MAIN TASKS V

Under the authority of the Committee of Ministers, the CMJ will oversee the Council of Europe's programme in the youth field and advise the Committee of Ministers on all questions within its area of competence. The CMJ, within the framework of the Council of Europe policy established by the Committee of Ministers, is the policy-making body of the youth sector, bringing together the members of the European Steering Committee for Youth (CDEJ) and the Advisory Council on Youth (CCJ).

In particular, the CMJ is instructed to:

- ensure the follow-up of the relevant decisions taken at the 131st Session of the Committee of Ministers (Hamburg, 21 May (i) 2021),² and in particular contribute to the implementation of the key strategic priorities relating to its specific field of expertise as identified in the Strategic Framework of the Council of Europe, and respond to the respective key findings and challenges set out in the Secretary General's 2021 Report on the state of democracy, human rights and rule of law "A democratic renewal for Europe";
- develop jointly between member States and non-governmental youth organisations standards of European youth policy (ii) with a view to submitting them, where appropriate, to the Committee of Ministers and other relevant bodies of the Council of Europe
- prepare the priorities and expected results of the youth sector and apportion the budgetary means available in the political (iii) and budgetary framework established by the Committee of Ministers;
- establish the youth sector's structure and policy for its programme, in particular through the Strasbourg and Budapest (iv) European Youth Centres and the European Youth Foundation;
- contribute to the effective mainstreaming of youth policies into the Council of Europe's programme of activities; (v)
- (vi) contribute to the cross-cutting activities of the Council of Europe that concern and impact youth, including as appropriate in the field of artificial intelligence;
- (vii) where appropriate, contribute to the preparation of the Council of Europe Conferences of Ministers responsible for Youth and ensure, as appropriate, that any decisions taken by the Committee of Ministers subsequent to the Conferences are followed up:
- (viii) identify opportunities for input and/or complementary measures and programmes by the Council of Europe taking into consideration the activities of other international organisations, in particular the European Union and the United Nations;
- implement the youth-related elements of the Council of Europe's thematic and country-specific action plans as necessary; (ix)
- support youth participation as a way of revitalising pluralistic democracy, with special emphasis on the implementation of (x) relevant Council of Europe standards, including the Recommendation on protecting youth civil society and young people and supporting their participation in democratic processes (subject to approval by the Committee of Ministers), Recommendation Rec(2006)14 on citizenship and participation of young people in public life, and Congress Resolution 152 (2003) on the revised European Charter on the Participation of Young People in Local and Regional Life;
- support young people's access to rights by promoting the implementation of the relevant Committee of Ministers' standards (xi) in this field, with special emphasis on: Recommendation CM/Rec(2016)7 on young people's access to rights, Recommendation <u>CM/Rec(2015)3</u> on the access of young people from disadvantaged neighbourhoods to social rights (ENTER Recommendation), and Recommendation <u>CM/Rec(2010)7</u> on the Council of Europe Charter on Education for Democratic Citizenship and Human Rights Education;
- support young people's capacities to promote peaceful and inclusive societies, notably through youth and education-policy (xii) measures which prevent and counter hate speech online with special emphasis on the implementation of relevant Council of Europe standards, including Recommendation CM/Rec(2019)4 on supporting young refugees in transition to adulthood;
- (xiii) support youth work as a way of increasing the possibilities for all young people to contribute actively to society in their living environment, with special emphasis on the implementation of relevant Council of Europe standards, including Recommendation CM/Rec(2017)4 on youth work and the European Youth Work Agenda.
- (xiv) regularly take stock of the implementation of the Council of Europe youth sector strategy 2030, as set out in Resolution CM/Res(2020)2;
- (xv) hold an exchange of views annually in order to evaluate its activities and advise the Committee of Ministers and the Secretary General on future priorities in its sector, including possible new activities and those that might be discontinued;
- (xvi) take due account of the following mainstreamed perspectives in the performance of its tasks: gender, children's rights, rights of persons with disabilities, and Roma and Traveller³ issues;

The present is an explanatory footnote, not a definition of Roma and/or Travellers.

- (xvii) where relevant, contribute to building cohesive societies and to strengthening the role and meaningful participation of civil society in its work;
- (xviii) contribute to the achievement of, and review progress towards, the UN 2030 Agenda for Sustainable Development, in particular with regards to Goal 1: No poverty; Goal 3: Good health and well-being; Goal 4: Quality Education; Goal 5: Gender Equality; Goal 8: Decent work and economic growth; Goal 10: Reduce inequality; Goal 11: Sustainable Cities and Communities and Goal 16: Peace, Justice and Strong institutions.
