Purchase of national intellectual consultancy services for the implementation of the Barnahus model in Ireland in the areas of interagency training, interviewing of children, awareness-raising and child participation

The Council of Europe is currently implementing the Project "Barnahus Ireland: Supporting the implementation of the Barnahus model in Ireland". It is co-financed by the EU Structural Reform Support Programme and implemented in close cooperation with the EU DG Reform and the Department of Children, Equality, Disability, Integration and Youth (DCEDIY) for the period 12/08/2022 to 11/02/2025.

In that context, it is looking for Providers for the provision of national intellectual consultancy services to provide technical assistance in the areas of 1) planning and delivery of interdisciplinary (non-legal) training for professionals on interagency coordination, interviewing of children, collaboration and case management 2) development of training for professionals carrying out medical examinations; 3) awareness raising materials and sensitisation activities and 4) child participation and child safeguarding.

TENDER RULES

This tender procedure is a competitive bidding procedure. **In accordance with Rule 1395 of the Secretary General of the Council of Europe on the procurement procedures of the Council of Europe¹, the Organisation shall invite to tender at least three potential providers for any purchase between €2,000 (or €5,000 for intellectual services) and €55,000 tax exclusive.**

This specific tender procedure aims at concluding a **framework contract** for the provision of deliverables described in the Act of Engagement (See attached). A tender is considered valid for 120 calendar days as from the closing date for submission. The selection of tenderers will be made in the light of the criteria indicated below. All tenderers will be informed in writing of the outcome of the procedure.

The tenderer must be either a natural person, a legal person or consortium of natural and/or legal person.

Tenders shall be submitted **by email only** (with attachments) **to the email address indicated in the table below, with the following reference in subject: National consultancy tender non-legal training and child participation– Barnahus Ireland.** Tenders addressed to another email address **will be rejected.**

A. EXPECTED DELIVERABLES

Background of the Project

Barnahus is a leading European model for a child-friendly multidisciplinary and interagency response to child sexual abuse.

Ireland successfully implemented the Children First Act 2015, which introduced mandatory reporting of suspected child abuse. In 2019 the DCEDIY provided finance to support the implementation of a pilot "One House" Barnahus project in Galway, which is part of the PROMISE II project. Since January 2022 the centre in Galway, known as Barnahus West, is operational and the Child and Family Agency (Tusla), the Health Service Executive (HSE) and the National Police (An Garda Síochána) are able to provide their services under the same roof. The current project sets to address the challenges faced during the implementation of the pilot and to replicate the Barnahus model in the South (Cork) and the East (Dublin).

The project has two main outputs:

1. The three Barnahus sites are initiated: the design and operations are set up, well coordinated and standardised
2. The Barnahus model is integrated into practice and staff is confident in its use and in applying interagency processes

In that context, the Council is looking for looking for a maximum of 45 Providers (provided enough tenders meet the criteria indicated below) for the provision of national intellectual consultancy services to provide technical assistance in the following areas: planning and delivery of interdisciplinary training and support for non-legal professionals on interagency coordination, interviewing of children, collaboration and case management; development of training for health professionals carrying out medical examinations; awareness raising materials and sensitisation activities; and child participation and child safeguarding policies in Ireland.

Experts and professionals from different fields and sectors with diverse experience are sought, including legal experts, academia, researchers, professionals with practical experience from working in Barnahus-type contexts and/or work relating to the identification of, and response to child sexual abuse and the sexual exploitation of children. .

This Contract is currently estimated to cover up 70 activities, to be held by 02 February 2025. This estimate is for information only and shall not constitute any sort of contractual commitment on the part of the Council of Europe. The Contract may potentially represent a higher or lower number of activities, depending on the evolving needs of the Organisation.

For information purposes only, the total budget of the project amounts to 666,667 Euros and the total amount of the object of present tender **shall not exceed 55,000 Euros tax exclusive** for the whole duration of the Framework Contract. This information does not constitute any sort of contractual commitment or obligation on the part of the Council of Europe.

Lots

The present tendering procedure aims to select Provider(s) to support the implementation of the project and is divided into for (4) lots as detailed below.

Relevant Council of Europe standards for all lots include the Council of Europe Convention on the Protection of children against sexual exploitation and sexual abuse (Lanzarote Convention), Council of Europe Guidelines on child-friendly justice, integrated national strategies for the protection of children from violence and the rights of the child in the digital environment.

