To identify and address challenges related to youth participation, global education, democratic processes, peace and intercultural dialogue.

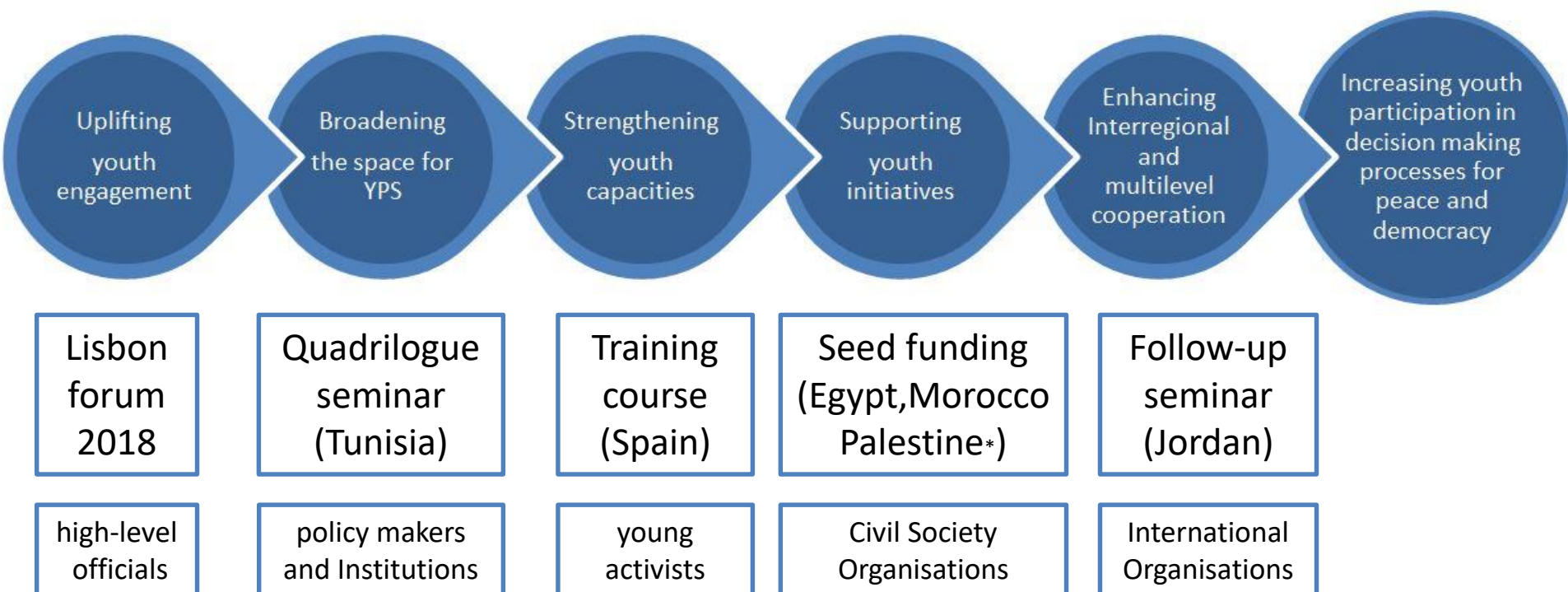

Council of Europe's youth priority "peaceful and inclusive societies"

Focus on the pillar of participation of the UNSCR 2250:
the need to ensure to young people "meaningful political inclusion".

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Our Approach :

Adressing structural and cultural violence

Transform unfair structures, target prejudice, build relationships.
A complementary agenda for the achievement of the SDGs.

Process oriented

YPS agenda as “tool” for dialogue between youth and decision makers.
Synchronize the top-down and the bottom-up approaches.

NSC as facilitator

Provide a platform where different youth stakeholders interact,
learn, cooperate and coordinate their actions and initiatives

Fostering participation and inclusion

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What we learn:

1) Besides open conflicts, to address the **violence of exclusion** (structured violence): poverty, discrimination and lack of opportunities are drivers for conflict.

2) YPS is not a youth agenda: it is a **peace agenda where young people have to be included.**

The subsequent Resolution 2419 calls States to engage young people in mediation and implementation of peace agreements.

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What we learn:

- 3) Discussion focused only on bringing young people “in the room” while there are tremendous opportunities for youth to play an **important role also “outside the room”** (informal and alternative initiatives and approaches).
- 4) Increase the focus on the lack of **protection of young activists**. Many young people are being threatened, harassed and attacked (also on social media). Issue that contributes to the shrinking space for civil society.

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What we learn:

- 5) “Youth” is **not an homogenous group** (often youth invited to speak in events only because of their being young). Involve young people in light of their diverse profiles, contexts, experiences and needs.
- 6) YPS as transformative agendas: requires a change of attitudes and behaviours. All stakeholders should embark in a **trust building exercise where time is a key element**: improving the levels of trust between actors requires time.
