# Committee of Legal Advisers on Public International Law (CAHDI)

Set up by the Committee of Ministers under Article 17 of the Statute of the Council of Europe and in accordance with <u>Resolution CM/Res(2021)3</u> on intergovernmental committees and subordinate bodies, their terms of reference and working methods.

# Main tasks

Under the authority of the Committee of Ministers, the CAHDI is instructed to:

- i. take due account of the Reykjavik Declaration<sup>2</sup> in conducting its activities and submit proposals for its implementation as appropriate;
- ii. take account of the relevant key findings and challenges set out in the Secretary General's 2023 Report on the state of democracy, human rights and rule of law "An Invitation to Recommit to the Values and Standards of the Council of Europe";
- iii. examine questions and hold exchanges of views related to public international law;
- iv. conduct exchanges with and co-ordinate views of member States;
- v. provide opinions at the request of the Committee of Ministers or at the request of other Steering or ad hoc Committees, transmitted via the Committee of Ministers;
- vi. provide input to the Committee of Ministers in view of the regular, high-level dialogue with member States and partners on delivering on the Reykjavik Principles for Democracy;
- vii. raise-awareness about Council of Europe's standards and tools in its field of competence in the member States and beyond, through the neighbourhood policy and in other international and global fora where relevant;
- viii. hold an exchange of views annually in order to evaluate its activities and advise the Committee of Ministers and the Secretary General on future priorities in its sector, including possible new activities and those that might be discontinued;
- ix. take due account of the following mainstreamed perspectives in the performance of its tasks: gender, youth, children's rights, rights of persons with disabilities, and Roma and Traveller<sup>3</sup> issues;
- x. where relevant, contribute to strengthening meaningful engagement with civil society organisations and national human rights institutions in its work;
- xi. contribute to the achievement of, and review progress towards, the UN 2030 Agenda for Sustainable Development, in particular with regards to Goal 5: Gender Equality and Goal 16: Peace, Justice and Strong Institutions.

## Composition

#### Members

Governments of member States are invited to appoint representatives, experts in the field of public international law, of the highest possible rank, preferably chosen among the Legal Advisers to the Ministries of Foreign Affairs.

The Council of Europe will bear the travel and subsistence expenses of one representative from each member State (two in the case of the State whose representative has been elected Chair).

Each member of the Committee shall have one vote. Where a government designates more than one member, only one of them is entitled to take part in the voting.

#### • Participants

Committees or other bodies of the Council of Europe engaged in related work may send representatives, without the right to vote and at the charge of their corresponding administrative budgets.

The following may send representatives, without the right to vote and without defrayal of expenses:

- European Union;
- States with observer status with the Council of Europe: Canada, Holy See, Japan, Mexico and United States of America;
- The Hague Conference on Private International Law;
- North Atlantic Treaty Organisation (NATO);
- Organisation for Economic Co-operation and Development (OECD);
- United Nations and its specialised agencies;
- European Organisation for Nuclear Research (CERN);
- International Criminal Police Organisation (INTERPOL);
- Organisation for Security and Co-operation in Europe (OSCE);
- International Committee of Red Cross (ICRC).

#### • Observers

The following may send representatives, without the right to vote and without defrayal of expenses:

- Australia, Israel, the Republic of Korea and New Zealand;
- Asian-African Legal Consultative Organisation (AALCO);
- International Development Law Organization (IDLO).

Observer status may be requested in accordance with Article 8 of <u>Resolution CM/Res(2021)3</u> on intergovernmental committees and subordinate bodies, their terms of reference and working methods.