Lot 1 concerns the provision of intellectual services for the **development of materials and other supporting tools** as well as **planning and delivery of interdisciplinary and targeted non-legal training** with an objective to facilitate and strengthen child-friendly interagency coordination, interviewing of children, collaboration and case management within Barnahus and among professionals working for and with children (public authorities, social workers, law enforcement officers, health care professionals, psychologists, educators and other relevant child protection actors).

Lot 2 concerns the provision of intellectual services for the **development of materials, strategies and programmes and other supporting tools** as well as **planning and delivery training and support** for health professionals carrying out or performing **medical examinations of child victims of sexual abuse..**

Lot 3 concerns the provision of intellectual services for the **development of awareness-raising and sensitisation materials to promote and explain the Barnahus model** and for the **prevention and protection of children against** child sexual exploitation and abuse offline and in the digital environment. The target groups for awareness raising, sensitisation and promotional activities include children, parents, professionals working with and for children and their families as well as the wider public in Ireland.

Lot 4 concerns the provision of intellectual services related to the **development of strategies, guidance and other supporting tools** related to **child participation** and **child safeguarding** as well as **planning and delivery of training and facilitation of activities** in these areas.

The Council will select the abovementioned number of Provider(s) per lot, provided enough tenders meet the criteria indicated below. Tenderers are invited to indicate which lot(s) they are tendering for (see Section A of the Act of Engagement).

Scope of the Framework Contract

The pre-selected Providers may be requested to work independently or as part of a team with other Provider(s). Throughout the duration of the Framework Contract, pre-selected Providers may be asked to provide the following types of services:

Under **Lot 1: Targeted and interdisciplinary (non-legal) training and support for professionals working for and with children with focus on interagency coordination, interviewing of children, collaboration and case management.**

- Assessment of training needs (for non-legal professionals) and gaps of target groups in Ireland;
- Mapping of existing training materials and identification of good practices at national, European and/or international level for potential replication in Ireland;
- Development and adaptation of training courses, programmes, strategies and training materials (e.g. session plans, manuals, guidebooks, etc.) relevant to the lot, the needs of target groups and the context in Ireland (including police, child protection services, educators, social and health care workers, etc);
- Conducting targeted and/or multi-actor trainings relevant to the lot;
- Support for the development of internal guidelines, protocols, checklists, terms of references, other tools and materials to strengthen and facilitate interagency coordination, interviewing of children, collaboration within Barnahus, data collection and management of cases of child sexual exploitation and abuse at national, regional and local levels.
- Advice and consultation on the physical infrastructure of Barnahus based on lessons learnt and best practices from other countries;
- Mentoring beneficiaries on specific working processes and/or cases relevant to the lot;

- Participation and contribution to conferences, roundtables, seminars, trainings, working group meetings, workshops, consultation meetings and other relevant events with national stakeholders, including through moderating/facilitating discussions and delivering presentations.

Under **Lot 2: Training and support for health professionals carrying out medical examinations of child victims of child sexual exploitation and abuse.**

- Research of existing practices relevant to the lot;
- Assessment of needs and gaps of target groups for training and sensitisation relevant to the lot in Ireland;
- Mapping of existing training, programmes and strategies and identification of good practices at national, European and/or international level for potential replication in Ireland;
- Development and adaptation of training courses, programmes, strategies and training materials (e.g. session plans, manuals, guidebooks, etc.) relevant to the lot, the needs of target groups and the context in Ireland;
- Conducting training relevant to the lot;
- Support for the development of internal guidelines, protocols, checklists, other tools and materials to strengthen and guide the forensic medical examination within Barnahus;
- Design and development of strategies, activities and tools for sensitisation for target groups;
- Mentoring beneficiaries on specific working processes and/or cases relevant to the lot;
- Participation and contribution to conferences, roundtables, seminars, trainings, working group meetings, workshops, consultation meetings and other relevant events with national stakeholders, including through moderating/facilitating discussions and delivering presentations.

Under **Lot 3: Awareness raising and sensitisation of target groups on the Barnahus model and on child sexual exploitation and abuse both online and offline**

- Drafting, development and adaptation of awareness raising, prevention and informational materials for different target groups (children, parents, educators, wider public) in one or more of the following areas: risks and consequences of child sexual exploitation and abuse (CSEA), detection and reporting of CSEA, the Barnahus model and the interagency approach in Ireland, rights of the child including in the digital environment (e.g. data protection, right to correspondence and privacy), online safety, etc.;
- Disseminating materials and implementing awareness-raising campaigns;
- Participation and contribution to conferences, roundtables, seminars, trainings, working group meetings, workshops, consultation meetings and other relevant events with national stakeholders, including through moderating/facilitating discussions and delivering presentations.

