<u>Report</u>

**Conference "Promoting autonomy in mental healthcare"** <u>Conference - Promoting autonomy in</u> mental healthcare - Human Rights and Biomedicine (coe.int)

- 1. Delegations were invited to exchange on the Conference on "Promoting autonomy in mental healthcare" held on 14 November 2023, and organised in cooperation with the Ombudsman of the republic of Latvia and the University of Latvia, in the framework of the Latvian Presidency of the Committee of Ministers of the Council of Europe.
- 2. Delegations praised the opportunity to share experience in other countries through concrete examples, and the new synergies that could be created on that basis.
- 3. One observer noted the progress made over the years in the work of the CDBIO and appreciated the willingness for change in mental healthcare.
- 4. The importance of multidisciplinary team and the need for partnership showed by the examples were pointed out. The importance of the voice of patients and the need for a real partnership with people seeking care as expert for themselves were underlined. The need for resources and support for persons with lived experience was underlined by one observer.
- 5. It was noted that those examples illustrated the cultural shift needed to go from hospital to diversified modalities of care. The need for capacity building of professionals was also underlined.
- 6. One delegation stressed the interest also to look at cost efficiency to support the changes. Research already carried out proved that, contrary to what was often believed, these practices promoting autonomy actually saved money by enabling a person to go back to work for example.
- 7. The CDBIO thanked the Office of the Ombusdman of the Republic of Latvia and the University of Latvia for the excellent organisation, their support and the way they welcome the Committee.

#### I. Adoption of the agenda

- 8. Siobhan O'Sullivan (Ireland), CDBIO Chair, opened the meeting and welcomed the new members of the Committee. The list of participants appears in Appendix I to this report.
- 9. The agenda was adopted. It appears in Appendix II to this report.

#### II. Draft Recommendation on respect for autonomy in mental healthcare

- 10. The CDBIO examined the draft Recommendation on respect for autonomy in mental healthcare revised in the light of comments received from delegations.
- 11. In respect of Article 2, one delegation suggested that the future explanatory memorandum (EM) specify that "mental healthcare" also includes care provided by related social services.
- 12. In respect of Article 3, sub-section 2, one delegation suggested that it would be useful to explicitly specify that "legal safeguards" (which may change over time) should respect human dignity. It was agreed that the phrase "respecting human dignity" be added at the end of the provision.
- 13. In respect of Article 6, one observer suggested that the wording "persons with lived experience of mental health care should be involved" should be changed to "persons with lived experience should be involved via their representative organizations", in order to be more compliant with the wording of the CRPD (general comment 7). A discussion ensued and delegations underlined the risk of having individuals speak on behalf of others, and the need for a structured and

organized approach to consulting persons with disabilities on general. It was also acknowledged that in a number of Member States, such organizations did not exist. An agreement was reached regarding the phrase "Persons with lived experience, individually or via representative organizations" and it was agreed that the EM will elaborate on the need to encourage the development of organizations in countries where these did not exist and to refer to regional European organizations.

- 14. One participant expressed concern over the possible confusion, in Article 8, between "advance care planning" and "advance directives" that could encompass end-of-life issues and suggested to reformulate using language similar to that of article 9 of the Oviedo Convention. In the discussion that ensued, the Committee agreed that in this recommendation and provision, "advance care planning" referred to a person's treatment plan or care relevant to the mental health issue at hand and not to other situations (such as end of life situations). It also enabled to clarify that the scope of the provision extended to circumstances of future crisis without being limited to such circumstances. A consensus was found with the wording: "Persons receiving mental healthcare should be encouraged to express their preferences and wishes for their future care" and it was agreed that a reference to crisis situations would be made in the EM.
- 15. In respect of Article 9, one observer expressed the view that its object (improving the environment of mental healthcare facilities) may divert from the need to prioritize communitybased care; in other words, it should not be assumed that adapting existing facilities would be sufficient. It was agreed that the EM will elaborate on the fact that the provision did not only apply to institutions and that, generally, a move towards community-based care was needed. One delegation further suggested that the environment should respect the privacy of persons and it was agreed that the EM will also include a reference in that regard.
- 16. In respect of Article 10, several delegations suggested that the footnote also refer to "other (important) healthcare services and other assisted decision-making services".
- 17. In respect of Article 11, one observer expressed the view that the wording could be changed to reflect the fact that family members (of a person receiving mental health care) may never be consulted without the agreement of the person concerned. It was agreed that this will be mentioned in the EM, while recognizing that different rules may apply in the case of children receiving care.
- 18. In respect of Article 12, one delegation suggested to specify that responses to complaints should be "appropriate <u>and timely</u>". Moreover, it was suggested and agreed that the EM will elaborate on the fact that persons wishing to lodge a complaint should be supported (in various manners), in order for the complaints mechanism to be "effective".
- 19. In respect of Article 13, it was suggested and agreed that a reference to "recovery" be added to the actual text and that the EM will expand on this notion.
- 20. In respect of Article 14, one delegation suggested to add, at the end of the sentence: "and to promote their acceptance in society". It was also suggested an agreed to change the title of the article to "Addressing stigma and discrimination", based on the agreement that the provision needed to cover the need to prevent any future stigma and discrimination and combat existing stigma and discrimination.
- 21. In respect of Article 15, it was suggested and agreed to replace "sufficient training" (which could be interpreted as "minimal") with "appropriate training". The EM will expand on the nature of the training.
- 22. In respect of Article 16, it was suggested and agreed to replace "increase" with "promote" and "promoted" with "encouraged".

