Directory of authorities for extradition and mutual assistance

28th T-CY (June 2023):

- To request the T-CY Secretariat to prepare the draft of a complementary directory of authorities for mutual assistance (Article 27) and extradition (Article 24) under the Convention on Cybercrime for consideration by the T-CY

31st T-CY Plenary (Dec 2024):

- To welcome the complementary directory of authorities for mutual assistance (Article 27) and extradition (Article 24) under the Convention on Cybercrime prepared by the T-CY Secretariat, and to invite Parties that have not yet done so to provide the information needed to complete the directory.
- To note that Parties may also consider updating their declarations regarding these authorities on the website of the Treaty Office of the Council of Europe.
