage Parties, observers and relevant institutions to make use of CYBOX and contribute to the sharing of knowledge, expertise and training resources.

Item 12 – Virtual assets and the relevance of the Convention on Cybercrime and its Second Protocol

- To adopt the mapping study on virtual assets and the relevance of the Convention on Cybercrime and its Second Additional Protocol.
- To thank Parties and observers for their replies to the questionnaire and for the information, examples and comments provided throughout the preparation of the study.
- To welcome the work undertaken by the Bureau, T-CY Secretariat and C-PROC in preparing the study.
- To underline the continued relevance of the Convention on Cybercrime and its Second Additional Protocol in addressing criminal offences involving virtual assets.
- To recognise the importance of cooperation with virtual asset service providers and other relevant stakeholders in countering criminal activities involving virtual assets, consistent with the Convention on Cybercrime and its Protocols.
- To invite the Bureau to consider possible follow-up actions in light of the findings and recommendations of the study and to present proposals for consideration by the T-CY at its 35th Plenary.

Item 13 – Cyberviolence

- To welcome the joint session with the Lanzarote Committee held on 2 June 2026 and to underline the value of continued dialogue and cooperation between the two committees.
- To welcome the joint statement on AI-generated or altered child sexual exploitation or sexual abuse material adopted by the T-CY and the Lanzarote Committee on 2 June 2026.
- To thank T-CY members and observers for their contributions to the questionnaire on cyberviolence offences.
- To welcome the integration of the information collected through the questionnaire into the Cyberviolence Resource maintained under the Octopus Project and its contribution to knowledge-sharing and capacity building.
- To invite T-CY members and observers that have not yet done so, as well as those wishing to provide updated information, to contribute information on national legislation related to

cyberviolence offences with a view to supporting the continued development of the Cyberviolence Resource.

- To invite the Bureau to consider possible future work of the T-CY on cyberviolence in light of the information collected through the questionnaire and reflected in the Cyberviolence Resource.

Item 14 – Readout from stakeholder session

- To welcome the stakeholder session held on 2 June 2026 and the contributions provided by representatives of civil society, industry, academia and other stakeholders.
- To underline the importance of continued multistakeholder engagement in support of the implementation of the Convention on Cybercrime and its Protocols.
- To encourage continued dialogue between the T-CY and relevant stakeholders on emerging challenges related to cybercrime and electronic evidence.

Item 15 – Any other business

- To recall the decision adopted at the 33rd Plenary to undertake a follow-up review of the implementation of the recommendations contained in the Article 19 Assessment Report.
- To encourage all Parties that have not yet done so to submit comprehensive replies to the questionnaire on follow-up provided by Parties to the recommendations of the Article 19 Assessment Report by 30 June 2026.
- To recall that, in accordance with the Rules of Procedure of the T-CY, Parties participate in assessment and follow-up procedures by providing comprehensive replies to questionnaires adopted by the T-CY.
- To take note of the proposal to include the topic of the cyber scam centres into the agenda of the next T-CY Plenary.

Item 16 –Date of the 35th T-CY Plenary

- To reconfirm that the 35th Plenary of the T-CY will be held on 12–13 October 2026 in Strasbourg.
- To note that the Octopus Conference will be held from 14 to 16 October 2026 in Strasbourg.
- To hold 36th Plenary of the T-CY on 3-4 June 2027, preceded with a meeting with stakeholders on 2 June 2027.