Under **Lot 4: Child participation and child safeguarding**

- Development of strategies, internal guidelines, procedures, checklists, other tools and materials on child participation and child safeguarding in Barnahus and during the management of child sexual abuse cases, including child sexual exploitation, from the initial report, referral to Barnahus and to court proceedings and convictions;
- Conducting child consultations to facilitate their participation in the design of relevant legal and policy instruments.
- Drafting and preparation of child-friendly materials inspired by good practice examples at national/European/international level, including child-friendly age-appropriate materials for children and adolescents in contact with the judicial system and support services;
- Development of methodologies for carrying out child participation activities and support for the facilitation, follow-up and analysis of child consultations;
- Mapping of existing training materials on child safeguarding and identification of good practices at national, European and/or international level for potential replication in Ireland;
- Assessment of training needs and gaps of target groups as relevant to the lot;
- Conducting training relevant to the lot;
- Mentoring beneficiaries and partners on specific working processes relevant to the lot;
- Child participation and contribution to conferences, roundtables, seminars, trainings, working group meetings, workshops, consultation meetings and other relevant events with national stakeholders, including through moderating/facilitating discussions and delivering presentations.

The above list is not considered exhaustive. The Council reserves the right to request deliverables not explicitly mentioned in the above list of expected services, but related to the field of expertise object of the present Framework Contract for the lot concerned.]

In terms of **quality requirements**, the pre-selected Service Providers must ensure, *inter alia*, that:

- The services are provided to the highest professional/academic standard;
- Any specific instructions given by the Council – whenever this is the case – are followed.

If contracted by the Council of Europe, the deliverables shall be provided personally by the persons identified in the offer of the Provider whose CVs have been presented to the Council of Europe (See section E. below), in accordance with the terms as provided in the present Tender File and Act of Engagement]

In addition to the orders requested on an as needed basis, the Provider shall keep regular communication with the Council to ensure continuing exchange of information relevant to the project implementation. This involves, among others, to inform the Council as soon as it becomes aware, during the execution of the Contract, of any initiatives and/or adopted laws and regulations, policies, strategies or action plans or any other development related to the object of the Contract (see more on general obligations of the Provider in Article 3.1.2 of the Legal Conditions in the Act of Engagement).

Written documents produced by the Provider shall be in English.

B. FEES

Tenderers are invited to indicate their fees, by completing and sending the table of fees, as attached in Section A to the Act of Engagement. These fees are final and not subject to review. Tenders proposing fees above the exclusion level indicated in the Table of fees will be **entirely and automatically** excluded from the tender procedure.

The Council will indicate on each Order Form (see Section C below) the global fee corresponding to each deliverable, calculated on the basis of the unit fees, as agreed by this Contract.

C. HOW WILL THIS FRAMEWORK CONTRACT WORK? (ORDERING PROCEDURE)

Once the selection procedure is completed, you will be informed accordingly. Deliverables will then be delivered on the basis of Order Forms submitted by the Council to the selected Provider (s), by post or electronically, on **an as needed basis** (there is therefore no obligation to order on the part of the Council).

Pooling

For each Order, the Council will choose from the pool of pre-selected tenderers for the relevant lot the Provider who demonstrably offers best value for money for its requirement when assessed – for the Order concerned – against the criteria of:

- quality (including as appropriate: capability, expertise, past performance, availability of resources and proposed methods of undertaking the work);
- availability (including, without limitation, capacity to meet required deadlines and, where relevant, geographical location); and
- price.

Each time an Order Form is sent, the selected Provider undertakes to take all the necessary measures to send it **signed** to the Council within 2 (two) working days after its reception. If a Provider is unable to take an Order or if no reply is given on his behalf within that deadline, the Council may call on another Provider using the same criteria, and so on until a suitable Provider is contracted.

Providers subject to VAT

The Provider, **if subject to VAT**, shall also send, together with each signed Form, a quote² (Pro Forma invoice) in line with the indications specified on each Order Form, and including:

In case of non-compliance with the fees as indicated in the original Provider's tender, the Council of Europe reserves the right to terminate the Contract with the Provider, in all or in part.

