Webinar on Intercultural Cities in the Asia-Pacific

Concept Note

BACKGROUND

The Council of Europe's Intercultural Cities Programme (ICC)¹, which started in 2008 as a pilot project with 11 cities in Europe, grew into a global network of more than 140 cities, including those in North Africa, the Americas and the Asia-Pacific after more than a decade. The question of migration and integration is now one of the most important issues in the international community, including local governments.

The ICC supports cities in reviewing their policies through an intercultural lens and developing comprehensive intercultural strategies to build a diverse and inclusive community. There are three guiding principles in the ICC, that is, diversity, equality and interaction.

This webinar is one of the special events commemorating the 25th anniversary of Japan's participation in the Council of Europe as an observer state. In this webinar, the two co-authors of a newly published booklet, entitled "An Introduction to the Intercultural City for Local Governments in Japan" will share their views on how to create an intercultural city by referring to good practices of Hamamatsu and Kobe, two Japanese leading cities in migrant integration.

This webinar has a focus on intercultural cities in the Asia-Pacific Region, including Australia and Korea as well as Japan. It is hoped that the experience of the participating cities in the webinar will bring cities in the region and beyond some insights into the question of migration and integration, including issues such as education for children with diverse backgrounds and multilingual support for newcomers.

Professor, Meiji University (Tokyo, Japan)



Ms Battaini-Dragoni served as the Council of Europe's Deputy Secretary General since 2012 until February 2021. Before her current post, she was Director General of Social Cohesion, then Education, Culture and Heritage, and Programmes, respectively. She has published widely on a range of issues including social rights and the role of intercultural dialogue in modern democracies.

Ms Ivana d'Alessandro is a human rights lawyer specialised on migrants and refugees' rights.