- 23. In respect of Article 18, one delegation suggested to specify in that monitoring needed to be "regular". In the discussion that entailed, other delegations expressed the view that regularity was implied in the term "monitoring". It was agreed not to amend the text of the provision but that the EM would underline the fact that monitoring was to be understood as an ongoing process. Further, it was suggested and agreed to replace "standards" with "principles set out in this recommendation".
- 24. In respect of Article 19, one delegation asked the Committee whether the text could usefully be developed by adding a reference to "record keeping". The discussion that entailed pointed to the difficulty for the recommendation to set out or to list which information would need to be recorded. It was agreed that "local reviews" could include audits, and that this could be mentioned in the EM.
- 25. In respect of Article 20, it was suggested and agreed to replace "increase" with "promote" (as in Article 16).
- 26. The CDBIO agreed to submit the draft, as a working document, for a targeted consultation (from 4 December 2023 to 16 February 2024) with a view to finalising and approving the draft Recommendation by the end of 2024. The text will be submitted to a list of relevant stakeholders, including all respondents of previous CDBIO consultations on the subject of mental health as well as all speakers of the conference held on 14 November. It was decided that the current footnotes will be kept in the submitted draft, as a preview of the content of the future EM.

#### III. Artificial intelligence and biomedicine

- 27. Joni Komulainen, Chair of the Drafting Group on AI, presented the report on the impact of AI on the 'patient-doctor' relationship, revised in the light of comments from CDBIO delegations, and from participants to the pilot youth forum on AI in healthcare, held on 6 June 2023.
- 28. CDBIO delegations welcomed the revised draft, underlining its quality, utility and well-structured approach to issues raised by AI. The potential for AI to transform and/or otherwise support health systems was highlighted, suggesting the need to accentuate the opportunities and tone of the report.
- 29. Certain delegations sought clarity on wording, others asserted that issues of bias and liability (responsibility and ethics therein) of AI systems could be further developed. The Chair underlined the need to further explore the therapeutic relationship in seeing how it will and/or should evolve in other words, what future AI-enabled 'patient-doctor' relationship could be envisaged and how do we ensure that it is one which safeguards the human dignity and fundamental rights and freedoms of the individual.
- 30. There was an exchange of views on the need for a targeted consultation on the report, to efficiently integrate the views of different stakeholders, including those of patients' and healthcare professionals. This resulted in the agreement of the CDBIO to organise a targeted consultation on the report (from approx. 1 December 2023 to 31 January 2024) targeting patients' associations and bodies of healthcare professionals and to entrust the Drafting Group with the task of revising it in the light of the comments to be received thereafter so that it may be finalised and adopted at its next plenary, in June 2024.

#### IV. Overview of legislation and practices on patients' rights

- 31. The Chair reminded delegations about the request from the Committee of Ministers for an overview of the national legislation on the protection and promotion of patient's rights.
- 32. Dr Rumi Yotova (UK) presented the early findings of her analysis of the replies to the questionnaire addressed to delegations with a view to get this overview (her PowerPoint presentation appears in Appendix III to this report). She pointed out four areas where great diversity can be noted among member states: regulation on genetics, on reproductive health, mental healthcare and biomedical research. She also indicated that only 5 member states (among the 18 that replied) have specific legislation to address access to healthcare for marginalised groups. Furthermore, only two member states indicated requiring patients' rights training for healthcare professionals. She also pointed out the absence of regulation on public consultation in 9 member states.
- 33. In reply to a question on public health aspects and prevention in relation to patients' rights, Dr Yotova specified that the replies did not make it possible to identify these aspects; the same was true for the rights of future generations.
- 34. The delegations thanked Dr Yotova for the work carried out so far. It acknowledged its relevance also in the context of the horizon scanning exercise.
- 35. The CDBIO agreed to publish the replies to the questionnaire on patients' rights centred health care systems, and to publish the analysis of the replies carried out by Rumiana Yotova (UK), as a separate document, once finalised.

