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


PROBATION SERVICE OVERVIEW







THE IRISH PRISON SERVICE OVERVIEW



89* prisoners per **100,000** of national population.

PROBATION ROLE:

- Manage court orders
- Reduce risk of harm
- Reduce likelihood of reoffending
- Make good the harm caused by crime







WHAT WE DO

The Probation Service deals with almost 15,000 offenders in the community annually (including c.8,000 assessments on offenders which assist judges in making decisions in criminal cases). Two main work category areas:

Assessment

- Assessment Reports for Court
 Assessment teams in major urban areas
 Risk Assessment tools
- Parole Board Assessment Reports



Supervision and Rehabilitation of offenders:

- Court-ordered supervision: Probation (adults and young people), Community Service, Fully suspended sentences.
 Post-Release Supervision: Community Return, Part-suspended sentences, Life Sentence Prisoners (Parole), Sex Offenders







GANGS AND THE CRIMINAL JUSTICE SYSTEM IN IRELAND

- Gangs in prison mirror community. Drugs related.
- Policing and Interagency Response.
- Paramilitary groups do not recruit in prison.
- Parliamentary (Oireachtas) Joint Committee on Justice.

SOME CURRENT PRACTICES

- Gang 'culture' relatively new.
- 2. Intelligence (inside and out) is vital.
- New assessment/triage units.
- Isolation moving one can change dynamic.
- 5. 23-hour lock up is last resort.
- 6. Prisoner councils, offenders as mentors.
- 7. Heightened expectations for 'successful' outcomes.





FUTURE POSSIBILITIES

- Fear of the unknown.
- 2. Learn from existing practices and other jurisdictions.
- Listen to those who have been through the process.
- Punitive responses alone unlikely to work.
- Not a case of one size fits all.
- 6. Interagency co-operation.
- Involve all parts of the system.
