33rd Plenary Meeting of the T-CY

Strasbourg, France, 13 – 14 November 2025

1. Introduction

The 33rd Plenary of the T-CY Committee, meeting in Strasbourg from 13 to 14 November 2025, was chaired by Pedro Verdelho (Portugal) and opened by Matthias Kloth (Head of Digital Governance and Sport Department, Council of Europe).

Some 205 representatives of 75 Parties and 11 Observer States as well as of 2 international organisations and 1 Council of Europe committee participated in person (145) or online (60) in this meeting.

The T-CY Plenary was preceded by a meeting of the T-CY Working Group on Artificial Intelligence (11 November 2025) and a T CY exchange with industry and service providers organised with the support of the CyberSPEX joint project of the Council of Europe and the European Union (12 November 2025).

2. Decisions

The T-CY decided:

Item 1 – Opening of the 33rd Plenary and adoption of the agenda

- To note the increasing interest in the Convention on Cybercrime and its Protocols in 2025 as reflected in accessions and requests for accession.
- To express its gratitude to Alexander Seger, the former Head of the Cybercrime Division and the Executive Secretary of the T-CY for his outstanding service and contributions over the years.

Item 2 – T-CY Bureau elections

- To thank former Vice-Chair Nathan Whiteman (Australia) and former Bureau Member Sara Pangrazzi (Switzerland) for their contributions to the work of the T-CY in recent years.
- To elect Anne-Marie Le Bel (Canada) to the Vice-Chair position and Judith Herrnfeld (Austria) to the other vacant position in the T-CY Bureau for the remainder of the current Bureau's term, that is, to end-2026.

Item 3 – State of signatures, ratifications and accessions to the Convention on Cybercrime and its Protocols

- To note the increasing interest by States worldwide in joining the Convention on Cybercrime (ETS 185) and its Protocols on xenophobia and racism (ETS 189) and on electronic evidence (CETS 224) as reflected in accessions and requests for accessions in recent months.
- To welcome the recent accessions to the Convention on Cybercrime by New Zealand and Vanuatu.
- To welcome the accession since the last Plenary to the First Additional Protocol on Xenophobia and Racism (ETS 189) by Malta.

- To encourage Parties to the Convention on Cybercrime to join the first Additional Protocol on Xenophobia and Racism (ETS 189).
- To welcome signature since the last Plenary of the Second Additional Protocol to the Convention on Cybercrime (CETS 224) by Norway and during the present Plenary by Bosnia and Herzegovina.
- To encourage all Parties to the Convention to sign and ratify this Second Protocol as soon as possible so that its tools become available to practitioners and, in this connection, to recall that capacity building projects are available to support implementation of this Protocol.
- To remind States of the mandatory declarations to be made regarding the authorities under articles 24 (extradition), 27 (mutual assistance) and 35 (24/7 point of contact) when depositing the instrument of ratification or accession to the Convention on Cybercrime.
- To encourage T-CY representatives to support the process of consultations with regard to requests for accession in line with the T-CY workplan.
- To recall that invitations to accede are valid for a period of five years, and that once a State has acceded to the Convention, accession to the first Protocol and signature and ratification of the Second Protocol are possible at any time.

Item 4 – Information provided by Parties and Observers

- To welcome the information provided by Albania, Argentina, Armenia, Azerbaijan, Bosnia and Herzegovina, Brazil, Cabo Verde, Canada, Chile, Colombia, Costa Rica, Czechia, Dominican Republic, Ecuador, Fiji, France, Germany, Ghana, Israel, Italy, Kenya, Korea, Mauritius, Moldova, Monaco, Morocco, Mozambique, Montenegro, New Zealand, North Macedonia, Nigeria, Norway, Panama, Papua New Guinea, São Tomé and Príncipe, Sierra Leone, Slovakia, Spain, Tunisia, Tonga, Trinidad and Tobago, Türkiye, United Kingdom, United States of America, Vanuatu as well as the European Union (Commission and EUROJUST).
- To welcome the progress made in strengthening domestic legal and institutional frameworks to ensure more effective access to electronic evidence and enhanced international cooperation under the Budapest Convention and its Second Additional Protocol.
- To note that much of the progress made by Parties and Observers is due to capacity building activities by the Cybercrime Programme Office of the Council of Europe (C-PROC).

