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A word from the President

Dear readers.

Dear readers, I am pleased to present to you the first activity report of the Group of Copenhagen (GoC).

Two years ago, I was elected President of this network of National Platforms against the manipulation of sports competitions.

With the cooperation of a dedicated Secretariat, an excellent Vice-President and a motivated Bureau, the achievements of this group have been very encouraging. Thanks to our common tools, such as the notice and surveillance templates and the Logbook, we have made significant progress in the fight against competition manipulation. We have also set up several working groups to improve national platforms (UP NPs), alert processing (ALERTS), monitoring of big international sports events (Monitoring) and relations with other organisations (LINKS). We have also initiated different projects with external partners, such as the Football Local Alerts Global Strategy (FLAGS) project, the prospective study on the use of Performance analysis, or even the MotivAction project, which is the first project of the GoC funded by the European Union. Finally, in connection with the Secretariat, the late Belgian Federal Prosecutor Eric Bisschopp and the Deputy Prosecutor of Marseille Jean-Yves Lourgouilloux, we were at the initiative of the creation of the network of Magistrates Responsible for Sport (MARS), to allow us to strengthen the fight against match-fixing.

This year will feature major events, such as Euro 2024 and the Paris 2024 Olympic and Paralympic Games. I would like us to set up a training programme for platform coordinators. I am confident that by launching a new initiatives, in conjunction with the MARS network, we will further improve our effectiveness to fight against networks of manipulators of sports competitions. Finally, by developing the Logbook 2.0 hosted on a secure website of the Council of Europe and by improving follow the money in match fixing, we will further consolidate our role as the operational arm of the Macolin Convention. The Group of Copenhagen

The Group of Copenhagen (GoC), also known as the network of national platforms, is the advisory group of the Follow-up Committee of the Macolin Convention. It is tasked with monitoring suspicious competitions and enhancing the development of National Platforms for combating manipulation of sports competitions, as stipulated in Article 13 of the Macolin Convention.

National Platforms bring together various stakeholders who can combat the manipulation of sports competitions at the national level. Each state is free to organise its Platform as it sees fit, provided that its organisation does not contravene the principles of the Convention.

Most often, the Platforms bring together the Ministries of Sports, Justice, Finance, and the Interior from member countries, as well as betting operators, magistrates, national law enforcement agencies, and national sports organisations such as the National Olympic Committees. The National Platforms also cooperate with international police agencies and international sports federations. They share the information they have among themselves to effectively monitor, detect, and punish manipulations of sports competitions.

The GoC also has the power to initiate actions in implementing the Convention. It can set up working groups on issues it considers necessary to analyse and can launch projects to complement the actions of the Follow-up Committee. The GoC has initiated several projects, such as the FLAGS project, developed with FIFA and UEFA to support investigations on specific teams, and the MARS network, a network of magistrates specialising in sports-related criminal matters."



The tools of the GoC

Notices

In March 2016, the National Platforms adopted a shared notice system to estimate the seriousness of suspicions of manipulation in a competition. This shared system enables better cooperation between the National Platforms.

There are 4 levels of notices:

Green notices (normal competition): no special supervision

Yellow notices (suspicions and rumors): order to notify other National Platforms as well as betting operators, register the suspicious team or player in the Logbook)

Orange notices (probable manipulation but no undeniable proof): order to notify the other national platforms as well as the sports federations and the local police

Red notices (serious and corroborating evidence): order to start collecting evidence for the investigation and contact the police)

Surveillance systems

A competition can be placed under thorough surveillance if the GoC has suspicious information about it (team already involved in a corruption case, unusual odds, unusual bets, rumors, etc.).

There are 3 levels of surveillance:

Normal surveillance: nothing to report.

Enhanced surveillance: The GoC as a whole is notified. The GoC identifies contact points close to the competition and in the local police.

Maximum surveillance: Increased surveillance of betting and odds movements on the competition. Enhanced dialogue between GoC members, enhanced dialogue at national and international level, with notification of INTERPOL and EUROPOL. Systematic collection of evidence. Identification of contact points in the sports federations. The competition organisers must seize evidence.