- the Service Provider's name and address;
- its VAT number;
- the full list of services;
- the fee per type of deliverables (in the currency indicated on the Act of Engagement, tax exclusive);
- the total amount per type of deliverables (in the currency indicated on the Act of Engagement, tax exclusive);
- the total amount (in the currency indicated on the Act of Engagement), tax exclusive, the applicable VAT rate, the amount of VAT and the amount VAT inclusive.

Signature of orders

An Order Form is considered to be legally binding when the Order, signed by the Provider, is approved by the Council, by displaying a Council's Purchase Order number on the Order, as well as by signing and stamping the Order concerned. Copy of each approved Order Form shall be sent to the Provider, to the extent possible on the day of its signature.

D. ASSESSMENT

Exclusion criteria and absence of conflict of interests

(by signing the Act of Engagement, you declare on your honour not being in any of the below situations)³

Tenderers shall be excluded from participating in the tender procedure if they:

- have been sentenced by final judgment on one or more of the following charges: participation in a criminal organisation, corruption, fraud, money laundering, terrorist financing, terrorist offences or offences linked to terrorist activities, child labour or trafficking in human beings;
- are in a situation of bankruptcy, liquidation, termination of activity, insolvency or arrangement with creditors or any like situation arising from a procedure of the same kind, or are subject to a procedure of the same kind;
- have received a judgment with res judicata force, finding an offence that affects their professional integrity or serious professional misconduct;
- do not comply with their obligations as regards payment of social security contributions, taxes and dues, according to the statutory provisions of their country of incorporation, establishment or residence;
- are an entity created to circumvent tax, social or other legal obligations (empty shell company), have ever created or are in the process of creation of such an entity;
- have been involved in mismanagement of the Council of Europe funds or public funds;
- are or appear to be in a situation of conflict of interest;
- are retired Council of Europe staff members or are staff members having benefitted from an early departure scheme;
- are or if their owner(s) or executive officer(s), in the case of legal persons, are included in the lists of persons or entities subject to restrictive measures applied by the European Union (available at www.sanctionsmap.eu).

Eligibility criteria

For natural persons:

- **For all Lots:**
 - A university/higher education degree in law, social sciences, human rights/children's rights or a related field;
 - At least 3 years of professional experience at international level or at national level of the country of residence/origin in the areas related to the fields of expertise as described within the specific Lots under the scope of this contract;
 - Good written and verbal command of English.
- **For Lot 2 (Training and support for medical examinations) in addition:**
 - **Medical examinations:** At least 3 years of experience as a paediatrician, an academician or a professional in a related field; at least 1 year of experience from performing medical

examinations on children with documented experience on child sexual abuse cases OR at least 3 years of experience from research.

For legal persons:

Same requirements as for natural persons mentioned above, to be applied for the natural persons allocated to the execution of the contract.

Award criteria

- Quality of the offer (70%), including:
 - Professional experience in the fields of expertise covered by this tender, including length of experience and proven track record of practical achievements in the given field;
 - If provided, relevance and quality of examples and sample deliverables (e.g. draft materials recently produced, training outlines or training methodologies employed);
 - Practical experience from working in a Barnahus-type context is considered as an advantage.
- Financial offer (30%).

The Council reserves the right to hold interviews with tenderers.

Multiple tendering is not authorised.

E. NEGOTIATIONS

The Council reserves the right to hold negotiations with the bidders in accordance with Article 20 of Rule 1395.

F. DOCUMENTS TO BE PROVIDED

- **A completed and signed copy of the Act of Engagement⁴** (See attached);
- A **detailed CV**, preferably in Europass Format, demonstrating clearly that the tenderer fulfils the eligibility criteria;
- A list of all owners and executive officers, for legal persons only;
- CVs of persons allocated to the execution of the contract, for legal persons only;
- **Motivation letter (optional)** demonstrating the tenderer's understanding of the Council of Europe needs and clearly indicating relevant professional experience and expertise for the lot(s) tendered for;
- Additional, as relevant: links and/or samples of previous work if in English or French.

All documents shall be submitted in English, failure to do so will result in the exclusion of the tender.

If any of the documents listed above are missing, the Council of Europe reserves the right to reject the tender.

The Council reserves the right to reject a tender if the scanned documents are of such a quality that the documents cannot be read once printed.

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⁴ The Act of Engagement must be completed, signed and scanned in its entirety (i.e. including all the pages). The scanned Act of Engagement may be sent page by page (attached to a single email) or as a compiled document, although a compiled document would be preferred. For all scanned documents, .pdf files are preferred.
