

# HELP Online course on Violence Against Women and Domestic Violence

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## Background and key concepts

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Violence against women is a grave violation of human rights and a form of discrimination against women. It can take many forms, such as physical violence, sexual abuse, stalking, female genital mutilation or forced marriages. Violence against women is both a cause and a consequence of unequal power relations between women and men and it limits the full advancement of women. Violence against women, including domestic violence occurs in every Council of Europe member state despite some positive developments in law, policies and practices.

States have a responsibility to respect, protect and fulfil the human rights of all their citizens. Therefore, all reasonable measures have to be taken to prevent, investigate and punish all forms of violence against women, including domestic violence. Violence against women is a complex issue, particularly when it occurs within the home, which can be compounded by the response of authorities to whom women turn for help. A comprehensive European curriculum on the topic for a better understanding of violence against women and domestic violence by legal professionals is therefore needed.

The HELP course Violence Against Women and Domestic Violence covers in an interactive way the key concepts, the international and European legal framework and case law governing the prevention and protection of women and girls from violence, focusing in particular on the Council of Europe Convention on Preventing and Combating Violence against Women and Domestic Violence (Istanbul Convention). Furthermore, the course provides the legal professionals with practical tools for dealing with cases of violence against women and domestic violence with respect to a human rights and victim centred approach.

The HELP course Violence Against Women and Domestic Violence offers a detailed and comprehensive curriculum to improve the quality of the judicial response in violence against women cases and support the access to justice for victims of violence. Such a course is intended, in the long term, to become an integral part of the overall learning curricula of the national training institutions and/or other competent authorities of the CoE member States.

## Learning objectives

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By the end of this course you will be able to:

- Understand the key concepts related violence against women and domestic violence and recognise common barriers to access to justice for victims of violence against women;
- Refer to the key international and European legal instruments, especially the Council of Europe Convention on Preventing and Combating Violence against Women and Domestic Violence, in your everyday work;

- Apply a gender sensitive and victim-centred approach in violence against women and domestic violence cases;
- Understand the important role of the civil and criminal law professionals in protecting the victims of violence against women and domestic violence and ensuring their access to justice;
- Understand the importance of co-operation and co-ordination to ensure higher standards and greater efficiency in the judicial system and better measures targeting violent offenders.

- ❖ International and European Legal Framework
- ❖ Overcoming barriers / access to Justice
- ❖ Criminal Justice Response I – Investigation and pre-trial
- ❖ Criminal Justice Response II – Trial and sentencing
- ❖ Civil Justice Response
- ❖ Alternative Dispute Resolution