Item 5 – Second Protocol on enhanced cooperation and disclosure of electronic evidence (CETS 224)

- To underline the relevance of the tools of the Second Protocol for an effective criminal justice response to the challenges of cybercrime and electronic evidence.
- To welcome imminent signature of the Second Protocol by additional States.
- To welcome steps taken by Parties to implement the provisions of the Second Protocol in domestic law.
- To encourage Parties to the Convention to accelerate the process of ratification so as to permit this Protocol to enter into force as soon as possible.
- To note that capacity building projects of C-PROC are available to support States in the implementation of this Protocol.

- To take note of the ongoing work on the templates for requests and orders under Articles 6–9 of the Second Protocol, and to invite the CyberSPEX project to continue their development, keep the T-CY Bureau informed on progress, and present an update at the next Plenary in view of endorsement of these templates by the T-CY.
- To invite T-CY members to provide comments to these templates to the T-CY Secretariat by 31 January 2026.

Item 6 – T-CY Workplan 2026 – 2027

- To adopt the T-CY Workplan for 2026 – 2027.

Item 7 – T-CY assessments

- To adopt the questionnaire on follow up provided by Parties to Recommendations of the Article 19 Assessment report and to invite all Parties to contribute to this follow up by submitting replies to the questionnaire by 30 June 2026.

Item 8 – T-CY Working Group on Artificial Intelligence

- To take note of the update provided by the T-CY working group on cybercrime, electronic evidence and artificial intelligence.
- To note that Gareth Sansom (Canada) has stepped down as Chair of the working group and to express its appreciation for his contributions.
- To thank Claudio Peguero (Dominican Republic) for chairing the in-person meeting of the working group in Strasbourg on 11 November 2025 and to invite him to chair the working group.
- To encourage C-PROC to further engage in capacity-building on cybercrime, e-evidence and artificial intelligence in conjunction with the working group to ensure a focused and coherent approach.

Item 9 – Capacity building

- To note with great appreciation the achievements of the Cybercrime Programme Office of the Council of Europe (C-PROC) in Romania and to underline their support on the promotion and implementation of the Convention on Cybercrime and its Protocols and on strengthening the criminal justice capacities on cybercrime and electronic evidence in many States.
- To recognise the technical assistance provided by C-PROC in addressing the emergency cybercrime threats and enhancing the international cooperation on cybercrime and electronic evidence.
- To welcome the close cooperation between the T-CY and C-PROC for ensuring a strategic and coherent approach on the capacity building efforts.
- To thank Canada, Japan, Malta, the Netherlands and the United Kingdom for recent voluntary contributions and the European Union for the co-funding of joint projects.
- To invite T-CY members and other donors and organisations to partner with C-PROC and to consider voluntary contributions in order to permit the continuation of current and the launch of additional projects by C-PROC.

Item 10 –Virtual assets and the relevance of the Convention on Cybercrime and its Second Protocol

- To take note of the update on a draft mapping study on virtual assets and the relevance of the Convention on Cybercrime.
- To invite T-CY Members to provide the T-CY Bureau and Secretariat with supplementary information, as necessary.
- To request the Secretariat to share the compilation of replies to the questionnaire with T-CY members and observers.
- To invite additional members and observers to submit their replies to the questionnaire by 31 January, should they wish to do so.

