62nd meeting of the Monitoring Group of the Anti-Doping Convention (T-DO)

Council of Europe, Strasbourg, France
3-4 March 2026

Final list of adopted decisions

At its 62nd meeting, held in Strasbourg and online on 3 and 4 March 2026, the Monitoring Group of the Anti-Doping Convention (T-DO), with Michał Rynkowski (Poland) in the chair:

1. adopted the agenda [document T-DO(2026)06rev2];
2. adopted the report of the 61st meeting [document T-DO(2025)34];
3. took note of the update by the Chair on the Coordination Group's activities, including the continuation of the T-DO Strategy and Programme, recent meetings of the T-DO COMP and T-DO LI in London hosted by UKAD, the successful completion of the World Anti-Doping Programme consultations, the outcomes of the UNESCO Conference of Parties, the World Conference on Doping in Sport, as well as the report developed by the Spanish delegation regarding the improvements to the testing programme to be discussed at the next Coordination Group meeting in May 2026;
4. took note of the information provided by the Secretariat regarding the 2026 budget and staffing update, and thanked the delegations of Estonia, Finland, and Norway for their financial contribution to the project 'Implementation and International Co-ordination of Anti-Doping Policies and Practices' (ICAP), which supports the OneVoice platform and T-DO monitoring activities;
5. took note of the information that Türkiye signed the Additional Protocol to the Convention ([ETS 188](#)) on 20 January 2026;
6. took note of the update on recent developments in Belgium, Cyprus, France, Poland, Romania, Spain, and the United Kingdom;
7. welcomed the presentation of the International Paralympic Committee (IPC) and the application for Observer Status and agreed that the request will be addressed by written procedure;
8. took note of the interventions by Observers and external partners, including Interpol, UEFA, International Handball Federation, World Rugby, European Handball Federation, WADA, International Testing Agency (ITA), United States of America, and UNESCO;
9. confirmed the readiness to contribute to and participate in the International Conference on Limiting the availability of doping substances in the European market on 28 May in Paris, with formal invitations and call for registrations opening soon;

10. took note of the Conclusions of the 2025 Bergen Conference: Bringing European NADOs Together to Strengthen National Systems, and agreed to follow up as appropriate with relevant stakeholders;
11. took note of the progress report of the T-DO Strategy and Operational Programme for 2024–2027, and invited the Coordination Group to consider the implementation of the Sustainable Development Goals at their next meeting;
12. welcomed the update on the available support from the Monitoring Group to the States parties in the implementation of the 2027 World Anti-Doping Programme, and thanked Chairs of T-DO COMP and T-DO LI, as well as colleagues from WADA for their contributions;
13. supported the suggested approach for the preparation of recommendations on criminal and administrative law measures to restrict the availability of doping substances and methods, and decided to issue a call for nominations to a drafting group to be set up with the aim of developing the Recommendation and its accompanying Explanatory Memorandum;
14. took note of the discussion on children and minors in anti-doping and encouraged the T-DO LI to continue work on this subject and determine how best to proceed with the development of guidelines and/or a good practices document;
15. took note of the update by the Deputy Chair of T-DO ED, and supported the plan to organise the next meeting in London, in September this year;
16. took note of the update by the Chair of T-DO SCI on the results of the survey on contamination cases and invited to consider producing a compilation of good practices or guidelines for dealing with such cases;
17. welcomed the progress report of the Ad Hoc Group of Experts on Gender Mainstreaming in Anti-Doping (T-DO GEMA), and agreed on the next steps towards the drafting of the Recommendation;
18. adopted the Evaluation Report of the visit to Bosnia and Herzegovina held on 26-28 November 2024 [document T-DO(2025)25], and thanked all contributors;
19. heard the presentation of the Evaluation Report of the visit to Liechtenstein held on 6-8 October 2025 [document T-DO(2026)11] and agreed to adopt it by written procedure;
20. took note of the status of Evaluation Reports for Canada and Monaco, to be finalised in due course;
21. adopted the follow-up reports for Hungary [document T-DO(2026)16] and Portugal [document T-DO(2026)17], and formally closed the respective evaluation cycles;
22. took note of the follow-up report from Sweden, which will be reviewed by the T-DO COMP for recommendations at the next meeting;
23. adopted the revised T-DO Evaluation Schedule [document T-DO(2026)01] and welcomed the invitation from San Marino to host an evaluation visit in November 2026;
24. conditionally adopted the proposed amendments to the Annual Anti-Doping Policy Questionnaire, and agreed these may be approved in principle for 2025 data collection;
25. welcomed the ongoing development of dynamic dashboards and thanked UKAD for its contribution;
26. agreed to hold the 63rd T-DO meeting on 3–4 September 2026 in Strasbourg (final date to be confirmed);

27. thanked all Delegations, Observers, experts, interpreters, technicians and the Secretariat for their invaluable contributions to the success of the 62nd meeting of the Monitoring Group of the Anti-Doping Convention.
