### **(1) The big picture**



The [FORUM](#) of the No Hate Speech Movement was held on 1-5 October in Gabala, Azerbaijan bringing together some 250 participants from 40 countries. A [Message](#) from the Forum to the Council of Europe sums up the expectations placed by participants – activists, national coordinators and partners – on the Council of Europe and the member states to respond to the challenges and issues faced by the campaign. In her message to the participants, Snežana Samardžić-Marković, Director General for Democracy of the Council of Europe, acknowledged their “commitment and action for human rights everywhere” as an important signal that the combat for human rights and democracy for all is not over: “Democratic security needs to be rooted in a culture of human rights, and this has to include cyberspace too”. The Forum was held in the framework of the Azerbaijan chairmanship of the Committee of Ministers and co-organised with the Ministry of Youth and Sport of Azerbaijan, in close cooperation with the National Assembly of Youth Organisations of the Republic of Azerbaijan. The [NHSM Petition](#) to make 22 July European Day for Victims of Hate Crime has now been signed by 3719 people. We encourage more

signatures in order to support this Recommendation - the more people sign, the better chances of succeeding in obtaining the declaration by the Committee of Ministers. *Have you invited your colleagues to sign it?*

The Follow-up Group on the NHSM met in Strasbourg on 23 - 25 October.

The second meeting of the NHSM National Campaign Coordinators will be held in Warsaw on 10 -11 November in cooperation with the Polish campaign committee and with the financial support of the Stefan Batory Foundation, Polish operator of the EEA-Norway Grants NGO programme in Poland.

The Regional training course *Connexions*, was held in Namur, Belgium, from 15 to 19 October 2014, in cooperation with the *Bureau International de la Jeunesse* of the French Community of Belgium. The course gathered together 21 educators from France, Switzerland, Belgium, Canada, Andorra, Luxembourg and Greece, with the aim of training them with regard to hate speech online, disseminating the guidance of the manual *Bookmarks/Connexions*, and developing their competences in using the manual with young people.

*Ce qui vous regarde... No Hate* is an educational tool for education professionals about online hate speech and cyberbullying. Produced by Loupiote with the support of the Council of Europe, the tool consists of a film (DVD) and an accompanying booklet to discuss/debrief the film in a classroom or group. *Hate speech, as defined by the Committee of Ministers of the Council of Europe, covers all forms of expression which spread, incite, promote or justify racial hatred, xenophobia, antisemitism or other forms of hatred based on intolerance, including: intolerance expressed by aggressive nationalism and ethnocentrism, discrimination and hostility against minorities, migrants and people of immigrant origin. For the purpose of the campaign, other forms of discrimination and prejudice, such as anti-gypsyism, christianophobia, islamophobia, misogyny, sexism and discrimination on the grounds of sexual orientation and gender identity fall clearly within the scope of hate speech.*

[Azerbaijan](#), current Chair of the Committee of Ministers, hosted *The Forum of the No Hate Speech Movement* (Gabala, 1-5 October) and the [First Global Forum on Youth Policies](#) (Baku, 28-30 October).

The [First Global Forum on Youth Policies](#) brought together some 700 participants from 165 countries: governmental representatives, youth representatives and experts. Laurence Hermand (CDEJ Chair) and Hanan Bihi (CCJ Vice-Chair) represented the CMJ at the Forum, which was also attended by other members of the CDEJ and the Advisory Council on Youth and by representatives of ERYICA and EYCA. The [Baku Commitment on Youth Policy](#) based on the findings emanating from the Forum was adopted on 30 October. The Forum was co-organised by the UN Special Envoy on Youth, Unesco, UNDP and the CoE Youth Department.

Belgium will take over the chairmanship of the Committee of Ministers on 13 November until May 2015 and will organise the 2nd European Youth Work Convention in Brussels on 27 – 30 April 2015.

At their 1210th meeting, the Ministers' Deputies took [several decisions](#) concerning the situation in Ukraine.

Jean-Claude Frécon was elected president of the Congress during the [27th session](#) (14 to 16 October 2014). The theme of this session was “Empowering youth: a shared responsibility for cities and regions”. Promoting the active participation of young people has been a common theme of the Congress’s activities in 2014. In order to take its commitment to this issue to the next level, the Congress, in cooperation with the EYF and the Youth Department, invited one young person per national delegation to take part in the session. The youth delegates, who were given the same speaking rights as the Congress members, chose to discuss co-management and youth unemployment during a special youth debate. They took an active part in all of the debates [[Video-1](#)-[Video-2](#)] [[Interview with young representatives](#)]. Liam Preston and Christian Scharling represented the Advisory Council on Youth. Besides different monitoring and election observation reports, the Congress also debated: corruption and the promotion of ethics; [Promoting diversity through intercultural education and communication strategies](#); the role of regional media for building participatory democracy; [Promoting equal opportunities for people with disabilities and their participation in local and regional life](#). In addition, a [declaration](#) was adopted on separatist tensions in Ukraine and neighbouring countries. The session was held during European Local Democracy Week (13 – 19 October) the theme of which was [Participatory democracy: sharing, proposing, deciding](#).

