

Academic panel on the first anniversary of the opening for signature of the Council of Europe Framework Convention on Artificial Intelligence and Human Rights, Democracy and the Rule of Law

PANEL OVERVIEW

This academic panel offers a timely opportunity to critically reflect on how the Council of Europe's new "Framework Convention on Artificial Intelligence and Human Rights, Democracy and the Rule of Law" engages with key constitutional values and policy challenges. One year after its opening for signature, the Convention continues to shape legal and political thinking around the governance of artificial intelligence (AI)—especially in terms of how to safeguard rights-based principles such as the rule of law and democratic integrity, and how to identify, assess and mitigate risks.

The panel brings together academic experts and members of the Bureau of the Council of Europe's Committee on Artificial Intelligence (CAI) for a structured exchange. Academics will present on core themes of the Convention—the Rule of Law, Democracy, and Assessment of Risks and Impacts of AI-offering methodological theoretical and insights. Their interventions will be followed by responses from CAI Bureau members, reflecting on the Convention's regulatory architecture, the negotiation process and implementation prospects. The panel will conclude with an open discussion with the audience (Q&A session).

PROGRAMME STRUCTURE

Each segment of the panel will include a 15-minute academic presentation, providing a theoretical and critical perspective on a selected topic, followed by a 10-minute response from a CAI Bureau member reflecting on the Framework Convention's approach, content, negotiation background, and regulatory strengths and weaknesses. The panel will be followed by a brief moderated discussion (Q&A session, optional, time permitting).
