Composition ▼

MEMBERS:

The Committee of Experts shall be composed of 10 representatives, five on behalf of the CDPC, and five of the CDADI, of the highest possible rank in the fields of criminal law and policy, including crime prevention, victims' rights and criminal justice, as well as equality, non-discrimination and inclusion policies, designated by the plenaries of the CDPC and the CDADI, and four independent experts, appointed by the Secretary General, with established expertise in these field.

The Committee shall be composed in accordance with Article 6 of Resolution CM/Res(2021)3 on intergovernmental committees and subordinate bodies, their terms of reference and working methods.

The Council of Europe will bear the travel and subsistence expenses of all 14 members of the Committee. Other member States may appoint representatives without defrayal of expenses.

Each member of the Committee of Experts shall have one vote. Where a government designates more than one member, only one of them is entitled to take part in the voting.

- Other international organisations, including Organisation for Security and Co-operation in Europe/Office for Democratic Institutions and Human Rights (OSCE/ODIHR), United Nations (including Committee for the Elimination of Racial Discrimination (CERD), Commission on Crime Prevention and Criminal Justice (CCPCJ), Office of the High Commissioner for Human Rights (OHCHR), High Commissioner for Refugees (UNHCR), and other relevant UN agencies) Organisation for Economic Co-operation and Development (OECD).

OBSERVERS:

The following may send representatives, without the right to vote and without defrayal of expenses:

 Non-member states with which the Council of Europe has a Neighbourhood Partnership including relevant co-operation activities.

Observer status may be requested in accordance with Article 8 of Resolution CM/Res(2021)3 on intergovernmental committees and subordinate bodies, their terms of reference and working methods.

¹ The term "Roma and Travellers" is used at the Council of Europe to encompass the wide diversity of the groups covered by the work of the Council of Europe in this field: on the one hand a) Roma, Sinti/Manush, Calé, Kaale, Romanichals, Boyash/Rudari; b) Balkan Egyptians (Egyptians and Ashkali); c) Eastern groups (Dom, Lom and Abdal); and, on the other hand, groups such as Travellers, Yenish, and the populations designated under the administrative term "Gens du voyage", as well as persons who identify themselves as Gypsies. The present is an explanatory footnote, not a definition of Roma and/or Travellers.
