STEERING COMMITTEE ON MEDIA AND INFORMATION SOCIETY (CDMSI)

Set up by the Committee of Ministers under Article 17 of the Statute of the Council of Europe and in accordance with Resolution CM/Res(2021)3 on intergovernmental committees and subordinate bodies, their terms of reference and working methods.

<p>Pillar: Human Rights Programme: Effective ECHR implementation Sub-programme: Freedom of expression and information, media and data protection</p>
MAIN TASKS ▼
<p>Under the authority of the Committee of Ministers, the CDMSI will steer the Council of Europe's work in the fields of freedom of expression, media, digital governance and other information society-related issues and oversees the work on personal data protection. The CDMSI advises the Committee of Ministers and takes part in standard-setting activities on all questions within its area of expertise, including freedom, independence, pluralism and diversity of media; safety of journalists; support for professional journalism, protection and promotion of human rights, in particular freedom of expression as protected by Article 10 of the European Convention on Human Rights, both online and offline. The CDMSI facilitates and promotes co-operation among Council of Europe member States by developing common policies, reviewing their implementation and fulfilling any other activity which might be assigned to it by the Committee of Ministers.</p> <p>In particular, the CDMSI is instructed to:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> (i) ensure the follow-up of the relevant decisions taken at the 131st Session of the Committee of Ministers (Hamburg, 21 May 2021),¹⁹ and in particular contribute to the implementation of the key strategic priorities relating to its specific field of expertise as identified in the Strategic Framework of the Council of Europe, and respond to the respective key findings and challenges set out in the Secretary General's 2021 Report on the state of democracy, human rights and rule of law "A democratic renewal for Europe"; (ii) evaluate, plan and carry out standard-setting activities in areas within its expertise, including review and consolidation of existing instruments, in the light of the digital transformations; (iii) promote and facilitate awareness raising on Council of Europe standards and their implementation by member States in its fields of competence; (iv) identify emerging issues and challenges to member States in areas within its expertise, conduct studies and legal analyses on freedom of expression and media-related issues, with a special focus on the challenges arising for freedom of expression from digital transformations and undue influence on democratic processes, and make proposals to the Committee of Ministers; (v) ensure follow-up to the conclusions and recommendations of the Council of Europe Conference of Ministers responsible for Media and Information Society (10-11 June 2021), including the final declaration, and Committee of Ministers' decisions taken subsequent to the Ministerial Conference; (vi) oversee the Implementation Strategy of Recommendation CM/Rec(2016)4 on the safety of journalists and other media actors: further develop, promote and disseminate an Implementation Guide as a tool to boost the implementation of the recommendation; provide guidance for the drafting of national action plans on the safety of journalists and other media actors, create tools for sharing best practices and training in the field; initiate and co-ordinate a comprehensive campaign to promote the protection of journalism and the safety of journalists and support corresponding campaigns at national level; (vii) support the implementation of the documents adopted by the Council of Europe in the sphere of the freedom of expression and digital technologies, in the light of the most recent developments in the field; (viii) co-ordinate standard-setting work in respect of the protection of personal data and the right to private life, in close association with other relevant Council of Europe bodies such as the T-PD and the CDCJ; (ix) follow and, as appropriate, contribute to the substantive aspects of co-operation programmes with Council of Europe member States and support activities within national initiatives in the field of the media and information society; (x) take the European Convention on Human Rights and the evolving jurisprudence of the European Court of Human Rights into consideration in its thematic work; (xi) follow the implementation of the non-binding instruments that it has prepared as well as conventions for which it has been given supervision by the Committee of Ministers; without prejudice to the mandates of intergovernmental committees of the Council of Europe that already follow the work of monitoring mechanisms, follow the activities of the relevant monitoring and other bodies or convention mechanisms; (xii) orient and oversee the activities carried out by its subordinate bodies, notably the Committee of Experts on the integrity of online information (MSI-INF), the Committee of Experts on Increasing Resilience of Media (MSI-RES) and the Committee of Experts on Strategic Lawsuits against Public Participation (MSI-SLP) (cf. separate terms of reference); (xiii) hold an exchange of views annually in order to evaluate its activities and advise the Committee of Ministers and the Secretary General on future priorities in its sector, including possible new activities and those that might be discontinued;

- (xiv) take due account of the following mainstreamed perspectives in the performance of its tasks: gender, youth, children's rights, rights of persons with disabilities, and Roma and Traveller²⁰ issues;
- (xv) where relevant, contribute to building cohesive societies and to strengthening the role and meaningful participation of civil society in its work;
- (xvi) in accordance with decisions CM/Del/Dec(2013)1168/10.2 of the Committee of Ministers, carry out, at regular intervals, within the limits of the available resources and bearing in mind its priorities, an examination of some or all of the conventions for which it has been given responsibility,²¹ in co-operation, where appropriate, with the relevant convention-based bodies, and report back to the Committee of Ministers;
- (xvii) contributes to the achievement of, and review progress towards, the UN 2030 Agenda for Sustainable Development, in particular with regards to Goal 5: Gender equality and Goal 16: Peace, Justice and Strong.

COMPOSITION ▼

MEMBERS:

Governments of member States are invited to designate one or more representatives of the highest possible rank in the fields of freedom of expression, media, safety of journalists digital governance and data protection policies.

The Council of Europe will bear the travel and subsistence expenses of one representative from each member State (two in the case of the State whose representative has been elected Chair).

Each member of the Committee shall have one vote. Where a government designates more than one member, only one of them is entitled to take part in the voting.

In accordance with decisions CM/Del/Dec(2013)1168/10.2 of the Committee of Ministers, in cases where there is no convention-based body including all the Parties, non-member States are invited to take part, with a right to vote, in the committee meetings pertaining to the conventions to which they are Parties.

Observer status may be requested in accordance with Article 8 of Resolution CM/Res(2021)3 on intergovernmental committees and subordinate bodies, their terms of reference and working methods.