#### V. Equitable access to appropriate innovative treatments and technologies in healthcare

- 36. The Chair recalled that at its 3rd plenary meeting, the CDBIO agreed not to prepare a new draft Recommendation to ensure equitable access to innovative treatments and technologies but to entrust a Drafting Group with drafting a discussion paper on the issue. The Discussion paper should examine how the general and procedural principles of Recommendation CM/Rec(2023)1 also apply to the decision-making processes of innovative treatments and technologies.
- 37. The Chair invited Tomáš Doležal, Chair of the Drafting Group, to present the preliminary draft discussion paper, the methodology adopted, the outcomes, and the conclusions. Then, the Chair invited delegations to express their view on how to go further with the process, the form of the written instrument to be developed, and the substantial additional elements that could be addressed.
- 38. Delegations welcomed the draft discussion paper, the analysis carried out, and the summary of the work done by other international organizations. Delegations agreed on entrusting the Drafting group to continue the work by elaborating a white paper including further information, analysis, and examples.
- 39. Delegations agreed that the scope of the work should be extended beyond innovative treatments and technologies intended for severe or life-threatening health patient conditions; the scope should consider a broader range of patients' health conditions as long as the safety and efficacy of the innovative treatments and technologies concerned are supported by scientific evidence.
- 40. The European Court of Human Rights jurisprudence should be considered, particularly for cases regarding experimental treatment cases. The white paper could include considerations of the possible tensions created by innovative treatments and technologies between individual rights and public health needs and the long-term perspective of decision-makers choices. The draft white paper will be presented to the 5th CDBIO plenary meeting.

#### VI. <u>Guide on children participation in decision making process on matters relevant to their</u> <u>health</u>

- 41. Ritva Halila, Co-Chair of the Drafting Group of the Guide introduced the final version of the Guide. The Secretariat indicated that the text had been amended in light of the comments received from CDENF and CDBIO delegations, most of which had concerned references to national legislations. The text had also been enriched thanks to additional examples provided.
- 42. Two delegations indicated some difficulties regarding the content of General comment 12 (2009) of the UNCRC regarding the right of the child to be heard, that is quoted in the Guide, and referring specifically to the following paragraph: "States parties need to introduce legislation or regulations to ensure that children have access to confidential medical counselling and advice without parental consent, irrespective of the child's age, where this is needed for the child's safety or well-being. Children may need such access, for example, where they are experiencing violence or abuse at home, or in need of reproductive health education or services, or in case of conflicts between parents and the child over access to health services. The right to counselling and advice is distinct from the right to give medical consent and should not be subject to any age limit". Another delegation indicated a similar issue with age limits for children to decide without parental authorisation.
- 43. However, none of these delegations have any other difficulty with the content of the Guide. Two of these delegations made statements in that respect which appear in Appendix IV to this report.
- 44. The CDBIO adopted, by unanimity of the votes cast, with three abstentions, the Guide on child participation in decisions about their health, jointly developed with the CDENF, and agreed to present it to the Committee of Ministers for it to take note.
- 45. The CDBIO welcomed the online version of the Guide on child participation in decisions about their health and exchanged on the possible follow-up to be given to the Guide; notably through the translation of the guide into non-official languages, other dissemination activities and possible development of related child-friendly materials.

# VII. Preparation of a new strategic action plan (SAP II)

- 46. The CDBIO Chair reminded about the decision of the Committee at its last plenary meeting, to develop a new strategic action plan by the end of 2025 and to organise a horizon scanning exercise to that end in 2024. A drafting group was set up to propose a methodology for this exercise.
- 47. The Drafting Group prepared a questionnaire intended to delegations, national ethics committee and national human rights institutions. In agreement with Bureau, this questionnaire was already sent for replies by 31 January 2024 so as to benefit from the replies to prepare the horizon scanning event foreseen on 3 April 2024 in Paris.
- 48. Delegations underlined the importance of benefiting from youth perspectives for the horizon scanning exercise. The Secretariat suggestion to reach out to CoE relevant youth committee(s) as well as, where possible, relevant bodies set up by other intergovernmental organisations such as YouthWise at the OECD, was supported.
- 49. The need to also to increase link with the EU was also pointed out by one delegation. The UN Interagency Committee on Bioethics could also provide a good opportunity for an exchange of information.
- 50. The Chair presented the proposal from the Group for the horizon scanning event to which high calibre speakers would be invited, targeting namely academics and thought leaders. The meeting

will take place back to back with the Bureau meeting, extend to the members of the Drafting Group for the horizon scanning. She invited delegations to identify particular topics that they consider particularly relevant so as to be able to identify relevant speakers. These topics could be linked to technological developments, evolution of practices or societal attitude.