Item 11 – Functioning of the 24/7 Network of contact points and Directory of authorities for extradition and mutual assistance

- To welcome that 24/7 contact points are in place in all current Parties to the Convention, and are able to respond in an expedited manner and, in particular, the increasing operational use of the 24/7 Network.
- To encourage members of the 24/7 Network to continue promoting it at the national level, given the network's value for international cooperation.
- To underline the continuous support provided by C-PROC through the capacity building projects to the establishment and further strengthening the capacities of 24/7 contact points.
- To welcome the complementary directory of authorities for mutual assistance (Article 27) and extradition (Article 24) under the Convention on Cybercrime prepared by the T-CY Secretariat, and to invite Parties that have not yet done so to provide the information needed to complete the directory as soon as possible.
- To note that Parties may also consider updating their declarations regarding these authorities on the website of the Treaty Office of the Council of Europe.
- To welcome The Council of Europe's Committee of Experts on the Operation of European Conventions on Co-operation in Criminal Matters (PC-OC) presentation on country information on the PC-OC website.
- To invite Parties to indicate by 15 December 2025 any information in the complementary directory of authorities for Articles 24 and 27 that they do not wish to be made public, and to request the T-CY Secretariat to make the directory publicly available on the website of the T-CY and the Cybercrime Division, taking into account the indications provided by Parties.

Item 12 - Guidance Notes

- To invite the T-CY Bureau to reflect on the topics proposed by the T-CY members, such as, for example on unlawful cyber activities occurring on the darknet, such as "crime-as-a-service" (Article 6), "jurisdiction" (Article 22) or 24/7 Network (Article 35).

Item 13 – Cyberviolence

- To thank T-CY members and observers for their replies to the questionnaire.
- To invite additional members and observers to submit their replies to the questionnaire by 31 January 2026, should they wish to do so.
- To request the T-CY Secretariat to update the Council of Europe’s online Cyberviolence Resource based on the replies submitted by T-CY Members and observers.
- To underline the importance on synergies between the work of the T-CY and the Lanzarote Committee, and to agree to hold a joint session with the Lanzarote Committee on the morning of 2 June 2026.

Item 14 – UN treaty process

- To take note of the signing ceremony of the “United Nations Convention against Cybercrime” (25-26 October 2025, Hanoi, Viet Nam) at which 72 States signed this Convention.
- To note that this treaty is largely consistent with the Convention on Cybercrime (Budapest Convention) and comprises human rights and rule of law safeguards, while at the same time taking note of concerns raised by civil society, industry and other stakeholders.
- To support the involvement of stakeholders in the future work related to the UN treaty.
- To consider that possible synergies between the Convention on Cybercrime and the UN treaty should be explored, including with respect to capacity building activities.
- To encourage Parties and observers to participate in the next session of the Ad Hoc Committee to prepare the draft text of the rules of procedure for the Conference of the States Parties to the UN Convention against Cybercrime (Vienna, Austria, 26-30 January 2026).

Item 15 – Financial resourcing of the T-CY

- To take note that the T-CY is partially funded by the Ordinary Budget of the Council of Europe but also relies on voluntary contributions given that many Parties to the Convention are not members of the Council of Europe and, therefore, do not contribute to the Ordinary Budget of the organisation.
- To note that the T-CY faces a funding deficit with the Octopus Project lacking adequate resources, that may impact its ability to carry out T-CY’s planned activities in 2026.
- Therefore, to strongly encourage Parties and observers to the T-CY to provide voluntary contributions to the Octopus Project – in line with the decision taken by the T-CY in 2013 and as foreseen in Article 12.1 of the T-CY Rules of Procedure – to permit the functioning of the T-CY in 2026.

Item 16 – Meetings with stakeholders

- To welcome the T-CY exchange with industry and service providers held prior to this plenary on 12 November 2025 and to thank the CyberSPEX joint project of the Council of Europe and the European Union for its support in the organisation of this exchange.
- To underline the importance of engagement with stakeholders, and to hold a meeting with civil society, the private sector, and other relevant stakeholders to exchange views and share information on the afternoon of 2 June 2026.

Item 17 – Any other business

Item 18 – Date of the 34th and 35th T-CY Plenary

- To hold T-CY 34 from 2 to 4 June 2026 in Strasbourg, including a joint session with the Lanzarote Committee on the morning of 2 June, and a meeting with stakeholders in the afternoon of the same day.
- To hold T-CY 35 from 12 to 13 October 2026 in Strasbourg, followed by the Octopus Conference from 14 to 16 October 2026.