The tools of the GoC

The Logbook

The logbook is a tool developed to record and store information relating to manipulated or suspicious competitions. It is shared with all members of the GoC and constitutes a substantial database listing all suspicious matches.

By compiling this logbook of suspicious and/or manipulated matches, based on a large number of cases, the GoC has created an important tool for studying the phenomenon of manipulation in sport. The logbook makes it possible to observe the major trends in this phenomenon, and to know which regions and clubs are most affected. It also shows at what time of the year suspicious bets are made.



The Working groups

The Group of Copenhagen is working on a number of issues through various working groups:

The "upgrading national platforms" group:

is devoted to improving national platforms to combat the manipulation of sporting competitions.

The "Alerts" working group:

helps to define the criteria for determining whether a situation should be reported to the GoC. It also aims to reduce the GoC's alert threshold to ensure that fewer suspicious activities go unnoticed. It also develops technical tools for the National Platforms.

The "E-sport" working group:

is working on the specific field of E-sport, a discipline that is not open to betting in many countries, but which is highly prone to manipulation, whether for financial or sporting reasons. There are many ways of manipulating an E-sport competition, and they are difficult to detect.

The Monitoring of Major Sport Competitions Group:

seeks to develop common and effective competition surveillance strategies and sets the GoC's surveillance agenda.

The Links Group (Mission reassigned to the Bureau):

aims to help expand the community of Macolin by increasing its public visibility and encouraging new countries to join and set up their own national platforms to fight the competition manipulation.

The Performance Working Group (Mission fulfilled):

studied the potential benefits of new real-time competition monitoring technologies based on artificial intelligence (AI) to detect cases of competition manipulation through the analysis of the players' performances. Three companies providing such services were studied.

The "typology of sports manipulation" working group (mission fulfilled):

attempts to give an overview of the different types of manipulation that exist.

ACT Project

The Council of Europe's ACT project seeks to strengthen cooperation between the member countries of the Macolin Convention. The aim of the project is to assist countries that are encountering difficulties in implementing the Convention so that they can achieve the objectives set out in the Convention.

A member country of the Macolin Convention may request the assistance of other countries to help it develop an effective National Platform against the Manipulation of Sports Competitions, as well as laws to effectively combat the manipulation of sports competitions.

The donors for the ACT project include the World Lottery Association (WLA), the Ministry of Culture and Equality of Norway, European Lotteries (EL), the French Ministry of Sports, the Swiss Federal Institute of Sports, the French National Olympic and Sports Committee, Française des Jeux (FDJ), and the Cyprus Sport Organisation.

6-31 July 2022

Monitoring of the Women's Euro Football Championship

The national platforms of the GoC participated in monitoring the competition in cooperation with UEFA.

FLAGS project

The Group of Copenhagen launched on June 30th, 2021, with the support of FIFA, the Football Local Alerts Global Strategy (FLAGS) project. This new initiative drew upon the expertise of several key partners: GLMS, IBIA, Sportradar, Startizard, and StatsPerform, as well as UEFA, INTERPOL, and several prosecutors. This project took this surveillance system to the next level by bringing together key stakeholders in the fight against match-fixing to collectively support investigations into specific football teams.

5 football teams were monitored during the project, resulting in the opening of 3 judicial investigations and 2 disciplinary investigations.

Publication of the performance report

This report explores how new technologies for analysing athletes' performances in real time could help identify the manipulation of sports competitions

The conclusion is that performance analysis can be useful for helping law enforcement agencies in their investigations, but it is insufficient to prove that a competition has been manipulated. This must be corroborated by serious and consistent indications, such as suspicious betting patterns





GROWTH IN THE NUMBER OF NOTICES OVER THE PERIOD 2019 / 2023




PANOMORA BY CRITICALITY LEVEL FOR THE PERIOD 2019 - 2023