- 51. The following topics were mentioned by delegations:
  - Impact of climate change on health
  - Shortage of healthcare professionals
  - Discrimination with regard to LGBTI+
  - Representation of minorities in clinical trials
  - Embedding bioethical consideration in future policy
  - Children born out of gametes donation
  - Mistrust in science
  - Euthanasia and assisted suicide
  - Social determinant of health to be included in the care
  - Genomics and child autonomy
  - Al and informed consent process
  - Robotics and older persons
  - All perceptions of age in the society
  - Synthetic embryo
- 52. The CDBIO agreed with the proposal made by the drafting group in charge for the organisation of the horizon scanning exercise with a view to developing a new strategic action plan (2026 2029).
- 53. Delegations were invited to reply to the questionnaire designed to this end <u>by 31 January</u> <u>2024</u> and to send names of possible high level speakers for the horizon scanning event to be held on 3 April 2024, in Paris.

## VIII. Bureau elections

- 54. The terms of the Chair and Vice-Chair, elected in November 2022 were coming to an end. Furthermore, the terms of Mark Bale (UK) in the Bureau were also ending and he was not reelligible.
- 55. The CDBIO, by acclamation:
  - re-elected Siobhan O'Sullivan (Ireland), as its Chair, for a new one-year term, not renewable
  - re-elected Tomas Dolezal (Czech Republic), as its Vice-Chair, for a new one-year term, not renewable;
  - elected Sanne Van Weezel (The Netherlands), in the Bureau for a two-years term, renewable once.

# IX. Other business

- a. Youth Forum
- 56. The rapporteur of the pilot youth forum, Tesi Aschan, presented her report which summarised key learnings from the event, exploring its strengths and opportunities as well as its unique features (e.g. shared culture and language of the youth participants).
- 57. There was an exchange of views on how to organise a larger-scale diverse youth forum, in 2025. Discussion ensued on the practicalities and achievability of such a forum (noting the need to establish clear objective(s), decide of the scale of event, secure the financing of the forum(s), and determine how best to designate youth representatives).

- 58. On the proposal of the Chair, the CDBIO agreed to set-up a drafting group to examine the feasibility of a larger-scale youth forum in 2025, with a view to reporting back on the group's findings at its next plenary in June 2024.
  - b. Launch of the Guide to health literacy
- 59. The CDBIO welcomed the programme for the Conference "Health literacy and human rights trust building and equitable access to healthcare", to be held in Rome (Italy), on 12 December 2023. The event is organised by the Council of Europe, in cooperation with the National Office Against Racial Discrimination of Italy, with the support of the Ministry of Family, Natality and Equal Opportunities and of the Ministry of Health of Italy.

#### c. Action Plan Armenia

- 60. The Secretariat presented briefly the latest developments in the cooperation project on "Human Rights and Biomedicine II" carried out in the framework of the Armenia Action Plan. She referred to the HELP course on human rights in mental healthcare being developed in this context, as well as the different training activities carried out for health care professionals, but also members of the national ethics committee and research ethics committee. She indicated that specific activities were also planned to the training of health care professionals coming from Nagorno Karabakh.
  - d. Replies to questionnaire on PMA
- 61. The Secretariat presented the online version of the replies to the questionnaire on medically assisted procreation.
- 62. The CBDIO welcome the online publication of the replies to the questionnaire providing an overview of the legal framework and practices in the member states relevant to medically assisted procreation.
  - e. Gender equality
- 63. The Gender Equality Rapporteur, Iuliia Davydova, made a presentation on the gender dimensions of the CDBIO's work (in Appendix V to this report), based on her participation in Council of Europe trainings. Delegations underlined the importance of gender in their work, noting the opportunity this presented for the Committee's work in preparing its new strategic action plan. The CDBIO took note of the proposals by the Gender Equality Rapporteur to be considered in the development of its work programme.
- f. <u>PACE Recommendation 2263 (2023) "Mental health and well-being of children and young adults"</u>
- 64. The representative of the PACE presented briefly the content of the recommendation.
- 65. The delegations were reminded about the invitation of the Committee of Ministers to make possible comments on the PACE rec 2263 (2023) by 12 January 2024. **They were invited to send their comments** <u>by 25 November 2023</u>.
- 66. Considering the deadline set for the sending the comments to the Committee of Ministers, the CDBIO agreed to entrust its Bureau with the task of finalising the comments on the basis of the remarks to be sent from delegations and in the light of the relevant work carried out by the Committee.

67. The CDBIO agreed to hold the next meetings on:

67. The Delegations agreed to adopt by written procedure the abridged report presented to delegations on Friday 17 November 2023. In the absence of opposition by Monday 20 November 2023, the abridged report was adopted.