The 3rd edition of the [Strasbourg World Forum for Democracy \(WFD\)](#), organised with the support of the French government, the Alsace Region and the City of Strasbourg, is taking place in Strasbourg on 3–5 November 2014. This year the Forum will ask young people how to revitalise democracy. The WFD participants will designate the most promising initiative from among the thirty or so to be discussed in the Forum Labs and the Award for Democratic Innovation will be handed over by Secretary General Thorbjørn Jagland, in the presence of the Women of Uganda Network, the 2013 award-winner. The *2014 Falcone Prize* will be awarded on 4 November to leading figures and organisations who think outside the box or take courageous action on the ground at the risk of their personal safety. The *Reporters without Borders for Freedom of the Press Prize* will be awarded on 5 November.

In cooperation with the PACE and [LICRA](#), the Youth Department sponsored a [laboratory](#) “No to Neo-Nazis, No to Hate Speech”.

The WFD “Unconferences” - participant-driven meetings on the fringe of the Forum whose agenda is drawn up by the attendees on an [online](#)

[platform](#) before the meeting - should enable spontaneous discussions and allow for fresh ideas and new alliances. The WFD is an annual gathering of leaders, opinion-makers, civil society activists, representatives of business, academia, media and professional groups to debate key challenges for democracies worldwide. The insights gathered during the World Forum will inform the work of the CoE and its numerous partners in the field of democracy and democratic governance.

A Junior Professional Programme, a specific recruitment and employment scheme for job profiles suitable for young graduates with little or no relevant work experience, was introduced in the CoE on 16 October. More information should become available on the [Human Resources website](#).

## **(2) Youth Department update**

The international expert team (IRT) carrying out the CoE youth policy review in Serbia has sent in its observations on the draft National Youth Strategy currently being drawn up in Serbia. The IRT report drawn up following its two visits to Serbia (in April and September) will be presented at a national hearing to be held in Belgrade in February 2015. The final version of the IRT report will be presented at an international hearing during the CMJ meeting in Budapest in April 2015. The report of the youth policy review in Greece, carried out in 2013 will be presented to the CMJ at their meeting in November 2014. Prof. Howard Williamson coordinated both country reviews.

An expert team will be visiting Romania to carry out a second phase review in 2015. Albania has requested the CoE's assistance to establish its new national Action Plan for Youth. *Other member states wishing to benefit from the CoE [youth policy reviews](#) over the next few years are invited to come forward.*

The CoE statutory organs (CDEJ, CCJ and CMJ) will meet in Strasbourg on 12-14 November. The CCJ meeting will be preceded (11 November afternoon) by a preparatory meeting organised by the YFJ for all the 30 CCJ members. The Programming Committee, a subsidiary co-decision-making body made up of 8 CDEJ and 8 CCJ members, will meet in Budapest on 3-5 December.

The CoE [Partial Agreement on Youth Mobility through the Youth Card](#) together with the European Youth Card Organisation ([EYCA](#)) is organising a seminar on “Inclusive Online Engagement for young people to support youth mobility and active citizenship” on 11 November in the EYCS. The Seminar will be followed by a meeting of the Partial Agreement’s Board of Co-ordination.

The 12<sup>th</sup> meeting of the Joint Coordinating Committee [ERYICA](#)/Council of Europe will be held in Strasbourg on 12 November in the evening.

A first visit to the Destelheide Youth Centre in Belgium was carried out on 29-30 October within the [Council of Europe’s Quality Label for youth centres](#). The expert team composed of Georges Metz (CDEJ) Srdjan Subotic (AC) and Djuro Blanusa (Serbian Ministry of Youth and Sport) was led by Olaf Köndgen, Executive Director of the EYC Budapest. A mid-term visit to the Euromed Youth Centre in Adrasan, Turkey will be held on 18-19 November. The 6th Platform will be hosted next year by Ecocenter “Radulovacki” in Serbia. A brainstorming session bringing together members of the Quality Label team and the Youth Department will meet on 11 November in Strasbourg to discuss improving synergies between the labelled and not yet labelled centres as well as between participating centres and the Youth Department. The Council of Europe Quality Label for Youth Centres is an opportunity for participating youth centres to benefit from the CoE’s approach to youth work and youth policy.

