## Who are we?

The Advisory Council on Youth is the non-governmental partner in the co-management structure which establishes the **standards and work priorities** of the Council of Europe's **youth sector** and makes recommendations for future priorities, programmes and budgets.

It is composed by 30 youth representatives (20 European Youth Forum organisations + 10 non YFJ org) that advise the Committee of Ministers on decisions relating to youth.

# The co-management system explained

#### **Process**

The co-management system involves representatives from youth non-governmental organisations (NGOs) sitting down in committees with government officials who together then work out the priorities for the youth sector and make recommendations for future budgets and programmes. These proposals are then adopted by the Committee of Ministers, the Council of Europe's decision-making body.

#### **Youth in the Council of Europe**

### **European Steering Committee for Youth (CDEJ)**

Made up of experts nominated by the 50 member states of the European Cultural Convention

## Advisory Council on Youth (CCJ)

Made up of 30 representatives of Youth Organisations nominated by the European Youth Forum and the Secretary General

#### Joint Council on Youth (CMJ)

Co-managed decision-making body composed of the members of the CDEJ and the CCJ



Programming Committee on Youth (CPJ)

(subsidiary body of the CMJ)



# **EU-CoE Youth Partnership** activities

- The EU-CoE youth partnership stems from the close relations that the Council of Europe and the European Commission have developed in the youth field.
- The specific themes are participation/citizenship, social inclusion, recognition and quality of youth work.