Following the all-Ukrainian “Compass” course which will be held in Lviv on 3-7 November to train youth multipliers in Human Rights Education and Conflict Transformation, a study visit of Ukrainian youth leaders to Strasbourg is planned for December.

The [EYF](#) continues to give priority to pilot activities on capacity building and conflict transformation developed by Ukrainian NGOs or European NGOs wishing to cooperate with Ukrainian NGOs.

## **(3) Council of Europe**

The report by the Commissioner for Human Rights following his mission to Kyiv, Moscow and Crimea on 7–12 September was published on 27 October 2014.

A Seminar and Inter-regional Dialogue on the protection of journalists, will address the need to improve legal protection for journalists whose safety and security are threatened because of their work. The Seminar is organised jointly by the Council of Europe, UNESCO, the Centre for Freedom of the Media, University of Sheffield and European Lawyer's Union.

The main theme of the 16<sup>th</sup> Ministerial Conference of the Pompidou Group to be held in Strasbourg on 19-20 November will be “New generations – challenges for existing drug policies”. The European Prevention Prize 2014 will be awarded on that occasion. AC member Fanny Charmey has been invited to participate in the Conference.

## **(4) Other news**

The EU Juncker Commission (2014-2019) which took up its duties on 1 November, includes former Hungarian Minister of Foreign Affairs and Trade Tibor Navracsics as Commissioner for Education, Culture, Youth and Sport.

On 21 October, the European Commissioner for Employment, Social Affairs and Inclusion issued a Statement on the results of the European Employment Summit (Milan, 8 October). The summit was considered disappointing by the European Youth Forum as youth was not the main focus as originally planned. It felt that “a proper follow-up of Summit on Youth Employment [held in Paris in 2013] is still needed and that youth employment – which in some European countries stands at over 50% – deserves the highest political attention”.

On 22 October the EU's High-Level Group on the Modernisation of Higher Education published its report on 'new modes of learning and

teaching in universities'. In the introduction, the Commissioner for European Commissioner for Education, Culture, Multilingualism and Youth pledged that the EC would offer "funding through the Erasmus + Programme to policy makers and education providers to take forward the recommendations".

On 24 October, the ILO issued a statistics brief on "[Skills mismatch in Europe](#)". The [study](#), which covers 24 European countries, addresses the incidence of over-education and under-education (skills mismatch) in a sample of European economies and shows that mismatches between workers' competences and what is required by their job are widespread. For example, between 25 and 45 % of workers in Europe are either over – or under-qualified for their job, leading to a substantial mismatch between supply and demand in the labour market.

The Court of Justice of the European Union ruled on 10 September ([Case C-491/13](#)) that "*Article 12 of Council Directive 2004/114/EC of 13 December 2004 on the conditions of admission of third-country nationals for the purposes of studies, pupil exchange, unremunerated training or voluntary service must be interpreted as meaning that the Member State concerned is obliged to admit to its territory a third-country national who wishes to stay for more than three months in that territory for study purposes, where that national meets the conditions for admission exhaustively listed in Articles 6 and 7 of that directive and provided that that Member State does not invoke against that person one of the grounds expressly listed by the directive as justification for refusing a residence permit.*"

[UNITED](#) (European Network against nationalism, racism, fascism and in support of migrants and refugees) is organising a photo campaign dedicated to the International Day against Fascism and Anti-Semitism on November 9. Governmental representatives, city municipalities and public figures all over Europe have been invited to make a short statement and take a picture with one of the campaign posters. [ThinkYoung](#) is carrying out, in partnership with [Burson-Marsteller](#) and as part of the [Europe Decides](#) Initiative, a [survey](#) on the values of the "Erasmus Generation", their attitudes towards the EU, and their outlook for the future. The results will be presented during the "Europe Decided: Kick-Off for Europe" conference, which will take place on 3 December in Brussels. The survey will close on 9 November.

The interactive on-line platform, “[Decent Work for Youth](#)” allows young people to engage and find solutions to the youth employment crisis.

The [European Youth Forum](#) (YFJ) organised a Workshop on ‘[Youth and Poverty](#)’, together with the European Anti-poverty Network during the annual ‘Meeting of People Experiencing Poverty’ (22 – 24 September).

At the [CATS 2014](#) Conference held in Caux on 26 July – 2 August, a Declaration was adopted which will be submitted to the Council of Europe youth sector. The declaration asks authorities and society in general to recognise the “right to full active participation.” It also highlights the need to help those who are in trouble to find a way out of their problems and concludes that they [the children] “want to be part of the democratic space that influences their life.
